OPERATIONS UNDER THE ACT

Following the election of the Liberal Party of Canada on February 18, 1980, a new Cabinet was named on March 3, 1980. Having been appointed Minister of Industry, Trade and Commerce, the Honourable Herb Gray, P.C., M.P., also became Minister responsible for the administration of the Foreign Investment Review Act. Mr. Gray has an intimate knowledge of the Act; he headed the group established in 1970 to analyse foreign investment in Canada and recommend appropriate policy measures to the government of the day. The group's 1972 report, Foreign Direct Investment in Canada - or, as it is commonly known, the Gray Report - led to the enactment of the Foreign Investment Review Act and to the creation of the Foreign Investment Review Agency.

The Foreign Investment Review Act requires the Government to review two types of foreign investment: (1) most acquisitions of control by non-Canadians of existing businesses in Canada; and (2) the establishment of new businesses in Canada by non-Canadians who either do not already have a business in Canada or do not have a business in Canada to which the new business is or would be related.

CASELOAD

The number of applications received by the Agency in 1979-80 increased to 849 from 818 in the previous year. Of the 784 cases certified as reviewable 616, or over 78 percent, involved Canadian businesses with gross assets or planned investment of less than \$2 million and 692, or over 88 percent, involved fewer than 100 employees.

The following sections provide a detailed description of acquisition and new-business cases and conclude with a discussion of the benefits to Canada of investments that were allowed.

Acquisitions (Tables I to XI)

While the number of applications to acquire Canadian businesses received in 1979-80 decreased to 397 from 416 in the preceding year, the number of applications actually certified as reviewable rose slightly from 373 to 380. Of these, 46 were uncertified applications carried forward from 1978-79. At year-end, 25 applications remained to be certified, including 4 incomplete notices for which additional information had been requested but not yet received as at March 31, 1980.

The number of reviewable small-business acquisition cases (those involving acquisitions of businesses with assets of less than \$2 million and less than 100 employees) increased slightly in 1979-80, whereas the number of larger cases showed a small decrease. Most of the increase in small-business cases was due to an increase in the number of acquisitions involving Canadian-controlled businesses. Acquisition of larger Canadian-controlled businesses remained almost unchanged. The number of cases involving foreign takeovers of Canadian businesses which were already foreign-controlled decreased, but they still represented a slight majority of all acquisition

cases and a considerable majority of large-business acquisition cases. The number of indirect acquisitions, those resulting from an acquisition of control of the foreign parent company, decreased from 117 in 1978-79 to 111 in 1979-80. None of these changes is considered to be of statistical significance.

The total value of acquiree assets in 1979-80 amounted to about \$3.5 billion compared to \$5.2 billion in 1978-79. Consequently the average case in 1979-80 involved assets of only slightly more than \$9 million, which was considerably below the preceding year's \$14 million average. The decrease is attributable to a sharp fall in the asset value of acquirees, particularly Canadian-controlled acquirees in the top asset range: that is, those acquirees whose assets are valued at \$25 million or over. The average asset value of Canadian acquirees in this category fell from nearly \$300 million to \$42 million.

The distribution of cases by industrial sector was about the same in 1979-80 as in 1978-79 with services heading the list (48 percent of the cases), followed by manufacturing (45 percent) and the primary (resource) sector (7 percent). This is only the second time that the service sector has had the largest share of acquisition cases, a distinction usually claimed by the manufacturing sector. In absolute terms, the number of cases increased only in the service sector, whereas it decreased slightly in the manufacturing and primary sectors. Over half (54 percent) of the manufacturing cases were related to four industries: metal fabricating, machinery, electrical products and chemical products. The average asset value of primary sector cases decreased about 61 percent to \$15.5 million in 1979-80 from \$39.3 million in 1978-79. Even so, the 1979-80 figure was still substantially higher than it had been in 1977-78. There was also a considerable decrease, from \$13.7 million to \$8.2 million, in the average asset value of service sector cases. The average asset value of manufacturing cases remained virtually unchanged at about \$9.5 million.

The provincial distribution of acquisition cases was almost identical to that of the preceding year with Ontario accounting for well over 50 percent of the cases, followed by Quebec (16 percent), Alberta (10 percent) and British Columbia (9 percent). Manitoba, Saskatchewan, the Atlantic provinces and Territories together accounted for 5 percent. There was, however, a considerable shift in the provincial distribution according to acquiree asset values among the leading provinces. Two showed significant increases, Ontario (from 49 to 64 percent) and British Columbia (from 3 to 9 percent), and two recorded decreases, Alberta (from 23 to 9 percent) and Quebec (from 23 to 12 percent). It should be noted, however, that the 1978-79 distribution was considerably influenced by a very small number of unusually large cases involving Quebec and Alberta.

