LGBTQ2+ **COMMUNITIES** IN CANADA: A DEMOGRAPHIC SNAPSHOT

Canada is home to approximately **1 million** people who are part of LGBTQ2+ communities,¹ accounting for 4% of the total population aged 15 and older.


Approximately **75,000** Canadians are transgender² or non-binary,³ representing **0.24%** of the Canadian population aged 15 and older.

The LGBTQ2+ population is relatively young. Youth aged 15 to 24 made up 30% of the LGBTQ2+ population, compared with 14% of the non-LGBTQ2+ population.

More than half of LGB^⁴ Canadians aged 15 and older are bisexual, with bisexual women (332,000) outnumbering bisexual men (161,200) two to one. In addition, one-quarter of Canada's LGB population are gay men (255,100), while one in seven are gay or lesbian women (150,600).
