

Fully vaccinated travellers entering Canada during COVID-19





Pre-border

- Check that you are eligible to enter Canada.
- Check that you meet the requirements of being fully vaccinated. This means you have:
 - received the full series of a vaccine or a combination of vaccines accepted by the Government of Canada (Pfizer-BioNTech Comirnaty, Moderna Spikevax, AstraZeneca Vaxzevria/COVISHIELD, Janssen/Johnson & Johnson, Bharat Biotech Covaxin, Sinopharm BIBP and Sinovac/ CoronaVac/PiCoVacc); and
 - received your last dose at least 14 days before your travel to Canada.
- Fully vaccinated travellers must also meet all other entry criteria, including:
 - submitting all required COVID-19 information into <u>ArriveCAN</u> prior to travel (if arriving by air, information must be submitted **before** boarding a flight)
 - being asymptomatic upon arrival
 - having a paper or digital copy of your proof of vaccination in English or French (or certified translation); and
 - having a suitable quarantine plan, in case it is required
- Within 72 hours **before** your arrival to Canada or prior to scheduled departure of flight to Canada:
 - Take a pre-entry <u>COVID-19 molecular test</u> (Antigen tests are not accepted for entry) or have proof of a positive test result received in the previous 10-180 days.
 - use ArriveCAN to enter your information
- Air travellers are strongly encouraged to <u>pre-register for arrival</u> testing before their flight to Canada.



At the border

- Provide all required information and documents, including:
 - ArriveCAN receipt
 - pre-entry COVID-19 molecular test results
 - proof of vaccination (paper or digital files)
 - other travel documents
- Answer all eligibility, vaccination and health screening questions
- If you have symptoms, follow the instructions provided by the government representative.
- Travellers coming from any country other than the U.S. in the past 14 days should be prepared to take an arrival test and quarantine at a suitable place (such as your home) until you receive a negative Day 1 test result.
- Arrival testing could be on-site at the airport, offsite, or you
 may be provided a self-swab test kit at the border to take
 home.
- Travellers coming from the United States must take an arrival test if you are selected for mandatory random testing.
- Follow the handout given to you at time of entry and all additional federal, provincial/territorial and local public health measures, including wearing a well-constructed mask, maintaining a list of contacts for the 14 days after entry to Canada, and exercising extra precautions by avoiding highrisk settings such as long-term care facilities.



What you need to enter into ArriveCAN:

- Identification, including your passport or other travel documents
- Contact & travel information
- 14-day travel history
- Quarantine plan
- Confirmation of a negative pre-entry test (or positive test taken 10-180 days before to travel)
- Proof of vaccination (must be in English or French, or a certified translation)
- COVID-19 symptom self-assessment



After entry

COMING FROM ANY COUNTRY OTHER THAN THE U.S. IN THE PAST 14 DAYS

- Quarantine until receipt of your negative arrival test.
- Answer compliance verification calls from the Government of Canada
- Once in Canada, you can travel on to your final destination.
 Keep your proof of vaccination and retain a list of names and contact information for all close contacts and locations visited for 14 days post-entry.
- If you test positive, develop symptoms, or are exposed to someone with signs and symptoms of COVID-19 during the next 14 days, you are required to isolate for 10 days from the time the positive test was taken, the start of symptoms, or starting the day of exposure. You also need to contact the Public Health Agency of Canada at 1-833-641-0343 within 24 hours.

COMING FROM THE UNITED STATES AND HAVE NOT BEEN IN ANY OTHER COUNTRY FOR 14 DAYS

- If you meet all the entry requirements, are fully vaccinated and are selected for Mandatory Random Testing, you must take a test on arrival. You do not need to guarantine.
- If you meet all the entry requirements, are fully vaccinated and are not selected for Mandatory Random Testing, you are exempt from quarantine, but you should take precautions for 14 days, including wearing a well fitted mask, avoiding large gatherings, and not visiting high-risk areas like long term care facilities.
- Retain a list of names and contact information for all close contacts and locations visited for 14 days post-entry.
- If you test positive, develop symptoms, or are exposed to someone with signs and symptoms of COVID-19 during the next 14 days, you are required to isolate for 10 days from the time the test result is received, the start of symptoms, or starting the day of exposure. You also need to contact the Public Health Agency of Canada at 1-833-641-0343 within 24 hours.