For the third consecutive year the U.S. share of the number of acquisition cases decreased; from 70 percent in 1977-78, it fell to 65 percent in 1978-79 and to 60 percent in 1979-80. For the same years Western Europe's share rose from 27 to 30 and finally to 35 percent. The most prominent European sources of investment in Canada were the United Kingdom and West Germany, both of which recorded increases in applications in 1979-80. Increases were also recorded for France, the Netherlands and Sweden. At 61 percent, the U.S. share of the value of assets acquired regained some of

the ground it had lost in 1977-78 and 1978-79, whereas that of Europe fell back to its 1977-78 level of approximately 37 percent. Most U.S. applications involved Ontario (61 percent), Quebec (16 percent), Alberta (10 percent) and British Columbia (9 percent). The distribution of European applications was similar, but with slightly more of the cases going to Quebec and Western Canada. As in the preceding year, most applications from the U.S.A. were in the manufacturing sector (49 percent, whereas most European applications (54 percent) were related to the service sector.

Of the 387 resolved acquisition cases, 331 were allowed, 29 were disallowed and 27 were withdrawn by the applicant prior to a decision being made by Governor in Council.

New businesses (Tables XIV to XXI)

During the year the Agency received 452 applications for the establishment of new and unrelated businesses, an increase of 50 compared to 1978-1979. Of these 452 applications, together with 89 uncertified cases carried over from the preceding year, 404 were certified as reviewable. At year-end, 78 applications had not yet been certified, 30 of which involved small businesses for which additional information had been requested but not yet received as at March 31, 1980.

As in previous years, the great majority of cases (94 percent) involved small businesses with an initial investment of less than \$2 million. Furthermore, almost 79 percent of the applications called for investments of less than \$500,000, the average investment in this group amounting to only \$86,000. Though the number of small-business cases increased, the total value of planned investment decreased from \$355 million in 1978-79 to \$279.5 million in 1979-80, principally because of the smaller number and asset size of cases involving planned investment of more than \$10 million. This change particularly affected the distribution of planned investment by province.

The industrial distribution of cases changed very little in 1979-80 with services (69 percent) having the largest share, followed by manufacturing (25 percent) and the primary (resource) sector (6 percent). Of the three major sectors, only services experienced a substantial increase in cases, most of which was attributable to wholesale and retail trade, and community, business and personal services. There was no significant difference by area of origin. In manufacturing, the following five industries accounted for over half the cases: metal fabricating, machinery, electrical products, food and beverages, and rubber and plastic products.

The provincial distribution of new-business cases remained virtually unchanged with Ontario involved in the majority of cases (60 percent), followed by Quebec (15 percent), British Columbia (10 percent) and Alberta (9 percent). The remaining 5 percent of cases were distributed among the rest of the provinces. Ontario also had the largest share of planned investment (38 percent), followed closely by Alberta (32 percent). In addition, Quebec (17 percent) and British Columbia (8 percent) had sizeable shares of planned investment. Alberta's share is largely explained by the size of certain energy resource investments.

As in previous years, the United States was the single most important source of applications (54 percent). Europe accounted for 35 percent of the applications and "other areas", notably Japan, accounted for about 11 percent. Despite its smaller share of applications, Europe accounted for a larger proportion (41 percent) of the total planned investment than the United States (35 percent). It is also interesting to note that Australia, with only three applications, accounted for 10 percent of the value of planned investment.

Most U.S. applications related to Ontario (64 percent), British Columbia (12 percent), Alberta (11 percent) and Quebec (9 percent). The provincial distribution of European cases was somewhat different: Ontario drew only 55 percent of the applications, Quebec 24 percent, Alberta 9 percent and British Columbia 6 percent.

Of the 410 applications resolved, 356 were allowed (87 percent), 29 were disallowed (7 percent) and 25 were withdrawn by the applicant prior to a decision being made (6 percent). The allowance rate by country of control was about the same as in 1978-79 and varied little from region to region.

Significant benefit

Only those cases can be allowed which, in the opinion of the Government, offer significant benefits to Canada according to the factors set out in the Act. Some of the perceived benefits are illustrated in examples of allowed cases which were resolved in 1979-80. They show that the weight given to each factor varies from case to case according to the nature of the proposal, the sector in which the investment is to occur, the region in which it is to be made, the kinds of undertakings offered by the applicant and other factors and circumstances unique to each case.

Primary sector

Particular emphasis has been placed on Canadian participation in equity and management and the upgrading of resources where economically feasible.

