February 2021



This Labour Market Bulletin provides an analysis of Labour Force Survey results for the province of Ontario, including the regions of Hamilton—Niagara Peninsula, Kingston—Pembroke, Kitchener—Waterloo—Barrie, London, Muskoka—Kawarthas, Northeast, Northwest, Ottawa, Stratford—Bruce Peninsula, Toronto and Windsor—Sarnia.

OVERVIEW

- Ontario's employment figures rose by 100,300 (+1.4%) from January to February, as the unemployment rate fell from 10.2% to 9.2%
- The Ontario accommodation and food services sector employment levels increased sharply by 12.2% (+34,900), boosted by the province's phased return to the five-colour coded framework that allows indoor dining for regions in the Green-Prevent to Red-Control levels
- The Toronto regional unemployment rate increased to 10.4% in February 2021, 5.2 percentage points higher than in February 2020

Employment in Ontario recovered strongly in February, aided in part by the phased loosening of provincial COVID-19 restrictions throughout the month, after the provincial job market had suffered a setback in January.

Ontario's employment figures rose by 100,300 (+1.4%) from January to February 2021, to 7.2 million. This contrasted with the 153,500 (-2.1%) net loss in provincial employment figures in January. Gains in part-time employment accounted for the majority of the net job gains in February, as part-time employment increased by 62,300 (+5.6%), while full-time employment rose by 38,000 (+0.6%).

Correspondingly, the Ontario unemployment rate fell, dropping from 10.2% to 9.2% in February, as unemployment levels fell by 75,900 (-9.5%). The Ontario unemployment rate reached its lowest level since March 2020, before the impacts of the pandemic were fully felt. The provincial employment rate and participation rate increased in February, with the Ontario job market observing positive gains throughout. However, looking at year-over-year trends, employment levels in February 2021 were still much lower than February 2020, with employment down by 305,300 (-4.1%) from 7.5 million a year ago.

Youth employment in Ontario expanded in February, as job figures increased by 23,100 (+2.7%) to 875,800 in February. Part-time employment for youth rose by 35,100, while full-time employment among youth fell by

12,000. Youth make up a large segment of the accommodation and food services sector, which saw significant employment gains in February, as the unemployment rate for youth fell to 20.9% in February from 21.8%.

The Canadian labour market expanded by 259,200 (+1.4%) to 18.5 million, while the national unemployment rate fell by 1.2 percentage points to 8.2%. This was the lowest unemployment rate in Canada since March 2020, following a similar pattern to Ontario. The employment gains were led by Quebec (+2.7%), Manitoba (+2.6%) and Ontario (+1.4%). However, employment levels in other provinces such as Newfoundland and Labrador (-6.8%) and New Brunswick (-0.7%) fell over the month. Employment figures in Canada are about 600K lower (-3.1%) than February 2020, when it was 19.1 million.

