POLICY AND OTHER DEVELOPMENTS

On January 5, 1982 the U.S. Government requested consultations with Canada under Article XXII of the General Agreement on Tariffs and Trade (GATT) concerning practices in the administration of the Foreign Investment Review Act which the U.S. Government holds to be prejudicial to U.S. trade interests and in conflict with Canada's obligations under the GATT. Consultations were held in Geneva on February 17. Following consideration of the U.S. representations, the U.S. Government was informed that Canada considers the practices in question to be compatible with the provisions of the GATT. On March 31 the GATT Council considered and agreed to a request by the U.S.A. for the establishment of a panel under the terms of Article XXIII of the GATT to examine the matter further under terms of reference yet to be decided. The convening of a panel to consider disagreements between Contracting Parties to the GATT is an established feature of the dispute settlement procedures of the General Agreement.

REVIEW ACTIVITIES

Applications

In the first quarter of 1982, the Agency received 166 applications, compared to 195 in the last quarter of 1981. The decrease occurred mainly in new business applications.

Acquisitions

The number of acquisition applications declined from 88 in the last quarter of 1981 to 82 in the first quarter of 1982. Of this number, 63 percent were from U.S. investors and 29 percent were from Western European investors, while 62 percent involved investments in Ontario and 19 percent involved investments in the western provinces. Sixty-one percent of the applications were in the service sector, 37 percent in the manufacturing sector. The total value of assets of the businesses to be acquired amounted to \$926.1 million, 60 percent of the applications involved assets of less than \$2 million, and 77 percent involved businesses with fewer than 100 employees.

New businesses

The number of new business applications received declined from 107 in the last quarter of 1981 to 84 in the first quarter of 1982. Of these, 57 percent were from U.S. investors and 35 percent from Western European investors. Fifty-eight percent involved investments in Ontario and 21 percent involved investments in the western provinces. Three quarters of the applications were in the service sector and the rest were in manufacturing. By far the largest number involved assets of less than \$2 million (94 percent) and fewer than 100 employees (95 percent).

Resolved cases

In the first quarter of 1982, 214 cases were resolved, compared to 219 in the last quarter of 1981. Of the 214 resolved cases, 134 were allowed, 26 were disallowed, and 54 were withdrawn by the applicant before a decision was reached. Twenty-five of the 54 proposals withdrawn involved investments to be made by intending immigrants to Canada only after they had become permanent residents of Canada. Therefore, the investments would not be subject to review under the Foreign Investment Review Act. Accordingly the investors were counselled to apply under the Entrepreneurs and Self-Employed Persons programs of the Canada Employment and Immigration Commission and the applications were withdrawn.

Acquisitions

The number of acquisition cases resolved declined from 99 in the last quarter of 1981 to 93 in the first quarter of 1982. During the quarter, 72 applications were allowed, 13 were disallowed, and 8 were withdrawn before a decision was reached.

Among several allowed proposals that formed the subject of a detailed news release was that of Unilever Limited of London, England and Unilever N.V. of the Netherlands to acquire control of four companies in Canada: Nacan Products Limited of Toronto, Ontario, which produces industrial adhesives and resins and specialty starch products; Lepage's Limited of Bramalea, Ontario, which manufactures adhesives and related products; Foodpro National Inc. of Lachine, Quebec, which manufactures various food additives and imports and sells various food-processing products (third proposal for these three firms); and Lawry's Foods Limited of Toronto, Ontario, which produces various food products (second proposal).

Among its principal commitments, Unilever has undertaken to restructure its businesses in Canada within three years, by creating a new Unilever subsidiary company in Canada (Unilever Canada). Unilever Canada will acquire control of all present and future Unilever operating companies in Canada. The Board of Directors of Unilever Canada will be responsible directly to the Board of Directors of Unilever for all policy and investment decisons of the operating companies.

Within five years of the incorporation of Unilever Canada, its Board of Directors will consider offering to the Canadian public the opportunity to purchase a significant portion of its shares with full voting rights. Unilever has also undertaken to create, through Nacan, a new Canadian research facility in Ontario which will be the centre of Nacan's R&D and will be the focal point for Unilever's research activity in certain areas of particular interest to Canada. The new facility will be completed by 1985.

Unilever has also committed itself to a major investment program in Canada over the next five years, which includes modernization and expansion of the Lever Detergents Limited plant at Toronto, Ontario, and investment in manufacturing and related facilities at Nacan's plants at Toronto and Boucherville, Quebec, and at Lepage's and Foodpro. This program will involve an investment of between \$30 and \$60 million.

Unilever will take a number of measures to increase exports, including a program to increase sales of specialty fats; the allocation to Hart Chemicals Limited, located at Guelph, Ontario, of a mandate which will make it the prime centre of Unilever's North American operations for the manufacture of certain specialty chemicals; and the test marketing of certain of Lawry's products in Japan and Hong Kong with a view to increasing its exports to those countries.