One example of a primary sector case was the proposed acquisition by Brinco Limited of Conuco Limited of Calgary, a company engaged in the exploration for and the development and production of oil and gas. Brinco is controlled by Thornwood Investments Limited, 80 percent of which is owned by Rio Tinto-Zinc Corporation of the United Kingdom and 20 percent by Bethlehem Steel Corporation of the United States. At the time the public announcement of allowance of this proposal was made, it was explained that Brinco would bring significantly greater financial resources to bear on the exploration and development of Conuco's oil and gas properties. Another important condition was the effect of the transaction in strengthening Canadian participation in the ownership of Canadian resources. The transaction itself immediately increased Canadian ownership of Brinco from 8 to 24 percent and Thornwood undertook to take all the necessary steps within its power to increase Canadian ownership of Brinco to 51 percent by 1984.

Manufacturing

Research and development, exports and technological improvement all rank high in the criteria for manufacturing cases.

BASF America Corporation's acquisition of Dow Badische Canada Ltd., a foreign-controlled business engaged in the production of nylon polymer, was accompanied by commitments to improve the viability of the latter by providing the opportunity for it to concentrate its efforts on manufacturing and marketing specialized nylon yarn. Considerable investments were to be made in unique and highly productive machinery. BASF also undertook to make further capital expenditures to improve the competitiveness of Dow Badische and to fund its research and development program at no less than the current level.

Another case worth noting was the acquisition by Phillips Cables Limited of the power cable business of Northern Telecom and of the Wire and Cable Division of ITT Industries of Canada Limited, a subsidiary of the International Telephone and Telegraph Corporation. Phillips Cables first proposal was disallowed on December 19, 1979 and it was only after the applicant substantially modified its proposal that the Government concluded that significant benefit to Canada was likely to result. In addition to the cost of relocating NT Cable's machinery and equipment from Lachine (Quebec) to the ITT Cable plant in St-Jerome, Phillips undertook to spend \$5 million for new equipment and capital improvements. These expenditures are expected to increase Phillip's volume of sales substantially, resulting in the creation of some 150 jobs over the next 5 years. In addition, Phillips undertook to double the value of its exports and replace, with Canadian-made goods, approximately \$1 million worth of products which ITT Cable has been importing annually. Phillips also undertook to spend over \$1 million a year on R&D, which is more than double current R&D expenditures. Phillips promised to offer continued employment to all of ITT's employees; Northern Telecom retained responsibility for the employees of its cable business. One important consideration in favour of allowance was the decision which Northern Telecom had already taken to withdraw from the electrical building wire and cable business, irrespective of the Government's decision. This, coupled with the surplus capacity which existed in that industry, led the Government to the view that the Phillips proposal would provide for a more orderly restructuring of the electrical wire and cable industry in Canada than would otherwise occur.

A third manufacturing case of considerable interest was the proposal by Amer Sports International Inc., a subsidiary of Amer-YHTYMA of Finland, to acquire Novasport Ltée of Drummondville (Quebec), which is controlled by Action Traders Inc. of Toronto and is a holding company for Industries du Hockey Canadien (1975) Ltée and of Sherbrooke Sports. Canadien and Sherbrooke manufacture and market hockey sticks and protective hockey equipment under the brand-name "Canadien". Amer manufactures the same kind of product and markets it under the brand name "Koho".

When the Government announced its decision to allow this proposal, it pointed to the beneficial impact the proposal was expected to have in terms of increased capital investment, employment, exports, import replacement, Canadian sourcing and increased productivity and industrial efficiency. Amer undertook to make capital expenditures of about \$500,000 by 1981 to increase

the production capacities of Canadien and Sherbrooke. The applicant also committed itself to increase substantially the production of "Canadien" brand hockey sticks and equipment, primarily for export markets. Amer undertook to initiate second working shifts for the production of "Koho" hockey sticks and equipment so that, by 1984 at the latest, all "Koho" hockey sticks and equipment marketed in North America will be produced in Canada. Canadien and Sherbrooke's total exports are expected to increase several-fold beyond their current level of \$1.7 million. Subject to specified sales levels, Amer was to create approximately 200 jobs by 1982. A value equivalent to approximately 1.5 percent of Canadien and Sherbrooke's sales of Canadian-made products was to be spent each year on research and development. Amer undertook to retain in Canada all of Canadien's proprietary rights, including patents, processes and trademarks. All of the officers and 60 percent of the directors of Amer's subsidiaries were to be Canadian residents. Amer also undertook, subject to the outcome of a feasibility study, to use Canadien as a source of processed hardwood for export to Finland.

Services

Of necessity, the weight given to the various factors in assessing investments in this sector varies widely because of the great diversity of service activities. Usually Canadian sourcing, significant Canadian participation in management and ownership and, where relevant, research and development are all important considerations.

The small size of the average service-sector case usually limits the potential range and scope of benefits, but there are some exceptions. One such case was the proposal by Avco Canadian Engineering Limited, a wholly-owned subsidiary of Avco Corporation of the United States. The proposed new business, to be located in Brampton (Ontario), was to perform mechanical design work for the aerospace, transportation, marine and farm equipment industries, as well as the design of jigs and tools for industry in general.

