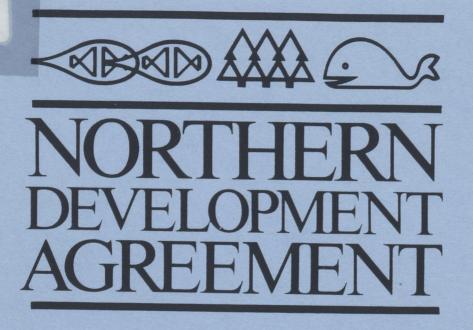

This section is followed by the main body of the report, which parallels the format of the Agreement; that is, the Agreement's programming is divided into programs, projects and activities. A summary of expenditures for 1985/86 is provided at the back of the report.

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NORTHERN DEVELOPMENT AGREEMENT

I. Introduction

On November 29, 1982, the governments of Canada and Manitoba signed the Canada/Manitoba Northern Development Agreement. This Agreement has the following objectives:

- a) to develop locally-based income and employment opportunities;
- to increase participation of the northern labour force in employment opportunities, particularly in major resource sectors;
- c) to facilitate increased participation of individuals in northern development by removing physical barriers to human and economic development.

This Agreement reflects a continuing commitment by both levels of government to a development strategy which began in 1974 with the Canada/Manitoba Northlands Agreement.

II. Background - Canada/Manitoba Northlands Agreement

In June 1974, Canada and Manitoba entered into a 10-year General Development Agreement (GDA) for the purpose of selecting and implementing initiatives for the economic and socioeconomic Under the GDA, the Manitoba development of northern Manitoba. Northlands Interim Agreement (1974-1976) was signed. This was Long-Term followed Manitoba Northlands Agreement by the (1976-1982). The initiatives under this Agreement were to form an integral part of a strategy designed to encourage the long-term development of northern Manitoba.

III. <u>Strategy</u>

The Northlands Agreement supported socioeconomic development measures and assisted in the placement of rudimentary services

for rural and remote northern communities. While assistance for programs with these objectives is still required, consultation with northern and native peoples for a new agreement revealed a need to assist long-term economic development.

IV. The Northern Development Agreement (1982-1987)

The Northern Development Agreement places a greater emphasis on local economic initiatives through the utilization of the natural resources available. At the same time, the Agreement recognizes that human development measures and community improvements are still required.

V. Northern Development Agreement - Management and Co-ordination

The management structure of the Agreement includes a Ministers' Committee and a Management Board. An Agreement Advisory Committee has been established to assist the Ministers' Committee and Program Advisory Committees have been formed to help the Management Board.

The <u>Ministers' Committee</u> is comprised of the federal Principal Minister (from the Department of Regional Industrial Expansion or as designated), and the provincial Principal Minister (from the Department of Northern Affairs).

An Agreement Advisory Committee has been appointed by the Ministers' Committee. This Advisory Committee has eight members who represent northern and native organizations. Its purpose is to review the progress of programs and projects under the Agreement and to advise on future directions and any other matters referred to them by the Ministers.

A <u>Management Board</u> has been constituted to provide overall management and co-ordination of the Agreement. There are eight members on the Board, four of whom represent federal departments or agencies. (Regional Industrial Expansion, Employment

and Immigration, Indian Affairs and Northern Development, Public Services Commission), and four of whom represent provincial departments (Northern Affairs, Natural Resources, Employment Services and Economic Security).

<u>Program Advisory Committees</u> have been established by the Management Board to assist in the effective implementation of Programs 1, 2 and 3. Each committee has eight members who represent northern and native organizations and related federal and provincial departmental officials.

Consultation with Northern Residents

It is the intent of the Northern Development Agreement to provide mechanisms which will allow for effective consultation with the residents of northern Manitoba. Several mechanisms have been developed:

- The Agreement Advisory Committee which advises the Ministers has the following representation:
 - two elected officials from each of the:
 - Northern Association of Community Councils
 - Manitoba Metis Federation
 - Manitoba Keewatinowi Okimakanak Inc.
 - one elected official from each of the:
 - First Nations Confederacy
 - Brotherhood of Indian Nations
- 2. The Program Advisory Committee, which supports the Management Board in the implementation of Program 1 (Community/Regional Economic Development Planning) and Program 2 (Resource Opportunity Development), has the same representation from northern and native organizations as does the Agreement

Advisory Committee. In addition, there is a similar committee which has been established to consider projects under Program 3 (Northeast Manitoba Development).

VI. Financial Structure

The delivery of programs under the Northern Development Agreement involves a mix of:

- ° programs funded and delivered by the federal government;
- ° programs funded and delivered by the provincial government;
- programs cost-shared between Canada and Manitoba and delivered by the federal government;
- o programs cost-shared between Canada and Manitoba and delivered by the provincial government.

VII. Northern Development Agreement Program Structure

The Northern Development Agreement attempts to fulfill its objectives by delivering activities under the following four sectors:

- a) Community Economic Development
- b) Human Development
- c) Community Improvement
- d) Management and Consultation

Each sector is divided into programs, projects and activities.

Sector A: Community Economic Development - \$47.5 million

Objective:

- Stimulate and respond to locally-based income and employment opportunities.
- Provide a development program for northeast Manitoba.

- Develop activities relating to northern resources such as forestry, wildlife and agriculture.
- Enhance development of local government in provincial communities.

