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# Statement Outlining Results, Risks and Significant Changes in Operations, Personnel and Program

#### 1. Introduction

#### 1.1 Background to the Quarterly Financial Report

As per the Directive on Accounting Standards, GC 4400, Departmental Quarterly Report, the Office of the Intelligence Commissioner (ICO) is submitting its quarterly report for the quarter ending December 31, 2020.

The report has been prepared by management as required by section 65.1 of the *Financial Administration Act* and in the form and manner prescribed by the Treasury Board. This quarterly financial report has not been subject to external audit or review.

#### 1.2 Authority, Mandate and Program

Under the *Intelligence Commissioner Act*, the Intelligence Commissioner is responsible for performing quasi-judicial reviews of the conclusions on the basis of which certain authorizations are issued or determinations are made under the *Communications Security Establishment Act* and the *Canadian Security Intelligence Service Act*.

#### **1.3** Basis of Presentation

This quarterly report has been prepared by management using an expenditure basis of accounting. The accompanying Statement of Authorities includes the ICO's spending authorities granted by Parliament, or received from Treasury Board Central Votes, and those used by ICO, consistent with the Main Estimates for the fiscal year ending March 31, 2021. This quarterly report has been prepared using a special purpose financial reporting framework, designed to meet financial information needs with respect to the use of spending authorities.

The authority of Parliament is required before moneys can be spent by the Government. Approvals are given in the form of annually approved limits through appropriation acts or through legislation in the form of statutory spending authority for specific purposes.

The ICO uses the full accrual method of accounting to prepare and present its annual departmental financial statements that are part of the departmental results reporting process. However, the spending authorities voted by Parliament remain on an expenditure basis.

## 2. Highlights of fiscal quarter and fiscal year to date (YTD) results

## **Quarter ending December 31 / Year to Date**

This section highlights the financial results for the fiscal year-to-date and the quarter ended December 31, 2020. It also provides explanations of variances compared with the same period for the previous year that exceed a materiality threshold of \$5 thousand for program expenditures and statutory votes. The ICO has been operating since July 12, 2019; as a result, variances resulting from prior year comparisons will not be fully representative.

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#### 2.1 Statement of authorities

The COVID-19 pandemic has had a significant effect on the ICO's budgetary authorities in the current fiscal year because the Main Estimates, typically granted by the end of June, were only approved by Parliament late in the third quarter. Because of the pandemic, Parliament sat for fewer sessions than normal in the spring, so there was limited time to study supply. As a result, the Standing Orders of the House of Commons were amended to extend the study period into the fall. Departments and agencies were granted nine twelfths of their Main Estimates or more based on cash requirements, to ensure continued operations until December.

The ICO received the remainder of its funding in this quarter and is now reporting on its full authorities for 2020–21.

The budgetary authorities available in 2019–20 were the unexpended authorities of the Office of the Communications Security Establishment Commissioner as at July 11, 2019. In accordance with the transitional provisions of the *Intelligence Commissioner Act*, "any money … unexpended is deemed, on that day, to be an amount appropriated to defray any expenditure of the office of the new Commissioner".

The variance in authorities results from the reduced authorities in 2019–20 available to the ICO.

#### 2.2 Statement of departmental budgetary expenditures by standard object

The year-to-date budgetary expenditures, as at December 31, 2020, have decreased by \$70 thousand (17%) compared to the same period in the previous year:

- Vote 1 expenditures decreased by \$122 thousand; and
- statutory payments increased by \$52 thousand.

For the fiscal quarter ended December 31, 2020, budgetary expenditures have decreased by \$155 thousand (29%) compared to the same period in the previous year:

- Vote 1 expenditures decreased by \$153 thousand; and
- statutory payments decreased by \$2 thousand