When the Government announced its decision to allow this proposal, it pointed out the beneficial impact the proposal was expected to have in terms of job creation, new investment, use of Canadian parts and services, additional exports, Canadian participation, enhanced technological development and innovation. Among other things, Avco undertook to establish, within 60 days of allowance of the proposal, a manpower plan with the appropriate Canada Employment Centre. The significance of this undertaking is that it will ensure maximum opportunities for Canadians who are not now working in the aerospace industry, but who would like to be. Another undertaking, which has wide-ranging implications, is that Avco will subcontract to Canadian manufacturers 50 percent of the manufacturing activities which will result from the R & D activities of the new business. A third published undertaking concerns Canadian equity participation in the new business. Subject to certain specified conditions, Avco has undertaken to sell, within five years of allowance of the proposal, a significant portion of its equity ownership of the business to Canadian residents.

The examples cited provide only a glimpse of the range and value of the benefits associated with allowed cases. All proposed investments must be compatible with industrial and economic policies of the Government of Canada as well as those of the provincial government(s) concerned. Increased employment, new investment and increased resource processing or use of Canadian parts and services are among the most common benefits. For the full list of benefits, readers should refer to the resolved case lists in Appendices B and C of this report.

OPINIONS

Two types of opinions are provided to foreign investors: Firstly, subsection 4(1) of the Act authorizes the Minister to give opinions as to whether or not an investor is a non-eligible person and as to whether or not a new or acquired business is related to a non-eligible person's existing business in Canada; secondly, the Agency gives opinions, under certain circumstances, on whether or not a proposed or actual investment is reviewable under the Act. Ministerial opinions are formally binding on the Minister for a period of two years, provided that all material facts were disclosed at the time the application was made and that these facts remained substantially unchanged. Agency opinions are informal and are not binding on the Minister.

In 1979-80, 15 Ministerial opinions were given to the effect that applicants were not non-eligible persons (Appendix D). In addition, 9 applicants withdrew their applications when it became apparent that a favourable opinion could not be given. Of the 15 opinions on eligibility, 4 were first-time opinions and 11 were renewals of earlier opinions, following the expiry of the two-year period. The Minister also gave 6 opinions on "relatedness", all favourable. Four applicants for relatedness opinions withdrew their applications when it became apparent that the proposed new business would not be considered related to an existing Canadian business carried on by the same applicant.

The volume of Agency opinions on reviewability continued to increase in 1979-80. As in past years, this increase is attributable in great part to the fact that investors are more than ever aware of the usefulness of informal contacts with the Agency.

SURVEILLANCE

The Foreign Investment Review Act empowers the Minister to require that the prescribed notice be filed when a non-Canadian proposed to make or has made an investment which is subject to review and has failed to file notice.

In 1979-80 extensive investigations of reports from the news media and of unsolicited information from individuals and companies were undertaken concerning proposed or actual acquisitions of Canadian business enterprises and the establishment of new businesses in Canada where no notice has been filed. These investigations led directly to the filing of 60 acquisition and new-business notices.

ENFORCEMENT

The number of cases monitored for compliance rose sharply from 851 in 1978-79 to 1,338 in 1979-80. Most investors by far are fulfilling their commitments. In a few cases changed economic circumstances made it necessary to renegotiate undertakings and to obtain new undertakings to replace original ones.

LEGAL PROCEEDINGS

The Foreign Investment Review Act authorizes the Minister to initiate legal proceedings in any case where the investor fails to file notice as required by the Act or to comply with the terms and conditions of his investment, as set out in his application or in the plans and undertakings.

In 1979-80, the Minister initiated 2 injunctions and 1 originating notice of motion in connection with the acquisition of the Canadian portion of the Ambassador Bridge by Central Cartage Co. and Fallbridge Holdings.

Following disallowance by the Governor in Council of the indirect acquisition of Irwin Dorsey Limited by Dow Jones & Company Inc., discussions were held with Dow Jones, which was contesting the jurisdiction of the Agency in this transaction, concerning an agreed statement of facts to be placed before the Federal Court. On June 10, 1980, the Federal Court ruled that the Foreign Investment Review Act applied to this transaction.

ADMINISTRATION

For fiscal year 1979-80, the Agency received a budgetary allotment of \$3,779,000 and 116 person-years. The person-year allotment, however, was reduced during the year to 114 as a result of the Government's restraint program as announced in June 1979. Actual expenditure was \$3,507,710 and 108 person-years were utilized.

