

### REVIEW ACTIVITIES

# Applications

The number of reviewable new cases continued to increase in the second quarter reaching 197, compared to 189 in the first quarter. This modest increase was mainly attributable to acquisition applications in manufacturing and new-business applications in the service sector.

# Acquisitions

The slight increase in the number of reviewable acquisition applications (85 to 88) was entirely attributable to manufacturing, the primary and service sectors having drawn fewer applications. The total value of acquiree assets increased by \$68 million in the second quarter. Though manufacturing drew a larger share of applications (45 percent) in the second quarter than it did in the first (37 percent), services still accounted for over half the applications (53 percent). The United States accounted for the largest share of applications (69 percent) and Ontario was the province most frequently involved (64 percent). The majority of cases (59 percent) involved assets of less than \$2 million and businesses that employed fewer than 100 employees (85 percent).

# New businesses

The number of new-business applications rose slightly to 109, five more than in the first quarter. The service sector attracted 66 percent of the cases and Ontario was involved in 57 percent of the applications. The United States accounted for almost 60 percent of the applications. Well over 90 percent of the cases involved small businesses with assets of less than \$2 million and fewer than 100 employees.

# Resolved cases

Though it was very small, there was another decrease in the number of resolved cases (130 to 128). The second quarter number, however, was still above the low of 117 recorded in the third quarter of 1980. Acquisitions were entirely responsible for the decrease, sliding from 64 in the first quarter to 49. The number of resolved new-business cases rose from 66 to 79.

Of the 128 cases, approximately 77 percent were allowed, 10 percent disallowed and 13 percent withdrawn by applicants before a decision was made. The allowance rate for acquisitions (74 percent) decreased after its first-quarter rise to 84 percent, whereas the allowance rate for new-businesses (78 percent) increased after a significant decrease in the first quarter to a record low of 67 percent.

## Acquisitions

At 49, the number of resolved acquisition cases was the lowest ever reported in the Quarterly Report. Since the first quarter of 1979, the previous low (52 cases) was recorded in the third quarter of 1980. The allowance rate also decreased from 84 percent to about 75 percent. A larger proportion of the cases were disallowed (14 percent) and withdrawn by applicants (11 percent).

An April press release described in detail an allowed acquisition proposal by Eaton Corporation of Cleveland (Ohio) to acquire control of Cutler-Hammer Canada Limited of Scarborough (Ontario), which manufactures electrical and electronic devices and systems for industrial users and original equipment manufacturers.

The transaction is expected to result in increased economic activity in terms of capital investment, job creation, exports and Canadian sourcing. Within two years, Cutler Canada will expand its plant facilities at a cost of approximately \$575,000. Cutler Canada will have a world product mandate for the manufacture of a series of pneumatic timing relays, the export of which is expected to account for 95 percent of total production or \$950,000 by the end of 1982. Cutler Canada will assign the responsibility for developing exports of all its products to a specific member of its staff. In addition, Eaton will use its international marketing network to promote the sale of Cutler Canada products.

#### New businesses

The number of resolved new-business cases increased in the second quarter to 79 after it had fallen considerably in the first quarter to 66. At 78 percent, the allowance rate was also higher than that of the last quarter, which at 67 percent was a record low. Approximately 8 percent of the cases were disallowed and , at 14 percent, the rate of withdrawals by applicants remained relatively high.

An April press release described in detail an allowed new-business proposal, which may be of some relevance to those foreign investors contemplating investments in franchising. This was a proposal by Consul Corporation of Mineapolis (Minnesota) to establish a new business in Alberta to operate "Chi-Chi's" restaurants, which specialize in Mexican food.

The applicant gave a number of undertakings in support of its proposal. The new business will open one Chi-Chi's restaurant in 1981 and a total of 12 within five years, of which at least seven will be owned and operated by resident Canadians under license from the new business. The applicant will provide organized training programs for all employees of the new business and the Canadian licensees and, after the second outlet is opened, all training will be done in Canada. Within five years, at least 60 percent of the voting equity of the new business will be held by resident Canadians. All employees and managers and all but one director of the new business will be resident Canadians. Another undertaking is to purchase from Canadian sources, provided they are competitively available, all materials,

equipment and supplies required by the new business including, without limitation, uniforms, packaging, signs, stationary, furnishings, fixtures, decorator items and foodstuffs, but with the possible exception of tortillas and proprietary spices of Chi-Chi's Inc. which are expected to account for less than 5 percent of all foodstuffs. The applicant also undertook that neither the new business nor any Canadian licensee shall pay to Consul any franchise or royalty fee's save as specifically provided for in the franchise agreement, and that all franchise fees and royalties payable by Canadian licensees will be at the same rates payable by the new business and will flow directly to Chi-Chi's Inc. without additional payment to Consul or the new business.

#### OTHER ACTIVITIES

Opinions. During the second quarter of 1981, the Minister gave two eligibility opinions and one relatedness opinion. Both eligibility opinions involved the renewal of earlier opinions to the effect that Bow Valley Industries Ltd. and Chieftain Development Co. Ltd. were considered to be eligible persons within the meaning of the Act. Glitsch Inc. received an opinion that its projected investment was "related" to its existing business and thus not subject to review.

<u>Surveillance</u>. During the second quarter surveillance activity led to the initiation of 95 detailed investigations to determine whether the transactions in question were or were not reviewable. As a result, 9 notices were filed under the Act.

<u>Enforcement</u>. In accordance with established procedures for monitoring, at intervals, the implementation of plans and undertakings provided by investors whose applications have been allowed, 297 allowed cases were monitored during the second quarter. In addition, 21 disallowed cases were monitored.

Legal proceedings. On April 9 the Federal Court of Canada, Trial Division, dismissed on jurisdictional grounds an application by Central Cartage Co. to permit the sale of its shares of The Canadian Transit Company to Mr. T.J. Maroun, who has become a permanent resident. By Order dated May 25, 1981, the Federal Court of Appeal ruled that, if Central Cartage carried out its proposal to sell those shares to Mr. Maroun, it would not be in breach of an injunction made by the Federal Court against Fallbridge Holdings and Central Cartage Co. in 1979 and extended indefinitely on March 31, 1980. The injunction enjoined the two companies from, among other things, taking certain actions in relation to the corporations owning the Ambassador Bridge connecting Detroit and Windsor. The Court declared, however, that its ruling

was not to be construed in any way as expressing an opinion on whether such a transaction was or was not reviewable under the Foreign Investment Review Act, or as precluding its review under the Act.

By order dated May 11, 1981, the Supreme Court of Canada refused to allow an application made by Dow Jones & Co. Inc. for leave to appeal the March 20, 1981 Order of the Federal Court of Appeal which dismissed Dow Jones' Appeal from a decision of the Trial Division, which had held that the acquisition by Dow Jones of Irwin Dorsey Limited did constitute an acquisition of control within the meaning of the Foreign Investment Review Act.

Another development during the second quarter was that legal proceedings were instituted by the Attorney General for Canada against Trio-Kenwood Canada Inc. under subsection 24(2) of the Foreign Investment Review Act, which deals with failure to file notice under the Act following a demand by the Minister under subsection 8(3). The trial is scheduled to take place this fall.