Sector B: Human Development - \$104.7 million

Objective:

- Increase the participation of the northern labour force in northern employment opportunities through resource development.
- Co-ordinate the preparation of the northern labour force for employment by providing professional, technical and skills training opportunities.
- Provide opportunities for the youth of northern Manitoba to participate in pre-employment opportunities.

Sector C: Community Improvement - \$27.3 million

Objective:

- Provision of basic levels of community services in northern remote communities where extreme health and public safety disparities persist.

Sector D: Management and Consultation - \$6.7 million

Objective:

- Provision of the overall management of the Agreement, as well as planning, consultation, public information and evaluation of the progress and effectiveness of the Agreement.

PROGRESS BY PROGRAM

PROGRAM: 1

COMMUNITY/REGIONAL ECONOMIC DEVELOPMENT PLANNING

The purpose of this program is to assist local and regional groups and organizations in the identification and development of new employment opportunities. The program provides for the costs of undertaking analysis, feasibility studies, market research and an array of services necessary to develop sound economic development projects at the local and regional levels.

The program allocation is \$2,500,000 and is cost-shared between Canada (DRIE 60%) and Manitoba (40%). The program is implemented by the federal Department of Regional Industrial Expansion.

In 1985/86, 26 projects were recommended for support by the Program Advisory Committee, composed of representatives of northern and native organizations and related government officials. Committed amounts to these 26 projects were \$645,023.

Expenditures totalling \$593,720 were incurred in 1985/86, of which \$246,688 related to projects carried over from 1984/85 and of which \$27,384 related to projects initiated in 1983/84. See Table 1.

PROGRAM: 2

RESOURCE OPPORTUNITY DEVELOPMENT

The purpose of this program is to stimulate and respond to locally developed economic development proposals which create new income and employment opportunities. The program provides support to projects which lead to long-term economic development in rural, remote and northern communities.

The program allocation is \$12,000,000 and is funded 100% by Canada (DRIE). The program is implemented by the federal Department of Regional Industrial Expansion.

In 1985/86, 41 projects were recommended for support by the same Program Advisory Committee as stated under Program 1. Committed amounts to these 41 projects were \$3,218,978.

Expenditures totalling \$2,800,804 were incurred in 1985/86 of which \$544,043 related to projects carried over from 1984/85 and of which \$73,026 related to projects initiated in 1983/84. See Table 2.

Of the 41 projects approved in 1985/86, it should be noted 3 were supplementary offers to offset cost overruns on projects previously approved.

PROGRAM: 3

NORTHEAST MANITOBA DEVELOPMENT

The purpose of this program is to provide for the planning and implementation of development measures for northeast Manitoba. The program provides support to the formulation of a development plan for the region, and to the identification, analysis, development and implementation of economic development proposals.

The program allocation is \$2,500,000 and is funded 100% by Canada (DRIE). The program is implemented by the federal Department of Regional Industrial Expansion.

In 1985/86, 4 projects were recommended for support by the Program 3 Advisory Committee, composed of representatives of northern and native organizations and related government officials. Committed amounts to these 4 projects were \$128,709.

Expenditures totalling \$151,895 were incurred in 1985/86, of which \$50,240 related to projects initiated in 1984/85. See Table 3.

PROGRAM 4 - RESOURCE DEVELOPMENT

The purpose of this program is to contribute to the economic development of northern communities through the improved usage and management of northern resources while providing employment opportunities for northern residents.

The program allocation is \$25,000,000 and is funded 100% by the provincial government. Projects within this program are implemented by the Manitoba Departments of Agriculture and Natural Resources.

For the period of April 1, 1985 to March 31, 1986, the following projects and activities were initiated at a cost of \$4,016,200.

A. Forestry Management:

The purpose of this project is to assist in the renewal and the protection of forests while creating employment opportunities in northern Manitoba.

1. Forest Renewal:

The purpose of this activity is to provide for a continued supply of wood as well as to contribute to local economic development and employment opportunities.

This activity is implemented by the Manitoba Department of Natural Resources through its Forestry Branch.

This activity provides for initiatives such as site preparation for planting, manual and mechanical tree planting, and regeneration surveys.

Please see the attached Table 4A for details of activity initiatives, hours of employment generated, and employee type by location.

For the period of April 1, 1985 to March 31, 1986, total expenditures of \$1,961,000 were incurred.

2. Forest Fire Protection:

The purpose of this activity is to provide for the placing, equipping and maintaining of fire suppression crews in order to facilitate the effective protection of the forest resource.

This activity is implemented by the Manitoba Department of Natural Resources through its Regional Services Branch.

This activity provides for initiatives such as co-ordinating fire suppression training of selected local individuals, providing air and ground transportation to fire suppression crews, and maintaining fire-tac and heli-tac crews at critical sites throughout the forested area of Manitoba. Please see the attached Table 4B for details of the activity locations and employee breakdowns.

For the period of April 1, 1985 to March 31, 1986, total expenditures of \$1,326,500 were incurred.

B. <u>Parks Development:</u>

1. Parks Development:

The purpose of this project and its related activity is to provide for the construction and/or improvement of parks infrastructure in northern Manitoba in order to enhance utilization of recreational resources, as well as increase local employment.

For the period of April 1, 1985 to March 31, 1986, total expenditures of \$228,700 were incurred.

C. Agricultural Opportunities:

The purpose of this project is to provide for research, development, and ongoing support for activities aimed at advancing agricultural production in northern Manitoba.