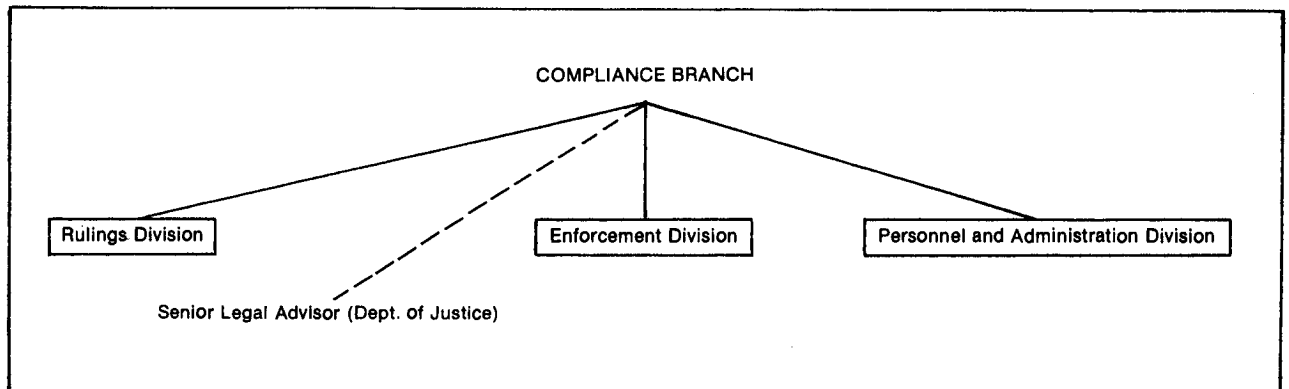
Of the original 116 person-years allotted to the Agency, 51 were designated as bilingual. At March 31, 1980, 46 of the 109 members of the staff were bilingual.

ORGANIZATION OF THE AGENCY

The Foreign Investment Review Agency, whose sole responsibility is to advise and assist the Minister responsible for the administration of the Act, has three Branches: Compliance Branch, Assessment Branch and Research and Analysis Branch. The functions and responsibilities of the branches are described below.

Compliance Branch

The Compliance Branch is responsible for the legal, enforcement and general administrative functions of the Agency.



The Rulings Division receives notices from investors and determines whether or not the proposed investments are reviewable under the Act. It is responsible for responding to investors who seek advice on the applicability of the Act to their proposed investments and on matters related to the administration of the Act. To this end, Rulings Division provides Agency opinions on reviewability and formulates Ministerial opinions on eligibility and relatedness in response to written requests from investors.

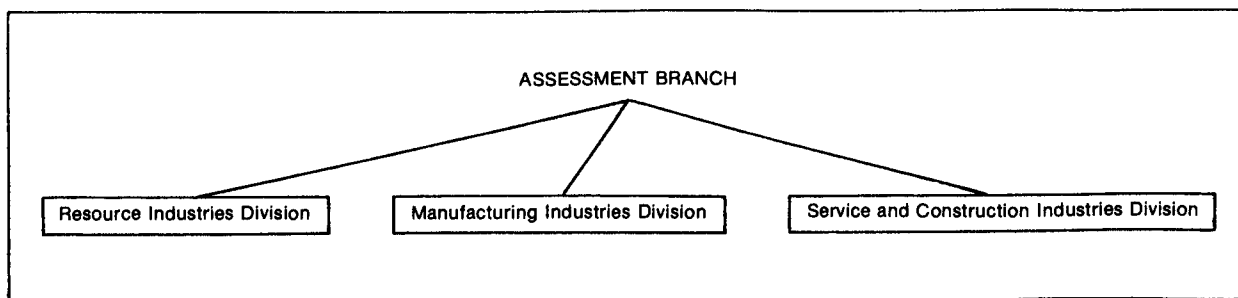
The Enforcement Division regularly monitors the implementation of plans and undertakings made by investors whose applications are allowed. Most undertakings cover an investor's performance over a number of years and require monitoring for a commensurate period of time. Because the number of new commitments associated with investments allowed in each year still substantially exceeds the number which expire in that year through total and final fulfillment, the monitoring activity has increased and continues to do so. The Act authorizes the Minister to initiate legal proceedings in any case where the investor fails to comply with the terms and conditions of his investment, as set out in his plans and undertakings.

The Compliance Branch is advised and assisted by the Senior Legal Advisor, assigned by the Department of Justice. In addition to providing general counsel and advice, the Senior Legal Advisor is the official representative of the Department of Justice in matters relating to the administration of the Foreign Investment Review Act, specifically its interpretation and applicability.

The Personnel and Administration Division, as its name implies, is responsible for co-ordinating the administration of the Agency. It is also responsible for implementing various government personnel and administration policies such as recent restraint programs and the official languages program.