Unilever will encourage Unilever Canada to search actively for appropriate opportunities for the independent development of each of its operating companies so that they can become, whenever appropriate, full product-cycle centres (design, development, manufacturing, marketing).

New businesses

The number of new business cases resolved rose by only 1, to 121, from the previous quarter. Of these, 62 applications were allowed, 13 were disallowed, and 46 were withdrawn before a decision was reached. As mentioned earlier, 25 applications were withdrawn because they fell more appropriately under the responsibility of the Canada Employment and Immigration Commission than under that of the Agency.

One of the allowed proposals that was the subject of a detailed news release in March 1982 was by BP Exploration Canada Limited of Calgary, Alberta, to establish, at Calgary, a business to explore for and develop potash deposits. BP Exploration is wholly owned by BP Canada Inc., 64 percent of the shares of which are held by The British Petroleum Company Limited of London, England and 36 percent of which are publicly traded in Canada.

BP Exploration's first project, started in 1981, is the exploration of a salt-potash prospect at Millstream, N.B. Further exploration work, involving the drilling of 10 or more wells at a cost of \$3.5 to \$7 million, will be conducted largely in 1982. If the Millstream property contains a potash deposit likely to be capable of supporting a commercially viable mine, BP Exploration has undertaken to initiate an underground exploration program, which will be completed in 1985, at a cost of between \$15 and \$20 million. BP Exploration has also undertaken that if, upon completion of the underground exploration program, it is satisfied that the mining of the property is commercially viable, it will develop the property for production at an estimated cost of \$140 million.

BP Exploration has further undertaken to process the ore from the Millstream property locally, to employ resident Canadians at all levels of responsibility, and to train Canadians as required.

OTHER ACTIVITIES

Opinions

During the first quarter of 1982, the Minister renewed six opinions to the effect that Alcan Aluminum Limited, Canadian Enterprise Development Corporation Limited, Denison Mines Limited, Numac Oil & Gas Ltd., and Passburg Petroleums Ltd. continue to be eligible persons within the meaning of the Act. One other opinion was given, to the effect that Genstar Corporation is a non-eligible person under the Act.

Surveillance

During this first quarter, investigations were initiated of 65 transactions which at first sight appeared to be reviewable. As a result, 17 notices were filed under the Act.

Enforcement

In accordance with established procedures for the regular monitoring of the implementation of plans and undertakings provided by investors, 326 cases were monitored. In addition, 29 disallowed cases were monitored for compliance with the disallowance order of the Governor in Council.

Legal proceedings

During the last quarter of 1981, British Columbia Forest Products (BCFP) and Western Forest Products Limited (Western) made applications to the Trial Division of the Federal Court of Canada (under section 18 of the Federal Court Act), to obtain a decision as to their status under the Act, whether eligible or non-eligible. These companies also sought and obtained interim orders against the Minister and the Commissioner (the defendants), enjoining them from taking any action under the Act against these companies in respect of investments they had made, until their status was determined by the Court. The companies made their applications to the Court after having received demands under subsection 8(3) of the Foreign Investment Review Act requiring BCFP and Western to file notices of certain investments for review under the Act. No date has yet been fixed for the hearing of these applications.

These applications are being defended and the Government of Canada has appealed the interim injunction to the Appeal Division of the Federal Court of Canada. The appeal is to be heard June 9, 1982, in Vancouver.

In addition, BCFP and Western applied to the Appeal Division of the Federal Court to question, under section 28 of the Federal Court Act, the Minister's decision to issue demands under the Foreign Investment Review Act. The Appeal Division of the Federal Court of Canada, on March 23, 1982, heard a motion to dismiss these proceedings and rendered a unanimous judgment to the effect that the decision of the Minister to issue demands was not subject to review under the terms of section 28 of the Federal Court Act, and therefore the motion to dismiss the proceedings was successful.

As mentioned in the report of the second quarter of 1981, legal proceedings were begun by the Attorney General of Canada under subsection 24(2) of the Foreign Investment Review Act, against Trio-Kenwood Canada Inc. for failure to file notice pursuant to a demand of the Minister. This case was heard March 3, 1982 in the Provincial Court (Criminal Division) in Ottawa. The company was acquitted, and the Attorney General has launched an appeal. This appeal is an appeal on the record and will be heard by the County Court. No date has yet been set.

In addition, as mentioned in the report of the preceding quarter, other proceedings have been started on behalf of the Minister against Trio-Kenwood Canada Inc. and Trio-Kenwood Corporation in the Trial Division of the Federal Court of Canada, to obtain an order to render their investment in Canada nugatory. This application, which was to have been heard March 31, 1982, was postponed to a date to be agreed upon by both parties after service of the notice of motion on Trio-Kenwood Corporation.
