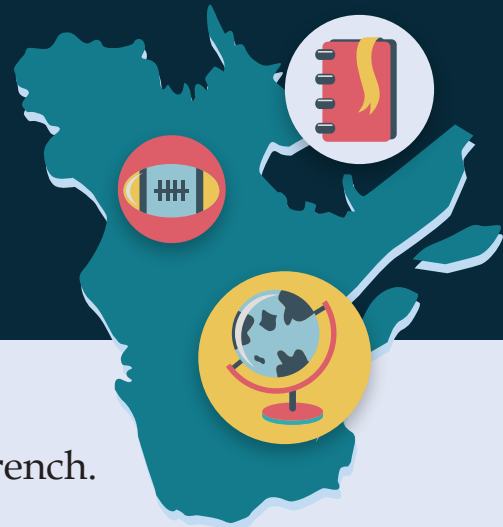
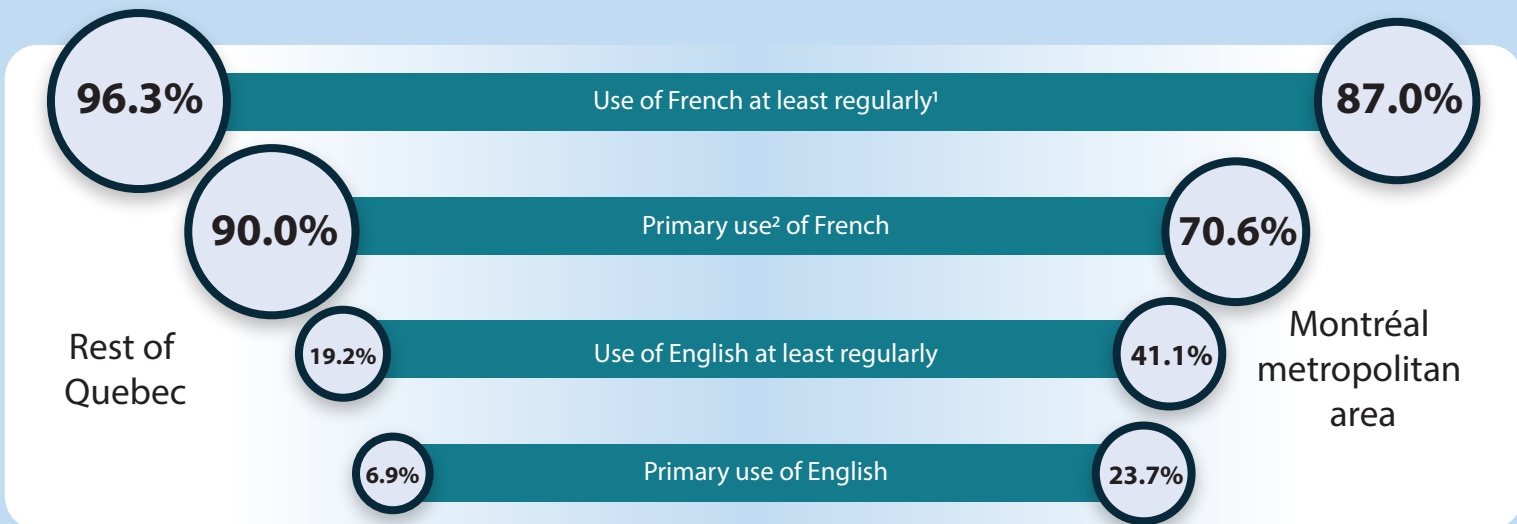