Assessment Branch

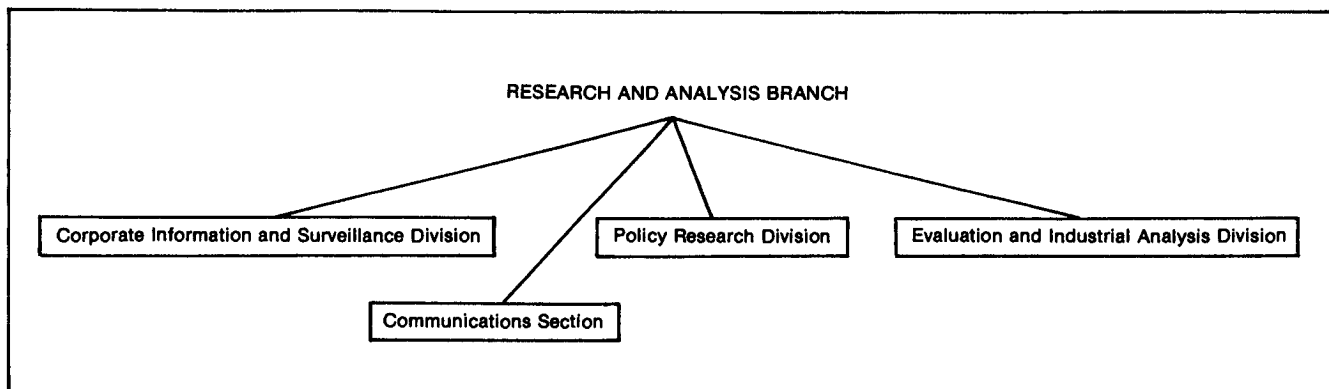
This branch, which is at the heart of the Agency's operations, analyses investment proposals against the criteria for the assessment of benefit to Canada. It has three divisions, each carrying out the same functions in relation to one of the three major sectors of the economy, namely: Construction and Services; Manufacturing Industries; and Resource Industries.



In all three divisions the analysis is based primarily on information provided by the investor in his notice or further information on companies and sectors provided by interested federal departments and agencies. In addition, the Branch maintains direct contact with provincial governments in order to determine how investment proposals relate to their industrial and economic policy objectives and to obtain their views on the proposals. Following this analysis, the Branch advises the Minister and assists him in his own assessment of the proposals. The sections in this report on the caseload and significant benefits provide an excellent insight into the work of the Assessment Branch.

Research and Analysis Branch

The Research and Analysis Branch is responsible primarily for research and analysis in support of Agency operations and the development of government policy related to foreign investment. It reviews results achieved through the administration of the Act and helps to develop new approaches to improve the Act's effectiveness.



The Corporate Information and Surveillance Division investigates reports from the news media and unsolicited information from individuals and companies concerning acquisitions of Canadian businesses or the establishment of new businesses with a view to ensuring that the requirements of the Act are met and notices of reviewable transactions are filed with the Agency. In addition to its investigative functions, the Division provides a key information service by maintaining a comprehensive data base on all investment proposals which come before the Agency. This data base is the cornerstone for the Agency's information program, including publications and responses to Parliament and the public and private sectors. It also underlies operational and administrative decisions made by senior management and is the basis for a variety of research projects undertaken within and outside the Agency. Furthermore, the Division maintains a fairly comprehensive information network on Canadian and foreign companies in support of the surveillance and assessment functions of the Agency.

The Policy Research Division maintains an information base on a number of areas, including the following: federal, provincial and foreign government policies on foreign investment; federal and provincial industrial policies; and international investment flows and balance of payments. Other information functions include responding to questions from Parliament and the general public, drafting Ministerial responses, preparing and giving briefings on FIRA for a variety of Canadian and foreign groups and receiving visitors at the Agency who want information on the Agency and the Act. Policy research is the centre of the Division's work and, to this end, it participates in the federal interdepartmental Committee on International Investment Policies, contributes to the development of federal policies related to foreign investment, reviews legislation, such as the Bank Act, that can have an impact on foreign investment and participates in the work of the Committee on International Investment and Multinational Enterprises of the Organization for Economic Co-operation and Development. The Division also carries out a wide range of research projects. In 1979-80, these projects covered issues such as

multinational enterprises, trends in foreign direct investment in Canada, investment in Canada's service sector and the determinants of foreign direct investment.

The Evaluation and Industrial Analysis Division carries out analysis in support of the assessment and enforcement functions of the Agency. Equally important is the advice it provides in the determination of whether or not proposed acquired or new businesses would be related to the existing businesses of applicants. In 1979-80, the Division did 116 industry profiles for the Assessment Branch and 10 for the Compliance Branch, specifically in support of its enforcement role. The Division provided economic information in response to 64 enquiries on relatedness, as a complement to the legal considerations involved.

