





In 2021 alone, Logisticians were at the forefront of the Canadian COVID-19 vaccine roll out, support to fire and flood ravaged communities, and upholding our International commitments including those to the United Nations and NORAD. On the home front, the RCLS has made tremendous progress in terms of establishing a Governance structure, enabling our Trade Advisor teams, beginning the process for an Occupational Analysis (OA) for Log O and MSE Op and finishing the administrative processes for the FSA / HRA split and the re-designation of Material Management Technicians.
