# Statistical Overview of the Canadian Ornamental Industry 2021 

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## Overview

The ornamental horticulture sector includes the floriculture (primarily cut flowers and potted plants), nursery, Christmas tree, and turf sod industries.

While sales generally increased across the sector over the past two years, disruptions caused by the COVID-19 pandemic continued to present challenges for the ornamental horticulture sector in 2021, including increased costs to comply with measures to control the spread of COVID-19 among customers and workers, and labour shortages caused in part by difficulties travelling internationally. While retailers were open in most provinces for most of 2021, many continued to offer alternative online shopping channels, curbside pick-up, and home delivery, as well as physically distanced on-site sales.

For the ornamental sector, total annual sales were up $6.3 \%$ (to $\$ 2.7$ billion) in 2021 compared to the previous year, and $13 \%$ higher than the average of the previous four years.

Floriculture (flowering and non-flowering live potted plants, greenhouse and field-cut flowers) remained the largest ornamental sub-sector by revenue, accounting for $67.3 \%$ of total sales. The total value of floriculture sales have been increasing over the last five years, with the value of production in 2021 now $15.4 \%$ higher than the average of the previous four years. About half of total floriculture production in 2021 was in Ontario ( $49.1 \%$ ), with $24.5 \%$ in British Columbia, $14.6 \%$ in Quebec and the remaining provinces accounting for $11.8 \%$. Nursery product sales and resales were up $4.3 \%$ to $\$ 747.5$ million in 2021 (year over year), accounting for $27.2 \%$ of total ornamental sales. By province, Ontario accounted for the largest share of total nursery sales (44.8\%), followed by British Columbia (30.4\%) and Quebec (14.5\%)

The total turf sod area increased in 2021, up 3.7\% over the previous year, and $7.3 \%$ higher than the average of the previous four years, to 21,168 hectares in 2021 . While the total value of turf sod sales rose by $1.9 \%$ year-over-year to $\$ 149.7$ million, accounting for $5.5 \%$ of total ornamental sales. Ontario led the country in turf sod sales ( $\$ 64.4$ million) at $43.0 \%$ of the national total.

Canada exports a diverse range of live plants with soil to the U.S. including turf sod, potted plants and bedding plants to markets which can be reached by truck transportation. Most other countries cannot sell plants with soil to the U.S. for phytosanitary reasons.

Canada's largest ornamental trading partner is the United States, accounting for $99.5 \%$ of exports and $51.8 \%$ of imports, by value, for the sector. The total value of Canadian ornamental exports rose by $27 \%$ from 2020 to $\$ 842$ million in 2021. In 2021, exports to the United States totaled $\$ 838$ million and accounted for $99.5 \%$ of total Canadian ornamental exports while plant imports from the United States totaled $\$ 329$ million, accounting for $48.1 \%$ of total Canadian ornamental horticulture imports.

Total annual Christmas tree exports rose in value to $\$ 90.2$ million in 2021, $14 \%$ higher than 2020 and $32 \%$ higher than the average of the previous four years. This higher revenue was achieved on lower volumes of 2.4 million trees exported, $2.6 \%$ lower than 2020 and $6.6 \%$ lower than the average of the previous four years. 97.2 \% of Christmas tree exports are to the United States.

Labour shortages were among the most pressing concerns continuing to face the horticulture sector. Rapidly evolving COVID-19 control requirements for housing, workspaces, and retail demanded time and resources from firms and suppliers. Travel restrictions, testing requirements, and availability of air and land transportation limited the ability of seasonal and temporary foreign workers to reach their workplaces in Canada. The nursery sod and floriculture industries employed 24,159 seasonal and temporary workers in the 2021 season, with $67 \%(16,234)$ of the employees seasonal and $33 \%(7,925)$ permanent. This represents a $2.7 \%$ contraction from the previous year (2020, also affected by COVID-19) and a $7.7 \%$ contraction over the average of the previous five years.
