

# Labour Market Bulletin

Manitoba

March 2022



This Labour Market Bulletin provides an analysis of Labour Force Survey results for the province of Manitoba, including the regions of Winnipeg, Northern Manitoba and Southern Manitoba.

## **OVERVIEW**

Employment grew 7,100 (+1.1%) in Manitoba, reaching 668,400 in the first quarter of 2022. Quarterly employment growth was due to a rise in both full-time (+2,300) and part-time employment (+4,700). This is the fifth consecutive quarter of employment growth for Manitoba. Overall, provincial employment was up 24,800 (+3.9%) compared to the first quarter of 2021. Employment increased in the public (+12,200) and private sector (+19,800) between the first quarters of 2021 and 2022, while the number of self-employed Manitobans was down 7,200.<sup>1</sup>




Many small businesses in Manitoba went into debt during the pandemic and by March 2022, only 28% of businesses had returned to normal pre-pandemic sales levels. The Government of Manitoba lifted all remaining public health orders on March 15, 2022 to allow businesses to operate at full capacity without any restrictions. However, businesses in Manitoba are now experiencing new challenges as inflation leads to higher costs and cuts into their bottom line. Prices have risen sharply for gasoline and food. In fact, Canada's annual inflation rate reached 5.7% in February, the highest it has been since 1991.


Manitoba's unemployment rate dropped 0.3 percentage points to 5.0% in the first quarter of 2022 — remaining below the national average of 5.8%. The provincial labour force also grew 5,600 this quarter, outpacing working age population growth and increasing the participation rate to 66.6%. All employment indicators in Manitoba are showing positive change this quarter, signaling another step towards a labour market recovery from the effects the COVID-19 pandemic.

The unemployment rate for young women in Manitoba decreased in the first quarter of 2022, down 1.6 percentage points to 6.3%. A substantial drop also occurred in young women's unemployment rate on an annual basis (-9.5 percentage points). While the unemployment rate for young men remains the highest among all demographic groups (11.2%), this rate has been trending down (-5.9 percentage points year-over-year).

Youth were disproportionately impacted by public health measures meant to limit the spread of COVID-19. Measures restricting business activities for retail trade and accommodation and food services had a direct impact on jobs often held by youth. Looking ahead, youth employment growth and stability should continue to improve now that the Province has lifted all public health restrictions.

#### **EMPLOYMENT BY INDUSTRY**

Employment growth in Manitoba's **services-producing sector** (+8,400) outpaced losses in the **goods-producing sector** (-1,400) in the first quarter of 2022. Growth in the services-producing sector was led by employment gains in **business, building and other support services** (+2,800), **wholesale and retail trade** (+2,300), and **accommodation and food services** (+2,000). Meanwhile, employment losses in **agriculture** (-1,200) and **manufacturing** (-1,000) contributed to quarterly job losses in the goods-producing sector.

Employment in Manitoba's **construction** sector increased 900 (+1.9%) in the first quarter of 2022. According to BuildForce Canada, employment in this sector will continue to grow. Sustained new-home construction, increased commercial and institutional building projects, and wastewater projects located throughout the province will bolster construction activity in Manitoba throughout the year.

Focus Equities Inc. will begin construction of the CentrePort Canada Rail Park in Winnipeg in the spring of 2022.<sup>9</sup> The new 665 acre Rail Park will be located within CentrePort's inland port, allowing businesses to transfer and transport goods between road and rail with close access to Winnipeg's James Armstrong International Airport.<sup>10</sup> The project is expected to create about 5,000 jobs during the building phase, which is expected to take up to 20 years<sup>11</sup>. The Rail Park is also anticipated to attract new businesses and generate approximately \$3 billion in economic activity.<sup>12,13</sup>

Employment in Manitoba's **manufacturing** sector decreased 1.9% between the first quarter of 2021 and 2022. Manufacturing is a significant employer in Manitoba, representing almost 10% of all employment in the province. While aerospace manufacturing took a downturn during the pandemic due to its close link to travel services, other manufacturing sub-sectors such as food and machinery manufacturing increased production. Manitoba's smaller furniture manufacturing sub-sector also increased over the last year. This uptick is due in part to increased demand for domestic products since the Government of Canada imposed anti-dumping and countervailing duties on certain furniture products originating from China and Vietnam. These duties significantly increased the resale value of furniture products originating from these countries, making locally produced furniture more competitive.

Manitoba-based Palliser furniture is expanding their Winnipeg operations to meet increased demand, adding a 12,000 square-metre facility to their existing upholstery manufacturing plant. The company will increase their Winnipeg workforce by 300 people as part of this expansion.

Year-over-year, employment in **resource extraction** (forestry, fishing, mining, quarrying, oil and gas) decreased 13.2% (-500), primarily due to job losses in the mining sector. In fact, mining employment in Manitoba has trended downwards since 2017. Operational changes for mines located in Thompson and Flin Flon are at the root of these employment losses. Vale eliminated approximately 550 positions at their Thompson operations between 2017 and 2020HudBay is preparing to close their zinc plant in Flin Flon at the end of May 2022 and the 777 mine in mid-June. As the Flin Flon mine and adjoining facilities prepare to close, approximately 275 workers will leave the company. For those staying with Hudbay, many will be relocated to Snow Lake where the majority of their remaining 800 Manitoba employees will be working.

