## Statement Outlining Results, Risks and Significant Changes in Operations, Personnel and Program

#### 1. Introduction

#### 1.1 Background to the Quarterly Financial Report

As per the Directive on Accounting Standards, GC 4400, Departmental Quarterly Report, the Office of the Intelligence Commissioner (ICO) is submitting its quarterly report for the quarter ending June 30, 2021.

The report has been prepared by management as required by section 65.1 of the *Financial Administration Act* and in the form and manner prescribed by the Treasury Board. This quarterly financial report has not been subject to external audit or review.

#### 1.2 Authority, Mandate and Program

ICO is an independent oversight body. The mandate of the Intelligence Commissioner (IC) is set out in the *Intelligence Commissioner Act*. The IC is an integral part of the decision-making process for certain national security and intelligence activities before they can be conducted. The IC is responsible for performing quasi-judicial reviews of the conclusions of either the Minister of National Defence or the Minister of Public Safety and Emergency Preparedness, and, where applicable, the Director of the Canadian Security Intelligence Service. These conclusions are the basis on which certain authorizations are issued or determinations are made in relation to some activities to be conducted by either the Communications Security Establishment or Canadian Security Intelligence Service.

#### 1.3 Basis of Presentation

This quarterly report has been prepared by management using an expenditure basis of accounting. The accompanying Statement of Authorities includes the ICO's spending authorities as approved in the Main Estimates for the 2021–22 fiscal year. This quarterly report has been prepared using a special purpose financial reporting framework, designed to meet financial information needs with respect to the use of spending authorities.

The authority of Parliament is required before moneys can be spent by the Government. Approvals are given in the form of annually approved limits through appropriation acts or through legislation in the form of statutory spending authority for specific purposes.

When Parliament is dissolved for the purposes of a general election, section 30 of the *Financial Administration Act* authorizes the Governor General, under certain conditions, to issue a special warrant authorizing the Government to withdraw funds from the

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Consolidated Revenue Fund. A special warrant is deemed to be an appropriation for the fiscal year in which it is issued.

The ICO uses the full accrual method of accounting to prepare and present its annual departmental financial statements that are part of the departmental results reporting process. However, the spending authorities voted by Parliament remain on an expenditure basis.

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#### 2. Highlights of fiscal quarter and fiscal year to date (YTD) results

#### Quarter ending June 30 / Year-to-date

This section highlights the financial results for the fiscal year-to-date ended June 30, 2021. It also provides explanations of variances compared with the same period last year that exceed a materiality threshold of \$5 thousand for program expenditures and statutory votes.

#### 2.1 Statement of authorities

In 2021–22 the ICO received its full voted and statutory authorities by the end of June. In 2020–21 however, primarily due to the COVID-19, departments and agencies were granted nine twelfths of their Main Estimates by the end of June. This temporary reduction in available authorities in the previous year amounted to \$493 thousand.

The ICO sought and received additional funding to help ensure that the IC would have sufficient resources to effectively deliver on his legislative mandate. This permanent increase in authorities was \$394 thousand.

#### 2.2 Statement of departmental budgetary expenditures by standard object

For the fiscal quarter ended June 30, 2021, budgetary expenditures have increased by \$163 thousand (60%) compared to the same period in the previous year:

- Vote 1 expenditures increased by \$163 thousand; and
- statutory payments remained the same.
