REVIEW ACTIVITIES

Applications

The Agency received 15 fewer reviewable applications in the third quarter (170), as a result of a considerable decrease in the number of acquisition applications.

Acquisitions

Over 62 percent of the acquisition applications were from the United States, 19 percent from the United Kingdom and 16 percent from other countries of Western Europe. While Ontario remained the province involved in the largest number of cases, Quebec was the only province to experience a significant increase, whereas British Columbia and Alberta were involved in fewer cases than in the second quarter. For the first time since the fourth quarter of 1979, manufacturing accounted for the greatest number of cases, whereas services recorded its lowest number since the first quarter of 1979. Another departure from the norm was that the majority of projected acquirees in the third quarter of 1980 had assets of more than \$2 million. On the other hand, one aspect of projected acquiree businesses that did not change was that most employed fewer than 100 employees.

New businesses

As was the case in acquisitions, the United States accounted for over half the new-business applications. In spite of a slight decrease, Ontario still drew over half the cases, whereas Quebec doubled its number and Alberta and British Columbia recorded slight increases. Services accounted for almost 60 percent of the cases, followed by manufacturing and resources in that order. Typical applications involved small businesses, 74 percent projecting investments of less than \$1 million and 97 percent a projected employment of fewer than 100 employees.

Resolved Cases

This was the third consecutive quarter during which the number of resolved cases decreased: from 227 in the last quarter of 1979, the number of resolved cases fell to 211 in the first quarter of 1980, 153 in the second quarter and 117 in the third. Slightly over 79 percent of the cases in the third quarter were allowed and over 10 percent disallowed. The others were withdrawn by applicants before a decision had been made.

Acquisitions

The number of resolved acquisition cases decreased from 83 in the second quarter to 52 in the third. Of these, 73 percent were allowed, over 13 percent disallowed and the rest withdrawn by applicants prior to a decision being made.

Two allowed acquisition proposals submitted by Allegheny Ludlum Industries Inc. of Pittsburgh, Pennsylvania, and LTV Corporation of Dallas, Texas, were described in some detail with the applicants' permission in press releases issued in August and September. The first was for the acquisition by Allegheny Ludlum of the businesses carried on by Chemetron of Canada, Limited and Chemetron Holdings Limited of Ridgetown, Ontario, both wholly-owned by Chemetron Corporation of the U.S.A. The second proposal was for the acquisition of control by LTV of Continental-Emsco Company Limited of Calgary, whose previous ultimate controller was Lykes Corporation of the United States. Both proposals were second applications by the applicant, which the Government allowed because of new and improved commitments which were likely to bring significant benefits to Canada.

In the Chemetron acquisition, Allegheny Ludlum undertook to make one of Chemetron's Divisions the sole North American facility for the design, manufacture and marketing of special testers and fittings used in oil and gas pipelines and other industrial applications. This undertaking is expected to increase exports (eventually to 65 percent of total sales), employment and use of Canadian manufactured components, and will require the establishment of an on-going research and development program.

The Continental-Emsco acquisition was allowed on the basis of key criteria such as Canadian participation in management and equity, the sourcing of goods and services in Canada, and import replacement. LTV Corporation undertook to establish a 67-percent Canadian-owned company to manufacture oil gathering equipment which hitherto has been imported. It will purchase from Canadian sources, when available at competitive prices, any oil field supplies and tubular products, whether or not such goods are manufactured by its parent or associates outside Canada. In addition, LTV Corporation will ensure that Continental-Emsco becomes a highly autonomous, self-managed company, with greatly increased authority and responsibility to conduct all aspects of the business and with its own data processing capability. The applicant also undertook to offer 20 percent of the equity in Continental-Emsco to Canadians within two years.

New businesses

The number of resolved new-business cases remained about the same in the third quarter as in the second. Of the 65 cases, approximately 84 percent were allowed, 8 percent disallowed and the rest withdrawn by the applicant before a decision had been made.

One of the allowed new-business cases, which was described in a press release issued on September 3, was a proposal by Northwest Exploration Company, which is wholly-owned by Northwest Energy Company of the United States, to establish a new business in Calgary to explore for, develop and produce oil and gas. Northwest Exploration undertook to restrict the activities of the company to exploration, and the development and production of reserves found as a result of that exploration, and not to acquire proven Another important undertaking is that the applicant will carry out its first exploration project through a joint venture with two Canadian companies, which, together, would own 50 percent of the venture. Northwest Exploration has undertaken to give preference to Canadians in any other joint ventures which it may form in the future. Yet another Canadian ownership undertaking is the applicant's commitment to make available to Canadians, by way of an orderly distribution over a five-year period, at least 30 percent of the equity in the new company. Other undertakings are to ensure that two-thirds of the members of the company's board of directors and a majority of its officers will be resident Canadians, that resident Canadians will be employed at all levels of the company, subject to availability, and that the company will purchase its goods and services from Canadian manufacturers or suppliers, when competitively available.

OTHER ACTIVITIES

Opinions. During the third quarter of 1980, the Minister gave three opinions on eligibility under Section 4(1) of the Act. One involved the renewal of an opinion given previously to the Asamera Oil Corporation, that it was considered to be an eligible person within the meaning of the Act. Two other companies, Crosbie Bristow Helicopters Ltd. and Reichhold Ltd., were given an eligibility opinion for the first time. No Ministerial opinions were given on questions of relatedness.

Surveillance. The Act authorizes the Minister to require non-Canadians who are proposing to make or have made a reviewable investment to file the prescribed notice with the Agency. Under its program of surveillance, the Agency monitors news media reports of mergers, acquisitions and the establishment of new businesses. Unsolicited information is also received from individuals and companies. Detailed investigations of such reports are carried out as necessary. During the third quarter of 1980, surveillance acitivity led to the initiation of 52 detailed investigations as a result of which 4 notices were filed under the Act.

Enforcement. Following procedures which have been established to monitor, at annual intervals, the implementation of plans and undertakings provided by investors whose applications were allowed, 345 cases were monitored for compliance in the third quarter.

<u>Legal proceedings</u>. No legal proceedings were undertaken during the third quarter.