1. Northern Horticulture:

The purpose of this activity is to provide for the development of local horticultural skills, technical assistance in support of crop production, and the provision of workshops and demonstrations on garden tunnel operations.

This activity is implemented by the Manitoba Department of Agriculture.

This activity provides such services as land breaking, tilling, the provision of tillage equipment, research material, and horticultural information as well as workshops and demonstrations on garden and tunnel technique. Please see Table 4D for details of the activity's initiatives by community.

For the period of April 1, 1985 to March 31, 1986, total expenditures of \$82,300 were incurred.

Northern Horticulture provided technical backup to the following semi-commercial projects:

- 1. Cormorant land development phase of the Agricultural Association.
- 2. Cross Lake 5 acres of potatoes, ½ acre of mixed vegetables and small fruit.
- 3. Herb Lake Landing 4 acres of market garden.
- 4. Island Lake (Garden Hill) 5 acres of potatoes, ½ acre of mixed vetegables.
- 5. <u>Leaf Rapids</u> potatoes, forage hay on 10 acres.
- 6. Snow Lake market garden, goat herd.
- Wabowden (1) 2 acres of market garden;
 - (2) forage seed operation on 80 acres;
 - (3) barley and forage hay operation;
 - (4) barley, forage hay, and cattle operation.

2. Agricultural Development:

The purpose of this activity is to identify potentially viable agricultural Crown land in Manitoba's north. This activity will provide for initiatives based on a review of the Northern Agricultural Study.

This activity is implemented by the Manitoba Department of Agriculture.

In 1985/86, this activity included the completion of a land use study of the Washow-Fisher Peninsula, as well as preliminary data collection for land use studies in the Saint Lakes and North Interlake areas.

For the period of April 1, 1985 to March 31, 1986, expenditures of \$7,900 were incurred.

3. Wild Rice:

The purpose of this activity is to assist residents of northern Manitoba to achieve a leading role in the wild rice industry.

This activity is implemented by the Manitoba Department of Natural Resources.

This activity provides for initiatives such as the licensing of wild rice producers; a wild rice seeding program to explore potentially productive areas; liaison and consultation with the Indian Wild Rice Committee; and the provision of information, advice and technical support to producers and potential producers.

In 1985, five research projects were initiated on identified wild rice production problems related to nutrients, seed viability and maturation, water level manipulation and remote sensing. These projects are expected to continue through the 1986-87 fiscal year.

For the period of April 1, 1985 to March 31, 1986, a total of 446 licences, 48 harvest permits and 9 buyer's permits were issued.

The 1985 wild rice harvest yielded a province-wide production total of 608,247 pounds. Purchases made by wild rice buyers for 1985-86 totalled 539,028 pounds at an average price of \$1.05 per pound.

For the period of April 1, 1985 to March 31, 1986, expenditures of \$158,500 were incurred.

D. <u>Wildlife Management:</u>

1. Community Wildlife Management:

The purpose of this project and its related activity is to provide for the protection and effective utilization of local wildlife resources in northern Manitoba.

This activity is implemented by the Manitoba Department of Natural Resources through its Wildlife Branch offices in Churchill and Thompson.

This activity provides for such initiatives as the continuation of Manitoba's commitments to the "Beverly and Kaminuriak Barren-ground Caribou Management Agreement", (an inter-jurisdictional management plan for barren-ground caribou), the extension of studies concerning the management of woodland caribou of Cape Churchill, support for deterrent studies and a control program concerning polar bears, and formulation of the wildlife management plan at Cape Churchill. In addition, continuing assistance is provided to the Wildlife Advisory and Planning Board under the Northern Flood Agreement.

Initiatives for 1985-86 included:

- 83 land use applications (including cabin applications, lodge/outcamp applications, etc.) were reviewed with comments/recommendations provided.
- 26 licensing advisory committee applications were received and comments/recommendations were provided.
- Phases 2, 3 and 4 of the Limestone Environmental Impact Study were reviewed and comments/recommendations were submitted.
- 13 community workshops were conducted in six Northern Flood Agreement communities.
- 4 presentations were made to special interest groups regarding environmental issues and concerns.

Please see Table 4E for specific details outlining the content and significant progress of these initiatives.

For the period of April 1, 1985 to March 31, 1986, expenditures of \$251,300 were incurred.

PROGRAM 5 - LOCAL GOVERNMENT DEVELOPMENT

The purpose of this program is to provide information services, training programs, and other developmental assistance to enhance the local government capabilities of those residents of communities under the jurisdiction of the Manitoba Department of Northern Affairs.

The program allocation is \$5,500,000 and is funded 100% by the provincial government. Activities included within this program are implemented by the Manitoba Department of Northern Affairs, through the Local Government Development Division.

For the period of April 1, 1985 to March 31, 1986, the following project and activities were initiated at a cost of \$1,148,200.

A. Local Government Development:

The purpose of this project is to provide support and technical services to ensure that the municipal requirements of northern communities are met.

1. Local Government Services:

The purpose of this activity is to ensure that northern communities receive a basic level of informational services and training programs in order to stimulate the development of efficient local government.

Local Government Services is implemented by the Manitoba Department of Northern Affairs through its Thompson, The Pas, Dauphin, and Selkirk offices.

This activity provides a co-ordination and advisory service in a number of diverse areas, including monitoring and advising northern communities on local affairs and legislative policy, directing and assisting local government administration and developing local government capacities for community delivered projects.