English and French among education workers in Quebec, 2011 to 2016

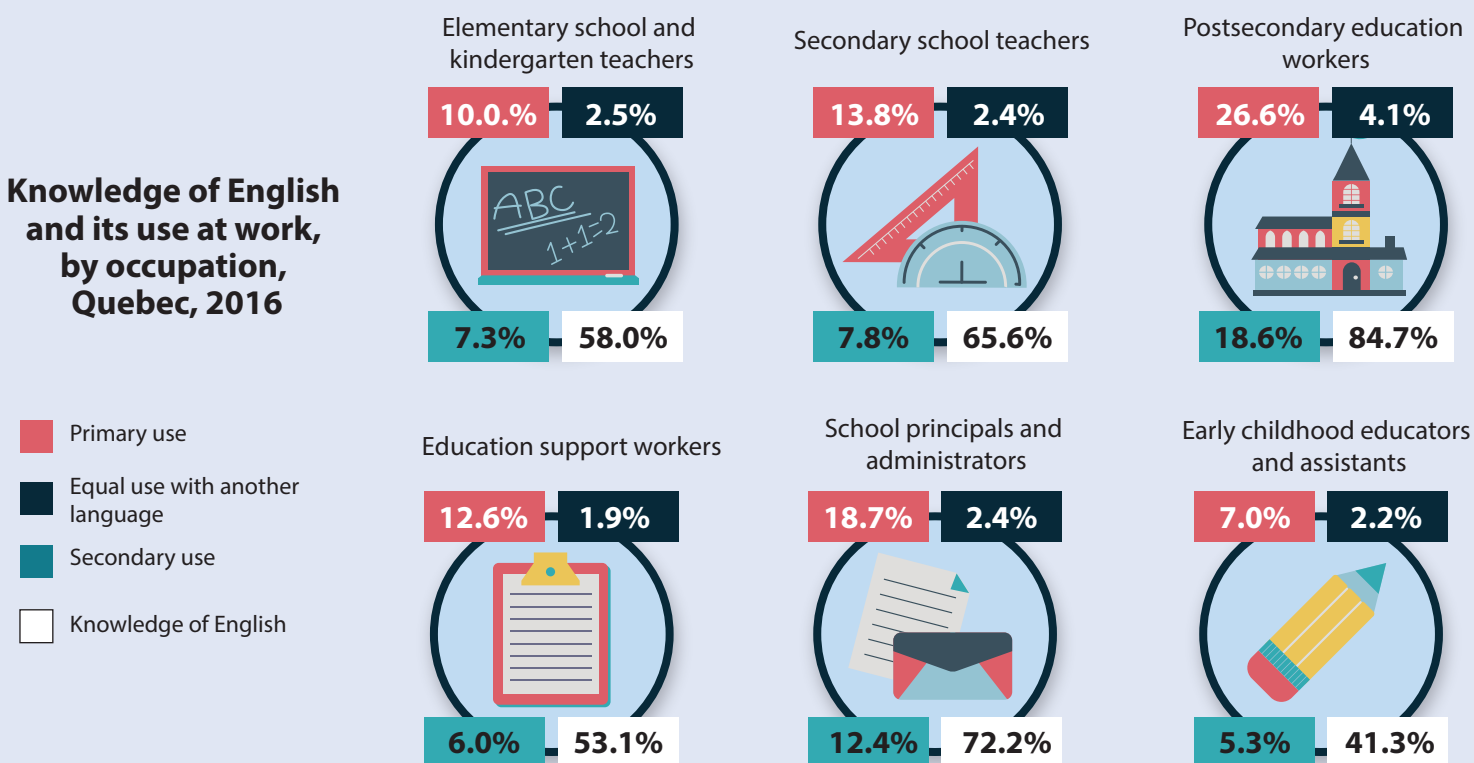


In 2016, there were **309,850** education workers in Quebec, with 202,145 who knew English and 295,430 who knew French.

Use of English and French by education workers, Montréal metropolitan area and the rest of Quebec, 2016



Since 2011, the equal use of English and French at work has increased everywhere in Quebec. The percentage of education workers who predominantly use either English or French at work declined from 2011 to 2016.



Notes:
 1. **Use at least regularly:** When a worker declares that they use a language at work either most often or regularly, in combination with another language or not.
 2. **Primary use:** When a worker declares that they use a language most often at work, exclusively or in combination with another secondary language.
 * In this infographic, the sum of the languages may be greater than the total population count because a person may report more than one language in the census.
 ** Using English at work does not necessarily mean teaching in this language. English could also be used at meetings, for research or because textbooks are in English.