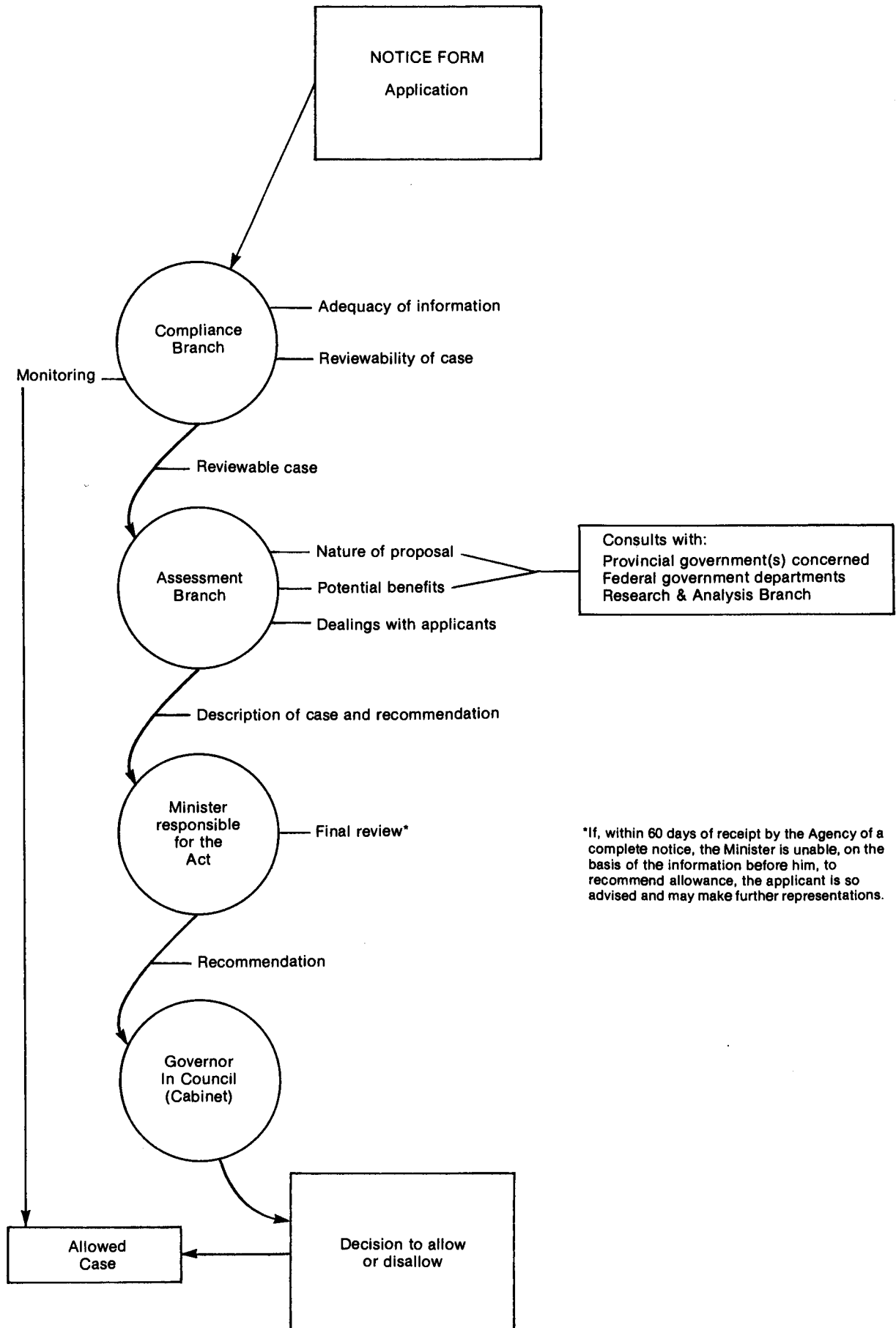
The extensive research and analysis work performed in the Branch generates a considerable amount of useful information which the Agency is anxious to communicate. The role of publishing this information is carried out by the Branch's Communications Section, principally by means of a series of working papers and the publication of a biannual magazine on investment conditions in Canada. In 1979-80 a quarterly report was initiated to provide more up-to-date information, at regular intervals, on the activities of the Agency.