Fifty-eight capital projects were undertaken and delivered by various communities in 1985-86. Of this total, fifty-three projects were entirely community delivered. Five projects were jointly delivered by both the communities involved and the Local Government Development Division of the Department of Northern Affairs. These projects are complemented by the training of community councils and employees in such functions as local hiring procedures, tenders administration, material purchases and project monitoring.

Financial assistance for community projects including material, labour and equipment costs are appropriated within the various activities of Program 13. For further details about the actual implementation of capital projects under the Northern Development Agreement, please refer to Tables 13A to 13D of this report.

During fiscal year 1985/86, the communities of Duck Bay, Waterhen, Sherridon, South Indian Lake, Seymourville and Wabowden advanced their autonomy level from self-administration to block funding.

For the period of April 1, 1985 to March 31, 1986, expenditures of \$584,400 were incurred.

2. Technical Services:

The purpose of this activity is to ensure the municipal requirements of northern communities are met through the provision of technical and support services.

This activity is implemented by the Technical Services Branch of the Local Government Development Division of the Manitoba Department of Northern Affairs.

Technical Services provides co-ordination for local fire and emergency training by assisting community and regional fire departments with financial administration, equipment purchases, and inventory management services; co-ordinates the organization of the tri-annual community census; co-ordinates the hiring of community constables and the acquisition of related equipment; provides engineering and design services related to capital projects and community infrastructure; and provides training for maintenance and operation of community sewer and water systems. Additional training programs provided include seminars for municipal government staff on various aspects of community administration.

For the period of April 1, 1985 to March 31, 1986, expenditures of \$563,800 were incurred.

PROGRAM: 6

CANADA CAREER OPPORTUNITIES

The purpose of this program is to increase the participation of Indigenous people in the Public Service of Canada by increasing employment opportunities in technical category positions. The program supports the recruitment and training of Indigenous residents of Manitoba, and of northern Manitoba in particular, in developmental positions within federal departments and agencies.

The program allocation is \$2,400,000 and is funded 100% by Canada (DRIE). The program is implemented by the federal Department of Regional Industrial Expansion with the assistance of the Public Service Commission, Manitoba region. In 1985/86, exp enditures in support of the program were \$391,903.

In 1985/86, the program manager resigned, a program officer and a support clerk continued to carry out the activities under the program.

During the year, a program brochure and procedures manual were updated, and initial contracts were developed. An inventory of technical category positions in federal departments and agencies in Manitoba was renewed. Consultation with these departments and agencies for their participation in the program was continued. The Liaison Officers for the Agreement participated in the selection of candidates.

In 1985/86, a total of 22 candidates were selected for training with federal departments - Environment Canada (7), Transport Canada (9), Health and Welfare Canada (5) and Communications Canada (1). Of this number, 16 remained engaged at March 31, 1986. During the year there was a utilization of 14 person years for such training.

PROGRAM 7

CANADA EMPLOYMENT PROGRAMS AND SERVICES

The purpose of this program is to provide for the direct federal funding of projects to provide northern residents of Manitoba with employment development and related employment services to assist their participation in northern economic activities.

The program allocation is \$40,000,000 with Canada (Employment and Immigration) funding the entire amount. The program is implemented by Employment and Immigration.

The program consists of two projects - Employment Development (\$25,000,000) and Employment Assistance (\$15,000,000).

Employment Development

The purpose of this project is to develop new approaches to short and long-term job creation and to provide employment opportunities for residents in Northern Manitoba. Under the project, activities include Job Corps, LEAD, Challenge '85, Section 38 of the Unemployment Insurance Act, Canada Works and three programs which form part of the Canadian Jobs Strategy announced in September, 1985. In 1985/86, expenditures were \$5,721,438.

Employment Assistance

The purpose of this project is to provide employment assistance to residents of Northern Manitoba through the services of the Canada Employment Centres. Under the project, activities include Mobility, National Training Programs, CTST, Career Access, and OUTREACH. In 1985/86, expenditures were \$2,815,284.

* Special Note - Program 7 Expenditures

Employment Development

In 1985/86, \$5,721,400 is reported which expends the commitment of \$25,000,000. CEIC, however, continues to provide funding substantially over and above this amount in support of Northern Manitoba initiatives which are not reflected in this report.

Employment Assistance

In 1985/86, \$2,815,400 is reported which expends the commitment of \$15,000,000. CEIC, however, continues to provide funding substantially over and above this amount in support of Northern Manitoba initiatives which are not reflected in this report.

PROJECT

EMPLOYMENT DEVELOPMENT

Job Corps and LEAD

Long-term job creation programs fall within the mandate of the Local Employment Assistance and Development (LEAD) program and Job Corps.

Challenge '85

This program is a component of Canada Works designed to provide productive summer employment for students. In 1985/86, northern students received employment under this program.

Section 38 of the Unemployment Insurance Act (UIA)

This program is the utilization of the UIA benefits for mounting employment projects.

Canada Works

Canada Works created incremental productive short-term employment for unemployed persons.

*Job Development

This program is designed to develop the long-term labour market potential in people experiencing chronic unemployment by providing a combination of work experience and skill training.

*Skill Shortages

Skill Shortages provides employers with financial assistance to train workers in areas where skills are in high demand.

*Skill Investment

Skill Investment is designed to help employees threatened with technological change by providing training combined with work experience.