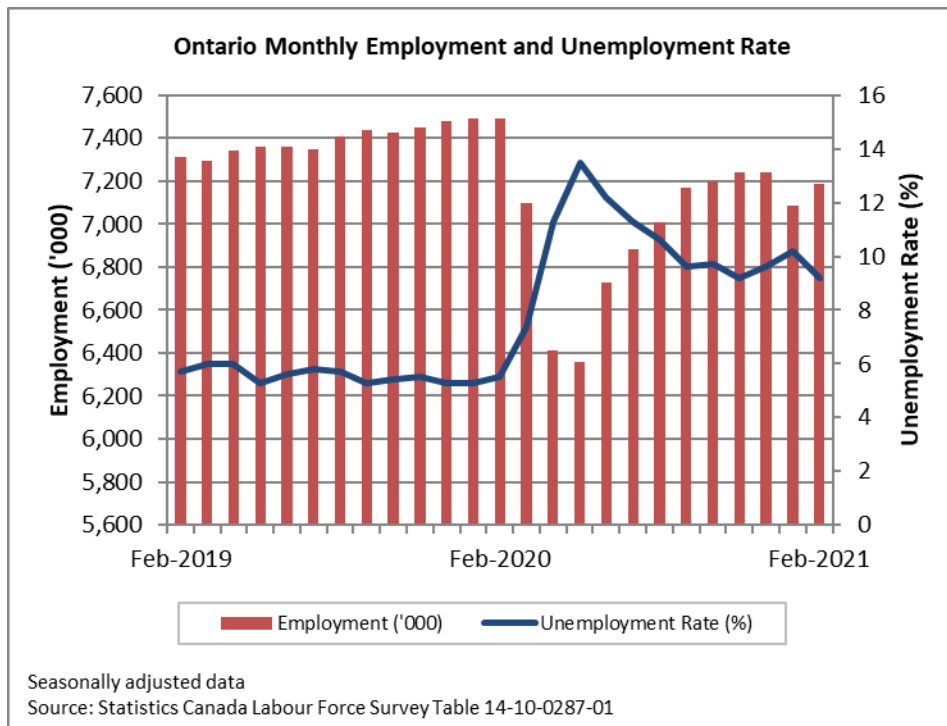
The United States (US) total nonfarm payroll employment increased by 379,000 (+0.3%) to 143.0 million in February, while the U.S. unemployment rate remained relatively flat at 6.2%. Most of the net job gains occurred in leisure and hospitality, while there were smaller gains in temporary help services, health care and social assistance, retail trade, and manufacturing.

EMPLOYMENT BY INDUSTRY

Employment grew in the goods-producing sector with manufacturing leading the charge

The Ontario **goods-producing sector** employment levels expanded by 4,900 (+0.3%) in February, following a decrease of 28,400 (-1.9%) the previous month. Much of this growth was driven by an increase in manufacturing (+15,000; +1.9%); while losses in agriculture (-9,600; -13.8%) and construction (-2,500; -0.5%) tempered overall growth in the sector.

Employment has largely trended upwards in the **manufacturing** industry since May 2020, with gains of 15,000 (+1.9%) in February. The Canadian Manufacturing Purchasing Managers’ Index (PMI) increased to 54.8 in February,

a 0.4 percentage point increase from January.¹ Operating conditions improved overall for manufacturers, with increased demand for manufactured goods. However, the industry still grapples with supply chain pressures and higher costs due to COVID-19, which continue to constrain supply and create transportation delays. For example, the automotive industry faces a global shortage of semiconductors, causing several automakers to idle or curtail production worldwide. General Motors recently announced it would extend its shutdown at its Ingersoll plant until at least mid-April due to the shortage.² This has placed thousands of assembly plant workers on temporary layoffs, and may disrupt production at parts suppliers and downstream companies in the province.

The industry announced other losses in February, with Bombardier Inc. to discontinue production of the Learjet in 2021,³ and parts supplier, JD Norman Industries, closing its plant in Windsor.⁴ Despite these closures, several manufacturers announced expansions via public funding, including CEM Specialities Inc.⁵ Next Generation Manufacturing Canada, in collaboration with tech start-ups across Ontario, will invest \$16.8M into an insect protein production facility in London, which will eventually employ 60 people.⁶

The Ontario **construction** industry observed a fall in employment levels (-2,500; -0.5%) in February, for the second consecutive month. However, the construction industry is looking strong in other indicators, as the total value of building permits issued increased by 12.3% to \$4.3B in Ontario in January.⁷ The total value of building permits rose 26.1% over the past year, driven by gains of over 50% in residential construction permits. In addition, housing starts increased to 90,300 in January 2021, up 25.3% from December 2020.⁸

Industry experts have raised concerns over the Canadian housing market, with forecasts suggesting that the housing market has been quite robust in 2021, led by lower borrowing costs, pent-up demand, and improved confidence, with borrowing costs expected to go up at some point in 2021. Over the long-term, a number of large projects should continue to support employment in construction, including a new hospital in Markdale,⁹ high-rise buildings,^{10,11} and various affordable housing projects throughout Ontario.^{12,13,14}

Compared to pre-pandemic levels in February 2020, total employment in the goods-producing sector was down 25,200 (-1.7%) in Ontario. Construction saw the biggest decline at 31,000 (-5.5%), followed by agriculture (-19,000; -24.1%), and utilities (-2,900; -5.3%). Meanwhile, the manufacturing industry saw a sizeable gain of 27,200 (+3.6%) during this period.

