#### ANNUAL REPORT on the ACCESS TO INFORMATION ACT

Reporting period: April 1, 2010 to March 31, 2011

#### Introduction

This report is prepared and tabled in Parliament in accordance with section 72 of the Access to Information Act.

#### Mandate

BDC's mandate, as set out in the *Business Development Bank of Canada Act*, is to support Canadian entrepreneurship by providing financial, consulting and venture capital services. BDC's investments may be held in the name of BDC Capital, a wholly-owned subsidiary of BDC. All administration of such investments is performed by BDC employees, using BDC resources and facilities. All relevant records relating to BDC Capital are under the control of BDC.

#### Organization of Access to Information activities, policies and procedures

Procedures are in place for directing formal access requests to the Access to Information Coordinator who ensures that they are processed in accordance with the provisions of the Act. The Coordinator is normally occupied part-time at BDC's Montreal Head Office in carrying out his responsibilities pursuant to the Act, although he is available at all times together with other administrative support, to process requests as the volume of activity may warrant. The Assistant Vice President, Legal Affairs in BDC's legal department is currently designated as the Access to Information Coordinator, exercises delegated authority to exercise the powers, duties and functions under the Act and reports to BDC's President & CEO in access to information matters. A copy of the Delegation Order is attached. The Coordinator has extensive knowledge of access to information and privacy laws and policies.

BDC receives requests from many sources and for all types of information throughout the year. BDC's approach in determining whether to deal with such requests informally or whether to require the requestor to make a formal request under the Act depends on whether the information is of the type that obviously can be disclosed without having to consider applying exemptions and whether the relevant records can be easily identified and located. Decisions on waiving application and processing fees permitted under the Act are made on a case-by-case basis.

#### **Activities**

As outlined in the attached statistical report, BDC received six new formal requests in this reporting period. In relation to the six requests that were completed, the relevant records were fully disclosed in two of those files. Portions of the records were exempt in one of the files and BDC was unable to process the remaining three files since it had no relevant records. In addition, there were seven

formal consultations from other departments and agencies concerning requests they received in which some BDC-related records were involved.

The percentage breakdown for the source of requests received during this reporting period is as follows:

#### **Education and Training**

During the reporting period, the Coordinator attended a full-day ATIP community meeting organized by the Canadian Access and Privacy Association in Ottawa.

#### Policies, Guidelines and Procedures

During the reporting period, BDC did not implement any new or revised access to information policies, guidelines or procedures.

#### **Complaints and Investigations**

During the reporting period, BDC dealt with the Office of the Information Commissioner concerning a complaint and investigation, in which BDC claimed exemption for records it considered to have proprietary and strategic value. The complaint was eventually withdrawn.

# Access to Information and Privacy Acts <u>Designation Order</u>

Pursuant to section 73 of both the Access to Information Act and the Privacy Act (collectively, the "Acts"), Jean-René Halde, President and Chief Executive Officer of the Business Development Bank of Canada ("BDC") and head of a government institution for the purpose of the Acts in relation to BDC, hereby:

- 1. revokes all previous designations relating to the exercise of powers and performance of duties and functions of the head of a government institution under the Acts in relation to BDC (the "Powers"), and;
- 2. hereby designates Robert Annett, Assistant General Counsel, and should Mr. Annett be absent or unable to perform his duties and functions himself, then François Rivest, Assistant General Counsel, in his place, to exercise or perform such Powers and to be designated as BDC's Access to Information and Privacy Coordinator for that purpose.