* These programs form part of the Canadian Jobs Strategy announced in September, 1985. $^{\circ}$

PROJECT

EMPLOYMENT ASSISTANCE

Human Resource Development Planning - Limestone Project

A major initiative was undertaken in 1985/86 to identify that portion of the northern labour force which was mobile and wished to work on the Limestone Hydro project. The initiative entailed

visiting each northern community, interviewing all persons who identified themselves as wishing employment at the development, and documenting their work qualifications, employment history and employment aspirations. This was done jointly with the Provincial Northern Employment Support Services.

Each northern Canada Employment Centre was linked to an on-line computer system and all job-ready northerners were then entered into the system to ensure that qualified northern residents would not be overlooked when employment opportunities at the project arose.

In 1985/86, 486 northern residents were placed in jobs at the Limestone project.

Job Referral and Placement

In matching people with available jobs, Canada Employment Centres referred 9,074 northern residents to employment and placed 2,799 people in jobs.

Itinerant service workers and employment counsellors visited and interviewed 2,513 employers in the Northern Development Agreement area for the purpose of delivering employer programs and services, identifying vacancies and marketing clients.

Canada Manpower Mobility Program

This program provides assistance to people allowing them to travel to other locations in Canada for job interviews, to relocate after work has been found, special testing to assist in training plans, etc.

National Training Program (Institutional)

Training places are purchased from Manitoba Community Colleges for skill development, language training, academic upgrading and in-school training for apprentices. In addition to this, there is provision for income support through trainee allowances or unemployment insurance and for the cost of travelling to and from the course if the course is outside of the home community. Courses may be held in major centres such as Winnipeg, The Pas or Thompson, or may be based in a remote community.

National Training Program (Industrial)

This program provided on-the-job training and allowed employers to train people with special needs in the workplace instead of in a classroom. Employers were reimbursed for certain costs of training as well as a percentage of wages paid to trainees.

The Industrial Training program has now been replaced by other programs of the Canadian Jobs Strategy.

Critical Trades Skills Training (CTST)

This program provided for the training of highly skilled workers by an employer in selected occupations experiencing national skills shortages. The employer was reimbursed for certain training costs as well as a percentage of wages paid to trainees. The selected occupations eligible for this program include welding, heavy duty mechanics, aircraft mechanics, industrial electronics and industrial mechanics.

This program has now been replaced by the Skill Shortages and Skill Investment programs of the Canadian Jobs Strategy.

Career Access

This program provided wage subsidies to employers who created on-the-job learning, work experience and work/study opportunities to members of target groups, enabling them to improve their work skills.

This program has now been replaced by programs of the Canadian Jobs Strategy.

Outreach Services

Outreach projects employed workers to extend CEIC services to outlying communities.

PROGRAM: 8

INDIAN PROFESSIONAL DEVELOPMENT

The purpose of this program is to provide assistance which will increase the participation of registered Canadian Indians of Manitoba in professional, para-professional, technical, administrative and skilled jobs through post-secondary and other educational activities with related support services.

The program allocation is \$10,200,000 and is funded 100% by Canada (DIAND). For 1985/86, total expenditures for display under the Northern Development Agreement (NDA) were \$3,336,086.

Under the <u>Indian Professional Development Project</u> the following six activities may be implemented. In 1985/86, 5 of these activities incurred expenditures.

- 1. Regular University Training assistance was given to 200 students enrolled at universities, community colleges and other post-secondary institutions. In 1985/86, expenditures incurred for display under the NDA were \$1,333,000.
- 2. PENT (Project for Education of Native Teachers) assistance was given to 90 teacher aides enrolled at Brandon University for teacher-training. In 1985/86, expenditures for display under the NDA were \$346,500.
- 3. Mature Entry Program assistance was given to 25 persons attending Brandon University as "mature" students. In 1985/86, expenditures for display under the NDA were \$182,500.
- 4. Support to BUNTEP Facilities DIAND may provide support for the provision of teaching facilities and utility services to a number of BUNTEP centres on Indian Reserves. In 1985/86, BUNTEP facilities were located on the following Reserves: Berens River, Fairford, Cross Lake, Norway House and Peguis. In 1985/86 no expenditures were displayed under the NDA.
- 5. Occupational Skills Training assistance was given to 167 persons enrolled in educational centres for job training, academic upgrading and occupational skills training. Types of activities included general welding, carpentry, electrical, plumbing, auto mechanics, clerk-typing, job readiness and on-the-job-training. In 1985/86, expenditures for display under the NDA were \$1,118,586.
- 6. Indian Band Staff Training assistance was given to 79 Band Chiefs, Councils and their senior staff members in financial management, welfare administration, law enforcement and other training courses. In 1985/86, expenditures for display under the NDA were \$355,500.

During the past year, Indian Professional Development as displayed under the NDA has been delivered by many Indian organizations. Contribution Agreements relating to the administration and financial control of all activities under the program were entered into between DIAND and the following northern Indian organizations.

PROGRAM 9 - NORTHERN MANITOBA AFFIRMATIVE ACTION

The purpose of this program is to increase the participation of northern residents, particularly those of native ancestry, in technical, professional, and para-professional opportunities.

The program allocation is \$41,700,000 over the 5-year term of the Agreement and is cost-shared (60/40%) between the federal and provincial governments.

For the period April 1, 1985 to March 31, 1986, the following projects and activities were implemented by the province at a cost of \$8,993,600.

A. Career Training:

The purpose of this project is to provide residents of northern Manitoba with opportunities for direct employment training.