The job market strengthened in the services-producing sector with loosening of COVID-19 restrictions

Employment in Ontario's **services-producing sector** increased by 95,400 (+1.7%) in February, as public health measures gradually eased in nearly all regions across the province through the month. The largest gains were in industries that were among the most affected by these restrictions – accommodation and food services (+34,900, +12.2%), trade (+30,300; +3.1%), and information, culture and recreation (+15,800; +5.9%). Losses in the sector were milder, with the largest losses in finance, insurance, real estate, rental and leasing (-6,400; -1.0%), public administration (-3,000; -0.8%), and health care and social assistance (-2,200; -0.2%).

Employment in **retail and wholesale trade** increased 30,300 (+3.1%), following two consecutive months of losses due to restrictions on non-essential in-person shopping across Ontario. The phased loosening of COVID-19 restrictions allowed for in-person retail shopping to eventually re-open in most Ontario regions, and for retailers to re-open and re-hire its employees. Lowe's Canada held regional virtual and in-person hiring events for stores in Ontario in early March to support spring hiring, hoping to hire over 2,700 people.¹⁵ A number of cannabis retailers launched this month,^{16,17,18,19} as well as a premium eyewear brand,²⁰ a Winners,²¹ and grocery stores.^{22,23} Several retailers announced cutbacks in an effort to rein in costs, adjust to online platforms, and re-evaluate future operations. In February, J. Crew, an American fashion retailer, shut its remaining stores in Canada.²⁴ Canadian Tire's National Sports brand announced it would close all 18 of its retail stores across Ontario, as the company is planning to place affected employees within its other store brands.²⁵

Employment in **accommodation and food services** grew sharply (+34,900; +12.2%) in February after having consistently weakened over the past four months. As with other industries in the services-producing sector, employment gains and losses have tended to run parallel with pandemic-related restrictions. The industry was boosted by Ontario's phased return throughout February to the five-colour coded framework that allows indoor dining for regions in the Green-Prevent to Red-Control levels. While the industry has faced a significant number of closures over the past year, a few restaurants announced expansions in February, including Chick-fil-A²⁶, Great Lakes,²⁷ and Jollibee.²⁸

The **information, culture and recreation** industry reported employment gains of 15,800 (+5.9%) after three consecutive months of losses. This industry was hit particularly hard throughout the pandemic, with many performances, heritage institutions and recreational activities put on hold. Despite these struggles, some good news has come from the industry in the midst of reopening following the second wave of shutdowns, as recreational amenities such as ski hills, gyms, and cinemas were allowed to re-open as part of the gradual expiration of the stay-at-home orders across Ontario. Cineplex reopened some movie theatres across Ontario, including locations in Ottawa, Brantford, Sudbury and Kingston.²⁹ A number of ski resorts, including Boler Mountain in London,³⁰ Chicopee in Kitchener,³¹ and Calabogie Peaks in Renfrew,³² announced re-openings and re-hirings. Additionally, the Government of Ontario announced it would invest over \$7M in 87 various local and virtual events through the Reconnect Festival and Event Program.³³ Canada's Wonderland is looking to hire in anticipation of tentatively opening in May 2021.³⁴ Moreover, organizers of the Canadian National Exhibition and the Royal Agricultural Winter Fair have begun planning to hold events their respective events in 2021.³⁵

