
## Child care workers and their employment during the COVID-19 pandemic




In 2019, nearly 302,000 individuals were employed as child care workers in Canada, making up **1.6%** of the total employed population.

Child care workers are predominantly women and close to one-third are immigrants or non-permanent residents.







Home child care providers (39%) were more likely to belong to a population group designated as a visible minority than early childhood educators and assistants (24%). Of all home child care providers, one in five were Filipino.

## More than 7 in 10 child care workers had postsecondary education in 2016.




Early childhood educators and assistants were more likely to have education above the high school level (79%) than home child care providers (53%).

## Since the start of the COVID-19 pandemic, employment among child care workers has decreased.

Total employment fell by 6% in March 2020. However, employment decreased more sharply among child care workers (-21%).

In February 2021, employment among child care workers was still 21% lower than in February 2020, before the pandemic. In comparison, total employment in Canada decreased by 3% over the same period.