1. New Careers:

The purpose of this activity is to provide northern Manitobans, particularly those of native ancestry, with an alternative adult post-secondary education and training program leading to meaningful full-time employment in the public and private sectors. The community-based education approach combines classroom instruction with on-the-job training.

This activity is implemented by the Manitoba Department of Employment Services and Economic Security.

Please see the attached Table 9A for details of the activity.

For the period of April 1, 1985 to March 31, 1986 expenditures of \$1,674,200 were incurred.

B. <u>BUNTEP</u> (Brandon University Northern Teacher Education Program)

The purpose of this project is to increase the participation of residents of northern Manitoba in employment opportunities through the provision of a field-based teacher training program.

1. BUNTEP

The purpose of this activity is to stabilize the supply of teachers in northern and remote communities.

This activity is implemented by the Manitoba Department of Education through its Adult and Continuing Education Branch.

This activity provides for field based post-secondary teacher training, delivered in accordance with an agreement between the Department of Education and Brandon University. The activity provides students with financial assistance as well as academic and personal support.

Please see the attached Table 9B for details of the activity's enrollment statistics by location.

For the period of April 1, 1985 to March 31, 1986, expenditures of \$3,059,200 were incurred.

C. ACCESS:

The purpose of this project is to increase the participation of northern residents, particularly those of native ancestry, in employment opportunities through the provision of post-secondary education and training.

These activities are implemented by the Manitoba Department of Education through its Adult and Continuing Education Branch.

These activities provide students with financial assistance as well as academic and personal support.

For the period of April 1, 1985 to March 31, 1986 expenditures of \$4,260,200 were incurred, including costs for ACCESS support services (\$415,000), as well as expenditures in the following activities:

1. ACCESS - University of Manitoba (U.M.A.P.)

The purpose of this activity is to increase accessibility of northern Manitobans to a university education.

For the period of April 1, 1985 to March 31, 1986, expenditures of \$1,499,500 were incurred.

2. ACCESS - Red River Community College (Community College Access Program) (C.C.A.P.)

The purpose of this activity is to increase accessibility of northern Manitobans to a community college education.

For the period of April 1, 1985 to March 31, 1986, expenditures of \$615,200 were incurred.

3. ACCESS - Brandon General Hospital (B.G.H.)

The purpose of this activity is to increase accessibility of northern Manitobans to a registered nursing training program.

This program has been phased out, with the final three graduates completing in 1985/86. The program has been replaced with the Northern Nursing Program.

For the period of April 1, 1985 to March 31, 1986, no expenditures were incurred.

4. ACCESS - Northern Nursing Program

The purpose of this activity is to increase accessibility of northern Manitobans to registered nursing training. This program is delivered off-campus in Thompson.

For the period of April 1, 1985 to March 31, 1986 expenditures of \$870,500 were incurred.

5. ACCESS - Northern Bachelor of Social Work Program

The purpose of this activity is to increase the accessibility of northern Manitobans to a Bachelor of Social Work degree program. This program is delivered off-campus in Thompson.

For the period of April 1, 1985 to March 31, 1986 expenditures of \$860,000 were incurred.

PROGRAM 10 - RELOCATION AND SUPPORT SERVICES

The purpose of this program is to increase employment opportunities as well as provide related support services to northern Manitobans, particularly those of native ancestry.

The program allocation is \$6,700,000 and is cost-shared (60/40%) between the federal and provincial governments.

Activities within this program are implemented by the Manitoba Department of Employment Services and Economic Security.

For the period of April 1, 1985 to March 31, 1986, the following project and activity was initiated at a cost of \$1,669,600.

A. Employment Services:

1. Employment Counselling and Support Services:

The purpose of this project and its related activity is to increase employment opportunities for and provide related support services to northern Manitobans, particularly those of native ancestry.

The activity is implemented by the Manitoba Department of Employment Services and Economic Security through its Churchill, Thompson, The Pas/Flin Flon, Leaf Rapids and Lake Winnipeg offices.

This activity assists northern residents in taking advantage of employment and/or training opportunities by providing counselling, relocation services and financial assistance. In addition, a co-ordinated employment service entailing information about jobs and training programs is provided.

Please see the attached Table 10 for details of the activity's initiatives and participation.

For the period of April 1, 1985 to March 31, 1986, expenditures of \$1,669,600 were incurred.

PROGRAM 11 - YOUTH DEVELOPMENT

The purpose of this program is to provide opportunities for young residents of northern Manitoba to participate in activities which prepare them to enter the labour force.

The program allocation is \$3,500,000 and is cost-shared (60/40%) between the federal and provincial governments. Activities included within this program are implemented by the Provincial Departments of Agriculture and Employment Services and Economic Security.

For the period of April 1, 1985 to March 31, 1986, the following projects and activities were initiated at a cost of \$664,100.

A. Career Awareness:

The purpose of this project is to broaden the awareness and experience of young people by providing activities which increase career opportunities and which provide participation in work experience.

1. Youth Corps:

The purpose of this activity is to assist northern youth, particularly those of native ancestry, in obtaining summer employment which pertains to community improvement.

This activity is implemented by the Manitoba Department of Employment Services and Economic Security through its Northern Employment Support Services Branch.

PROGRAM: 12

COMMUNITY SERVICES FOR NORTHERN INDIAN COMMUNITIES

The purpose of this program is to provide an established base level of local services to northern Indian Reserves and Status Indian communities.