While Manitoba has a relatively small mining sector, its economic impact is significant for many of its northern communities. In 2021, over 40% of Manitoba's mining sector employment was located in the Parklands and Northern economic region. According to Census 2016, mining and quarrying combined with mining support activities contributed over 32% of all employment income in Thompson, and over 38% in Flin Flon.<sup>18</sup>

Turning to the services-producing sector, employment in **healthcare and social assistance** grew both on a quarterly (+400) and on an annual basis (+2,000). Nursing shortages, ICU capacity issues, and ambulance personnel shortages have significantly impacted this sector throughout the COVID-19 pandemic. To help address the chronic labour shortage for healthcare professionals, the Government of Manitoba implemented a multi-year plan to add close to 400 nurse training seats in the province. The plan includes increased seats for students to qualify as licenced practical nurses, registered nurses, and registered psychiatric nurses. <sup>19</sup> To increase educational accessibility for those living in rural areas, the Assiniboine Community College will begin offering its Practical Nursing diploma program through rural rotating sites in Otterburne, Arborg, and Morden. The Otterburne session will be held at Providence University College starting in September. <sup>20</sup>

The COVID-19 pandemic has also shown the importance of providing culturally sensitive and community-based healthcare services for Indigenous people, underscoring the need to have more healthcare training opportunities available for First Nations people living on reserve.<sup>21</sup> Over the last two years, the Assembly of Manitoba Chiefs pandemic response team worked with the Province, the First Nations Health and Social Secretariat, and First Nations communities to provide information and services to Indigenous people.<sup>22</sup> Even with these supports in place, Manitoba had the most on reserve COVID-19 infections of any region in Canada (22,641).<sup>23</sup>



#### **REGIONAL ANALYSIS**

Employment grew in four of Manitoba's six economic regions between the first quarter of 2021 and 2022 with **Interlake** (+8.8%) posting the largest percentage increase year-over-year. The **Winnipeg** region had the greatest number of total job gains (+20,200) for this period while its unemployment rate decreased 2.7 percentage points to 5.3% while still remaining the highest unemployment rate of any Manitoba region.

While the **Winnipeg** labour market is on its way to a recovery from the pandemic, downtown businesses are still affected by reduced foot traffic due in part to a switch to remote work. In an effort to support business recovery, the Government of Canada is providing over \$2.5 million in funding for nine projects in downtown Winnipeg.<sup>24</sup>

Local employment in professional, scientific and technical services will also be bolstered by growth in the tech sector. Video game publisher and developer, Ubisoft, will spend \$139 million over eight years to expand its Winnipeg operations. The company expects to hire an additional 200 staff as part of the expansion.<sup>25</sup>

Meanwhile, Winnipeg's food services sector will benefit from a new initiative to help recruit staff. The Manitoba Restaurant & Foodservices Association (MRFA) is offering a Restaurant Recruitment Grant to help offset costs associated with restaurant staff recruitment and hiring.<sup>26</sup> Job vacancies in food services and drinking places reached 2,785 in the fourth quarter of 2021, up over 380% from the fourth quarter of 2020 when there were only 575 job vacancies in this industry in Manitoba.<sup>27</sup>



Employment decreased 2.7% (-1,200) in the **South Central and North Central** region between the first quarters of 2021 and 2022. The Manitoba Government and General Employees Union (MGEU) recently released a report highlighting public sector job losses in the North Central community of Portage la Prairie while underscoring the impact of these losses on the local economy. <sup>28</sup> Approximately 456 public sector jobs have recently left or will soon be leaving Portage la Prairie due to provincial budget cuts. The five organizations reducing their workforce are the Manitoba Development Centre (-336), the Aggassiz Youth Centre (-102), Red River College (-9), Crown



Lands and Property Agency (-4), and the Addictions Foundation of Manitoba (-5). <sup>29</sup> In total, these job losses will eliminate approximately \$27.6 million in wages and salaries for the community of Portage la Prairie. <sup>30</sup>

As part of these cuts, the Agassiz Youth Centre will completely shut down on July 22. However, the Government of Manitoba will be working with affected employees to find them alternate work in other correctional facilities in the province. <sup>31</sup> Meanwhile, new measures are being put in place to provide more justice measures in the **Northern** region of Manitoba. While the majority of youth in provincial custody are from northern Manitoba, there are currently no correctional facilities for youth in this region. The Government of Manitoba is providing \$2 million to Manitoba Keewatinowi Okimakanak (MKO) Inc. to implement and operate a youth community healing lodge in Thompson, <sup>32</sup> which will eventually become a one-stop-shop for youth skills training. <sup>33</sup>
