Your Rights are Protected by Law in Canada


Temporary foreign workers in Canada are protected by labour and occupational health and safety legislation.


Your employer must:

- Make sure you have a safe workplace
- Pay you for your work
- Give you break time and days off work
- Respect the terms of your written contract

If your employer is required to provide housing, make sure it is adequate, suitable and affordable.

Your employer cannot:

Health and Safety Rights

All workers in Canada have these three rights:



Right to know

About hazards in the workplace, including potential exposure to COVID-19, and how to protect yourself.



Right to participate

Through your health and safety representative or safety committee.

By discussing health and safety concerns with your supervisor.



Right to refuse unsafe work

That you believe is dangerous to your health and safety or that of another worker.

Immediately report work refusals to your supervisor and follow the specific steps for your province or territory.

Your employer should have a workplace harassment and violence prevention policy and program that describes appropriate behaviour at your work site.

Contact the police for criminal matters such as violent acts, sexual assaults, threats, and stalking.