The program allocation is \$12,000,000 and is funded 100% by Canada (DIAND). The identification of activities, under the projects of the program, is based upon comprehensive community plans and a priority of community needs as determined by DIAND and Indian Band Councils.

The following projects may be implemented under the program. In 1985/86, 2 of these projects incurred costs under the NDA of \$734,008.

A - Community Roads

This project provides for the design, construction and/or upgrading of internal transportation systems. In 1985/86, expenditures under the NDA were \$733,708. See Table 12A.

B - Safe Water Supply Systems

This project provides for one or more sources of potable water with rudimentary or higher level of delivery systems as warranted. In 1985/86, expenditures under the NDA were \$300. See Table 12B.

C - Fire Prevention/Protection

This project provides for fire-fighting equipment, the training of local volunteers and fire prevention activities. In 1985/86, no expenditures were incurred under the NDA.

D - Public Works Facilities

Facilities related to community services (e.g. community hall, multi-purpose administrative building) are supported under this project. In 1985/86, no expenditures were incurred under the NDA.

E - Waste Management

This project provides facilities for the disposal of waste material. In 1985/86, no expenditures were incurred under the NDA.

F - Planning Services

This project provides planning services for infrastructure activities. In 1985/86, no expenditures under the NDA were incurred.

PROGRAM 13 - COMMUNITY SERVICES FOR NORTHERN PROVINCIAL COMMUNITIES

The purpose of this program is to provide an established base level of local services to northern remote communities under the jurisdiction of the Manitoba Department of Northern Affairs. Such services include community roads, safe water and sewer, fire prevention and protection, public works facilities, and waste management.

The program is implemented by the Manitoba Departments of Northern Affairs and Highways and Transportation.

The program allocation is \$12,000,000 and is cost-shared (60/40%) between the federal and provincial governments.

For the period of April 1, 1985 to March 31, 1986, the following projects and activities were initiated at a cost of \$3,557,100.

A. Community Roads:

The purpose of this project is to construct or upgrade the northern internal community transportation system in order to improve the delivery of goods and public services, as well as provide for safe movement of northern residents.

Internal Roads and Transportation Facilities:

The purpose of this activity is to design, construct and/or upgrade the northern internal community transportation system.

This activity is implemented by the Manitoba Departments of Northern Affairs and Highways and Transportation.

For the period of April 1, 1985 to March 31, 1986, no expenditures were incurred under the Northern Development Agreement. (Note: The full amount of the Northern Development Agreement allocation to Community Roads has been expended. The services provided through this activity are now being funded 100% by the provincial government.)

B. Safe Water and Sewer:

Safe Water and Sewer:

The purpose of this project and its related activity is to provide for a basic level of potable water service to rural and remote northern communities, as well as a higher level of water and sewer service to those communities more advanced in townsite organization.

This activity is implemented by the Manitoba Department of Northern Affairs.

Please see the attached Table 13A for further details.

For the period of April 1, 1985 to March 31, 1986, expenditures of \$3.057,300 were incurred.

C. Fire Prevention and Protection:

1. Fire Prevention and Protection:

The purpose of this project and its related activity is to provide for a basic level of fire fighting and protection service to rural and remote northern communities through the construction of fire halls and equipment shelters, the purchase of equipment, and the offering of training programs.

This activity is implemented by the Department of Northern Affairs in co-operation with the Provincial Fire Commissioner's Office.

For the period of April 1, 1985 to March 31, 1986, expenditures of \$155,200 were incurred.

PROGRAM 14 - REMOTE AIRSTRIPS

The purpose of this program is to provide year-round, reliable, all-weather airstrips and related facilities in rural and remote northern communities which do not have alternative or adequate means of transportation. The program allocation is 3,300,000 and is cost-shared 60/40% between the federal and provincial governments.

Projects within this program are implemented by the Provincial Department of Highways through its Airport and Marine Division.

A. Air Transportation Facilities:

1. Airport Development:

The purpose of this project and its related activity is to provide remote and northern communities with all-weather airstrips and facilities to improve the movement of people, goods, and services, as well as to improve medical and other evacuation capabilities.

This activity is implemented by the Manitoba Department of Highways through its Airport and Marine Division.

In 1985/86, expenditures under this activity were directed towards the construction of an airstrip at Tadoule Lake.

For the period of April 1, 1985 to March 31, 1986, expenditures of \$1,520,400 were incurred.

PROGRAM: 15

MANAGEMENT

This program provides for the management and coordination of the Northern Development Agreement by Canada, through a Northern Development office in Thompson. In particular, the office was established by the Department of Regional Industrial Expansion (DRIE) to coordinate northern economic development programs under the Agreement with other federal and provincial complementary programs. The Thompson office, in addition, is to provide for consultation measures with the northern and native public on how best to achieve the objectives of the Agreement.

The program allocation is \$2,400,000 and it is implemented and funded 100% by Canada (DRIE). In 1985/86, expenditures under the program were \$569,089.

There are two activities in the program - Northern Development Office and Program Advisory Committees.

The Northern Development Office

During the year, two DRIE staff members were transferred from Thompson to Winnipeg. One of these members was an officer who was transferred to the Tourism Development Agreement because of lack of activity under Program 3 of the NDA. The other was the Information Officer who continues to provide service to the Thompson office from Winnipeg.

Officers from CEIC and DIAND and their support staff continued to be located in Thompson to assist in the federal coordination of programs under the Agreement.

