## REVIEW ACTIVITIES


#### Abstract

Applications The number of applications received by the Agency decreased to 181 in the third quarter of 1981 from 197 in the second quarter. This decrease was distributed equally between acquisition and new-business applications, and was entirely in the manufacturing sector.


Acquisitions
The Agency received 80 acquisition applications in the third quarter, down from 88 in the second. The highlight of the quarter was the unprecedented increase in the total value of assets involved, which rose from almost $\$ 858$ million to more than $\$ 6$ billion. However, the majority of applications involved businesses with assets of less than $\$ 2$ million ( 63 percent), and fewer than 100 employees ( 80 percent). The service sector attracted 63 percent of the applications, and the manufacturing sector, 34 percent. More than half of the proposals ( 51 percent) came from U.S. investors, and the same proportion involved investments in Ontario.

New businesses
As with acquisitions, the number of new business applications (101) fell by eight from the preceding quarter. The United States was again the source of the largest number of applications ( 53 percent), and Ontario was the province most often involved. The service sector continued to attract the majority of the applications ( 72 percent). Businesses with assets of less than $\$ 2$ million accounted for 94 percent of the applications, and businesses expected to employ fewer than 100 people accounted for 97 percent.

## Resolved cases

The number of cases resolved in the third quarter rose to 158 from 128 in the previous quarter, ending the decline registered since the beginning of 1981. Of the 158 cases resolved, 118 were allowed, 18 were disallowed, and 22 were withdrawn by the applicants before a decision was reached.

## Acquisitions

The number of resolved acquisition cases increased markedly, from 49 in the second quarter to 74 in the third. During this third quarter 58 cases were allowed, while 9 were disallowed and 7 were withdrawn by the applicants before a decision was reached.

What follows is an example of an acquisition proposal which was allowed by the government and which was described in detail in a news release published in September. The proposal was by Paccar of Canada Ltd. of Ottawa, a wholly-owned subsidiary of Paccar Inc. of Bellevue, Washington, to acquire control of Russell Brothers, Ltd. of Owen Sound, Ontario, a steel-fabricating company serving the mining, marine and machinery industry and general fabrication sectors. In support of its proposal, the company gave undertakings to manufacture in Canada four models of Wagner underground mining vehicles and parts for after-market support. During the next three years, based on projected sales, the company will nearly double employment at Russell, and in the same period will expend a minimum of $\$ 250,000$ on research and development in Canada. Within five years the company will make investments in Canada totalling $\$ 1.2$ million, and within three years will give Russell a world product mandate for the vehicles manufactured in Canada.

New businesses
The number of resolved new business cases rose to 84 from 79 in the previous quarter. Of the 84 cases resolved, 60 were allowed, 9 were disallowed, and 15 were withdrawn by the applicant before a decision was reached.

Some of the new business proposals allowed by the government were described in detail in news releases published during the quarter. The proposal by Apple Computer Inc., of Cupertine, California, for example, included undertakings to carry out research and development in Canada and to promote compatible Canadian technology. In another example, Fichtel and Sachs AG of Schweinfurt, Federal Republic of Germany, which will manufacture clutches, McPherson struts and shock absorbers, undertook to invest $\$ 1.5$ million in the new business during the first three years of operation and to export approximately 90 percent of its Canadian production.

A third example is the proposal by Dennison Manufacturing Company of Framingham, Massachussets, U.S.A. and Canada Development Corporation (CDC) of Toronto, to establish a new business at Mississauga, Ontario, to design and manufacture high speed non-impact printer engines. Initially the CDC will invest $\$ 5$ million in the $50-50$ joint venture while Dennison will contribute its existing technology and know-how. The new business will immediately employ some 75 highly skilled engineers, technicians and other personnel to perform research and development work and to develop and manufacture prototype printer engines. The joint venture will invest an additional $\$ 10$ miliion to increase manufacturing capacity to enable the new business to commence commercial production in 1982, at which time it is estimated that an additional 80 to 100 people will be employed. The printer engine to be produced by the new business, which expects to export 90 percent of its production, will significantly improve the output capability of data processing equipment.

## OTHER ACTIVITIES

Opinions. During the third quarter of 1981, the Minister gave four eligibility opinions and one relatedness opinion. Two of the eligibility opinions involved the renewal of opinions that Hastings West Investment Ltd. and Oakwood Petroleums Ltd. are considered to be eligible persons within the meaning of the Act. Inter-City Gas Corporation and Kelvin Energy Ltd. received similar opinions for the first time.

Surveillance. During the third quarter, surveillance activity led to 54 investigations that resulted in the filing of five notices under the Act.

Enforcement. In accordance with established procedures for regular monitoring of the implementation of plans and undertakings provided by investors whose applications have been allowed, 231 cases were monitored during the quarter. In addition, 13 disallowed cases were monitored.

Legal proceedings. During the quarter no legal proceedings were begun.