Job figures in the **transportation and warehousing** industry increased by 4,500 (+1.3%) in February. However, the industry may observe weaker labour market figures in coming months, as it was impacted by a number of layoff news throughout February. Air Canada initially announced that it would suspend all Rouge flights effective February 8 and lay off approximately 80 employees at Rouge, due to new travel restrictions to Mexico and the Caribbean

by the federal government.³⁶ WestJet Airlines Ltd. followed suit, announcing it will lay off 120 cabin crew members as of March 2, blaming the measure on the lack of flights to Mexico and the Caribbean.³⁷ Both companies announced further cuts later in the month, as Air Canada announced that it would cut an additional 1,500 jobs and suspend 17 trans-border and international routes until the end of April, with the majority of these routes from Toronto Pearson International Airport.³⁸ Finally, WestJet Airlines Ltd. issued layoff notices to 415 pilots, underlining the dim outlook for air travel heading into the spring.³⁹

Employment in the **services-producing sector** is down by 280,000 (-4.7%) compared to February 2020, just before the onset of the pandemic. Employment fell in the majority of industries, with the largest declines in accommodation and food services (-121,900; -27.5%), trade (-85,300; -7.8%), and business, building and other support services (-51,500; -15.9%). Meanwhile, the professional, scientific and technical services (+40,300; +6.0%), and the finance, insurance, real estate, rental and leasing industry (+28,500; +4.7%) saw gains during this period.

REGIONAL ANALYSIS

London joins Muskoka-Kawarthas in showing gains over the year, as all other regions post yearly declines

The **Muskoka-Kawarthas** economic region posted positive annual employment growth in February, increasing by 19,600 (+11.8%) from February 2020 to February 2021, measured on a year-over-year, seasonally unadjusted basis. In addition, the regional unemployment rate fell by 0.8 percentage points to 8.4%, with Muskoka-Kawarthas being the sole region in Ontario to post a decline in the regional unemployment rate in February. Within the region, recent positive employment news from Peterborough include an investment from the federal government to help construct 46 housing units as part of an affordable rental housing project.⁴⁰

The **London** economic region joined Muskoka-Kawarthas in experiencing gains in employment from February 2020 to February 2021, as it rose by 4,200 (+1.2%), although the regional unemployment rate rose 2.7 percentage points to 7.1% over the same period. Positive employment news from the region came with the Government of Ontario's investment in CEM Specialities Inc. to accelerate the production of its airborne COVID-19 detector device, creating up to 250 direct and 750 indirect jobs.⁴¹ Employment opportunities will also arise from several major construction projects in the region including two residential towers on the former South Street Hospital site,⁴² a \$300M high-rise by Ayerswood Development Corporation⁴³ and the Wellington Street road reconstruction project.⁴⁴

Due to the size of its labour force compared to other regions, the **Toronto** economic region (ER) continues to post the largest employment decreases among all economic regions in Ontario. The Toronto ER observed yearly employment losses of 180,300 (-3.6%) in February. The regional unemployment rate increased by 5.2 percentage points to 10.4% over the year. Air Canada announced that it would cut 1,500 jobs and suspend 17 trans-border and international routes until the end of April, the majority of which are out of Toronto Pearson International Airport, due to the impacts of the federal government's travel ban to certain locations in Mexico and the Caribbean, strongly impacting the regional air transportation industry.⁴⁵ The layoff of 210 employees by Bell Media

also had a strong impact on the Toronto ER, as a large share of these layoffs occurred in locations in the Greater Toronto Area (GTA).⁴⁶ Additionally, Starbucks permanently closed 25 of its locations in Toronto.⁴⁷

The **Kitchener-Waterloo-Barrie** economic region posted sharp employment declines, as job figures decreased by 52,900 (-6.8%) from February 2020 to February 2021. The region also had a significantly high jump in the unemployment rate over the year, increasing by 5.1 percentage points to 9.6%. Municipalities have experienced financial pressures due to the pandemic, with the Region of Waterloo announcing it will lay off 75 full-time employees this year to save costs.⁴⁸ While there was numerous expansions in the manufacturing sector as new products came into demand due to the need for protection from COVID-19, the Canadian Shield, a personal protective equipment manufacturing company, laid off 47 employees in February due to automation.⁴⁹ However, positive labour market news in the region came from the Chicopee Ski & Summer Resort, as the resort announced it will reopen and rehire 90% of the 600 employees laid off due to the provincial stay-at-home order.⁵⁰
