Purpose and objectives of transfer payment program

The Regional Economic Growth through Innovation (REGI) Initiative builds on the objectives of the Innovation and Skills Plan. The goal of REGI is to provide streamlined, nationally coordinated, regionally tailored support for business productivity and scale-up, particularly for small and medium-sized enterprises (SMEs), women and Indigenous entrepreneurs, and other under-represented groups. REGI will assist in the enhancement of regional industrial and technology clusters and regional innovation ecosystems.

The program will provide assistance through two new program streams:

- Business Scale-up and Productivity Stream (BSP): Invest in and support businesses at various stages of development, including high-growth firms to accelerate their growth and assist them in scaling up, and enhance their productivity and competitiveness in both domestic and global markets.
- Regional Innovation Ecosystems Stream (RIE): Create, grow and nurture inclusive regional ecosystems that support business needs and foster an entrepreneurial environment conducive to innovation, growth and competitiveness.

The Women Entrepreneurship Strategy (WES) provides nationally coordinated, regionally tailored investments to help women entrepreneurs and support regional innovation ecosystems through two program streams:

- WES Ecosystem Fund: A five-year program to help nonprofit, third party organizations deliver support for women entrepreneurs and address gaps in the ecosystem.
- Pilot Contribution Program (Women Entrepreneurship Fund):
 A two-year program that invests directly in women-owned or women-led businesses to help them grow and reach new markets.

Contributions issued under REGI may be unconditionally or conditionally repayable, or non-repayable. Contributions issued under the WES are non-repayable only.

Section 1: Institutional GBA Plus Capacity

WD programs support businesses owned or majority-led by underrepresented groups, such as Indigenous peoples, women, youth, 2SLGBTQI+, persons with disabilities, newcomers to Canada and members of official language minority communities. Programming aims to increase participation of underrepresented groups in the economy by supporting businesses directly or through not-for-profit organizations by providing funding, business services, training and access to resources.

To enhance data collection and ensure consistency of gender and diversity data on all WD applicants, a diversity and inclusion section was added to all application forms. This allows WD to compile aggregate information for diverse groups on the ownership and/or leadership of the organizations applying to WD programs. From this data, WD could identify potential access issues, make evidence-based decisions, and monitor progress towards improved access to programs and services.

WD supports research and study of entrepreneurial data to identify gaps, and better understand unique challenges faced by certain under represented groups. This informs future program parameters and design.

WD commissioned The Centre for Innovation Studies to launch Global Entrepreneurship (GEM) studies across the West to better understand the unique challenges faced by women and youth in entrepreneurship. WD also invested in a GEM study on the COVID-19 pandemic's impact on entrepreneurship in Western Canada. In 2021-22, a renewed GEM study was initiated. Results and summary reports on women and youth in Western Canada as well as regional entrepreneurship in Saskatchewan and Manitoba, are expected in 2022-23.

Report 12 – Independent Auditor's Report: Protecting Canada's Food System

There is no dedicated chapter specific to the Canadian Seafood Stabilization Fund (CSSF) or to regional development agency (RDA) involvement. Report 12 is a comprehensive assessment encompassing multiple programs and departments. Findings, Recommendations and Responses for all programs are compiled in a single chapter.

WD did not provide a direct response to this audit, however department officials reviewed the joint response to the recommendations that was prepared by Agriculture and Agri-Food Canada (AAFC), the Department of Fisheries and Oceans (DFO), and Crown-Indigenous Relations and Northern Affairs Canada (CIRNAC).

WD and other regional development agencies were not directly implicated in the audit recommendations, which were directed at AAFC, DFO, and CIRNAC. WD officials noted at the time of the report's release:

- PacifiCan and PrairiesCan will cooperate with AAFC as needed, as the department leads in the completion of a national emergency preparedness and response plan.
- GBA+ and sustainability were assessed during the development and design phases of CSSF. RDAs will track and report against their regular suite of Departmental Results Framework Indicators, including GBA+ and sustainability measures.

Independent Auditor's Report: COVID-19 Pandemic Report 14 - Regional Relief and Recovery Fund (RRRF).

As part of a larger series of audits on the Government of Canada's response to the COVID-19 pandemic, the OAG audited the RRRF via three proxy regional development agencies (RDAs):

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FedDev, FedNor and WD. The audit focused on whether the selected RDAs designed, delivered, and managed the Regional Relief and Recovery Fund (RRRF) effectively and efficiently to support businesses and organizations through the pandemic. The OAG report concluded that the RRRF was successful in quickly providing support to thousands of businesses and organizations to ensure they remained viable.

The OAG made three recommendations for the Government of Canada in relation to the RRRF, which were focused on the themes of consistency, fairness, transparency and equity. These recommendations relate to the setting of targets for levels of support to under-represented groups, the adoption of practices to ensure programs are efficient, effective and fair, and the harmonization of processes to produce accurate results reporting.

The OAG audit was addressed in a formal Management Action Plan (MAP), and tabled with the House of Commons Standing Committee on Public Accounts' (PACP) on April 5, 2022. WD expects to complete responding actions by March 2023.