REVIEW PROCESS

As soon as a notice outlining an investment proposal is received by the Foreign Investment Review Agency, it is scrutinized by the Compliance Branch to determine whether or not the proposal is reviewable and whether the notice contains the information prescribed by the Foreign Investment Review Regulations. If the proposal is deemed reviewable, it is passed on to the Assessment Branch for evaluation based on the benefit criteria outlined in the Act. Frequently, during this stage, information additional to that contained in the notice is sought through contacts with the applicant and consultations with appropriate federal departments. The notice is also circulated to the province or provinces significantly affected by the proposal for their views and comments. Once all the necessary information has been assembled the case is then referred to the Minister, together with an assessment by the Agency of the perceived effects of the investment by reference to the factors prescribed in subsection 2(2) of the Act. If the Minister concludes that the investment is likely to result in significant benefit to Canada he must make a recommendation to the Governor in Council that the investment be allowed. If not, he must so inform the Agency, which then informs the applicant accordingly. The applicant then has the opportunity to make further representations. When those representations are completed the case is referred to the Minister a second time for a final decision as to what his recommendation will be.

Below is an illustration of the review process and the role played by the different branches of the Agency.

*If, within 60 days of receipt by the Agency of a complete notice, the Minister is unable, on the basis of the information before him, to recommend allowance, the applicant is so advised and may make further representations.

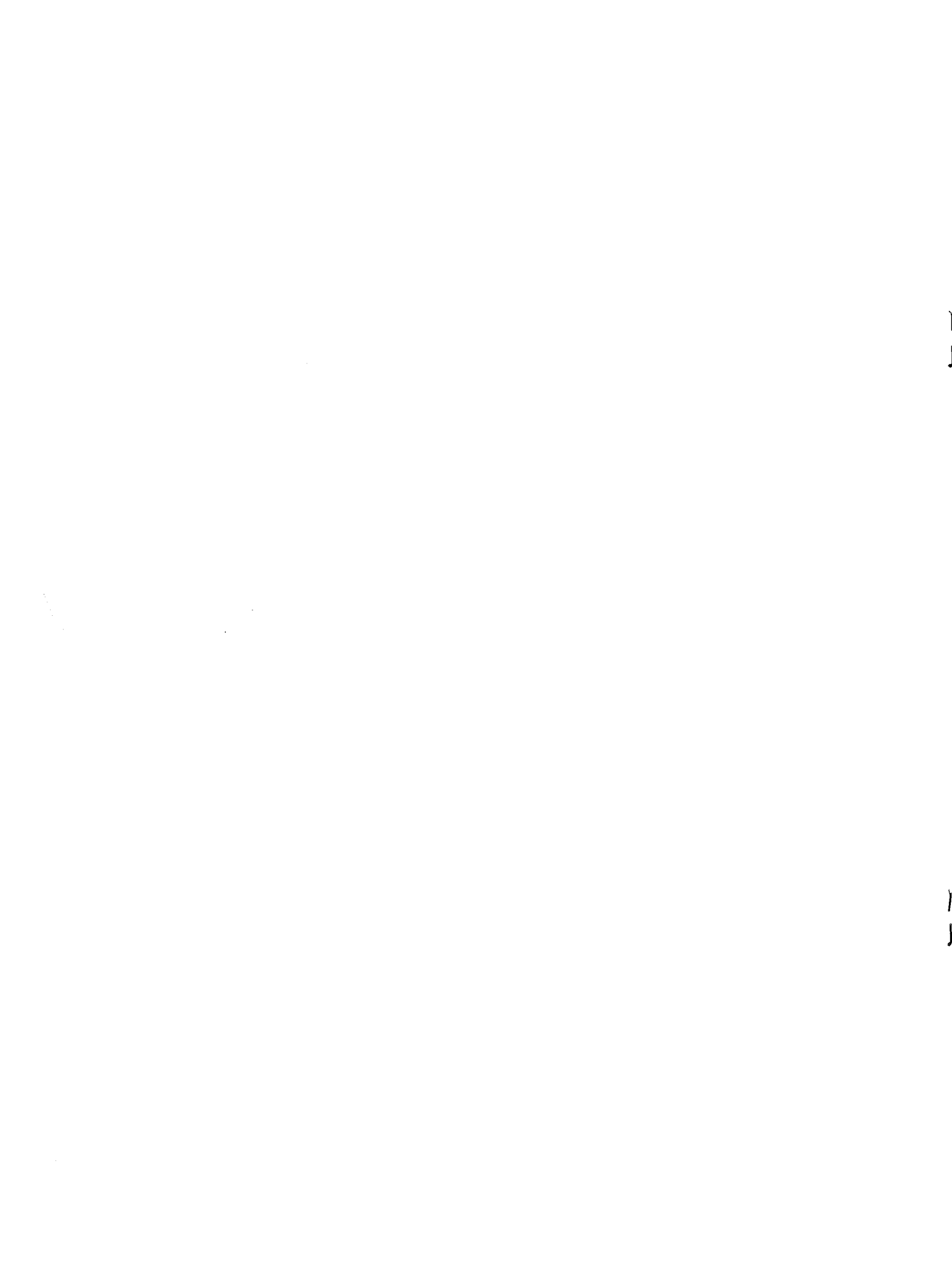
