2019–2020 ANNUAL REPORT ACCESS TO INFORMATION ACT



1. INTRODUCTION

The Access to Information Act (the "Act") gives Canadian citizens as well as individuals and corporations present in Canada the right to access records under the control of federal government institutions, subject to limited and specific exceptions. The Act is intended to complement existing procedures for access to government information and not to limit in any way information that is normally available to the public.

Section 72 of the Act requires the head of every federal government institution to submit a report to Parliament on the administration of the Act at their institution each fiscal year.

This report was prepared pursuant to section 72 of the Act and describes how the National Film Board of Canada (the "NFB") administered the Act in fiscal year 2019-2020.

The NFB's mandate is to produce and distribute distinctive, culturally diverse, challenging and relevant audiovisual works that provide Canada and the world with a unique Canadian perspective.

2. ORGANIZATIONAL STRUCTURE

In accordance with section 73 of the Act, the Minister of Canadian Heritage appoints the following individuals to administer the Access to Information Act.

- > The Government Film Commissioner:
- ➤ The Director General, Institutional, Legal and Human Resources Services;
- ➤ The Access to Information Coordinator;
- > The Legal Counsel.

The NFB has no official entity tasked with processing access to information requests. The requests are forwarded to the Access to Information Coordinator, who is part of the Business Affairs and Legal Services department.

The Access to Information Coordinator is also responsible for coordination pursuant to the *Privacy Act*.

The NFB was not party to any service agreements under section 96 of the Act during the period covered by this report.

4. PERFORMANCE 2019-2020

A copy of the 2018-2019 Statistical Report is attached as Appendix B.

Percentage of requests responded to within legislated timelines

From April 1, 2019 to March 31, 2020, the NFB responded to 14 requests, 13 of which were fully processed within the deadlines prescribed by law (92.9%).

Multi-year trends

During the three years preceding the reporting period, the number of requests received annually by the NFB ranged from 6 to 19. Members of the public were the main source of these requests, followed by the university sector. The exceptions most often invoked in these requests are exceptions under paragraphs 19(1) and 20(1)c). During this period, no exclusion was invoked.

Completion times and extensions

The 14 requests fully processed by the NFB in 2019-2020 were completed within the following timeframes:

- 10 requests processed within not more than 30 days (71.42%);
- 2 requests processed within 31 to 60 days (14.29%);
- > 1 request processed within 61 to 120 days (7.14%); and
- > 1 request processed within 121 to 180 days (7.14%).

Consultations

In 2019–2020, the NFB processed a total of 2 consultation requests. These requests, which originated from other Government of Canada institutions, were processed in not more than 15 days.

Impact of COVID-19-related measures on the ability to fulfil the responsibilities imposed by the Act

NFB management decided to make teleworking compulsory for all staff as of March 15, 2020. Since then, activities related to the administration of the Act have been carried out remotely. As a result of COVID-19-related personal constraints on the sole employee responsible for processing applications, and the fact that the activities of some offices of primary interest have been slowed down and consultation deadlines with other federal institutions have been extended, the NFB's capacity to process requests is somewhat slowed down.

5. REPORTING ON ACCESS TO INFORMATION FEES FOR THE PURPOSES OF THE SERVICE FEES ACT

The Service Fees Act requires a responsible authority to report annually to Parliament on the fees collected by the institution. With respect to fees collected under the Access to Information Act, the information below is reported in accordance with the requirements of section 20 of the Service Fees Act.

- Enabling authority: Access to Information Act;
- Fee amount: \$5. This is the application fee for an access to information request payable pursuant to subsection 7 (1) (a) of the Access to Information Regulations;
- Total revenue: \$65:
- Fees waived: the application fee of \$5 for an access to information request was waived;
- Cost of operating the program: \$50,744.

TRAINING AND AWARENESS

All new NFB employees are required to take the online course "Access to Information and Privacy (ATIP)" 1015, from the Canada School of Public Service.

7. POLICIES, GUIDELINES, PROCEDURES AND INITIATIVES

In this reporting period, no new organizational policies or procedures relating to the administration of the Act were implemented at the NFB.

8. SUMMARY OF KEY ISSUES AND ACTIONS TAKEN ON COMPLAINTS OR AUDITS

No complaints were filed against the NFB during the year 2019-2020. The Office of the Information Commissioner of Canada is examining a complaint filed against the NFB during fiscal year 2017-2018. No audit related to the administration of the Act was conducted during the period of this report.

8. MONITORING COMPLIANCE

No tracking of the time required to process access to information requests was conducted during the period covered by this report.