Consultation services were effected through the Program Advisory Committees and through the renewed services of two Liaison Coordinators, one representing the Manitoba Keewatinowi Okimakinak Incorporated (Status Indians) and the other representing the Manitoba Metis Federation (Metis and Non-Status Indians).

In 1985/86, administrative expenditures in support of the Thompson office were \$546,289 (excluding salaries).

Program Advisory Committees

In 1985/86, the Program Advisory Committee met 8 times to review proposals under Programs 1 and 2. (See projects approved under Program 1 and 2.)

The advisory committee established to assist in the implementation of Program 3 met once in 1985/86. A total of four possible project proposals under Program 3 could result from studies conducted previously and which were completed in 1985/86.

In 1985/86, expenditures in support of this activity were \$22,800.

PROGRAM: 16

PUBLIC INFORMATION

This program is to inform the northern and general public about the strategy, objectives, programs and projects under the Agreement; to develop communication techniques and to ensure a coordinated federal/provincial public information system.

The program allocation is \$1,000,000 and is funded 100% by Canada (DRIE). In 1985/86, expenditures in support of the program were \$178.283.

During the year, much activity related to printed matter. Fact sheets about the NDA were revised and updated. An Update summarizing all programs was printed. The NDA press release system was broadened. The video tape was completed and has been distributed to various organizations including the Mikisew News, and has been viewed under that program.

Signs were erected at a number of NDA project sites. Two floor displays were updated, one covering the Agreement in general and the other relating to programs under the human development sector. A display at the Thompson airport has been in place during 1985/86.

Work was completed on producing informational audio programming to explain the NDA in English, Cree and Island Lake dialect using the rebroadcast facilities of NCI radio.

During the year, a number of community meetings and workshops were supported in various locations. At the end of the year, a set of NDA communications guidelines was being developed with the Province.

PROGRAM: 17

EVALUATION AND CONSULTATION

This program is to conduct an evaluation exercise to assess the effectiveness of programs and projects in achieving the objectives of the Agreement. In addition, the program is to provide for consultative meetings between the Ministers' Committee and Agreement Advisory Committee, and to provide for other measures to support the participation of northern and native residents.

The program allocation is \$1,000,000 and is cost-shared between Canada (DRIE, 60%) and Manitoba (40%). The program is implemented by the federal Department of Regional Industrial Expansion. In 1985/86, expenditures were \$100,417.

There are two activities in the program - Evaluation and Consultation.

EVALUATION

Management Board had appointed an Evaluation Sub-Committee in 1983/84 to establish an evaluation plan. This plan and its associated budget was produced and presented to/approved by Management Board.

In January of 1986, the Agreement Advisory Committee indicated their desire to participate in the evaluation process through a separate "native-directed" comprehensive evaluation of the Agreement. The Co-Managers accepted in principle this proposal and are awaiting detailed information prior to any funding commitments. In addition, in anticipation of future funding requirements for such an evaluation, the original evaluation plan has been revised to focus on the following programs: Program 1 (Community/Regional Economic Development Planning); Program 2 (Resource Opportunity Development); Program 9 (Northern Manitoba Affirmative Action); and Program 13 (Community Services for Northern Provincial Communities). In 1985/86, expenditures related to evaluation were \$8,500.

CONSULTATION

In 1985/86, the contracts with the Manitoba Metis Federation and the Manitoba Keewatinowi Okimakinak were renewed for one year. The two Liaison Officers engaged by these contracts were to continue giving information about the Agreement to the public and to provide feedback to the Management Board from the public.

Two joint meetings between the Management Board and the Agreement Advisory Committee were held to review major issues related to the Agreement, in October, 1985, and in January, 1986.

In 1985/86, expenditures related to consultation were \$91,917.

PROGRAM 18 - CO-ORDINATION

The purpose of this program is to provide for the administration, co-ordination and management of the Northern Development Agreement by Manitoba, to ensure the effective participation of all associated provincial departments and agencies. The program allocation is \$2,300,000 and is funded 100% by the provincial government.

For the period of April 1, 1985 to March 31, 1986, the following project and activity was implemented at a cost of \$177,900.

A. Northern Development Agreement Management:

1. Agreement Management:

This activity is implemented by the Manitoba Department of Northern Affairs through the Northern Development Agreement Branch of the Agreements Management and Co-ordination Division.

In general, the Northern Development Agreement Branch provides for:

- The monitoring and supervision of agreement-related programming to ensure programs were consistent with both the terms of the Northern Development Agreement and the policies of the Province of Manitoba.
- 2. The establishment and maintenance of effective inter-jurisdictional as well as intra-jurisdictional liaison, consultation and co-ordination with federal and provincial departments in areas of joint and parallel programming.

- 3. The maintenance of information systems to ensure an effective and efficient monitoring and analysis of agreement related issues, performance and progress.
- 4. Information to northern residents concerning Northern
 Development Agreement programs, both with respect to
 program participation and input as well as available
 resource and development opportunities.

During the period of this report, initiatives undertaken by the branch included:

- 1. Assistance to provincial departments with respect to the annual preparation and presentation of financial estimates.
- 2. Direct participation in Program Advisory Committee meetings (7 in 1985/86) with respect to the provision of assistance and the analysis of projects.
- 3. The preparation and presentation of relevant information pertaining to provincial programs for Management Board and the Agreement Advisory Committee.
- 4. Ongoing assistance to the Evaluation Sub-Committee of the Northern Development Agreement, and preparation of materials pertaining to the evaluation process.
- 5. Collection and analysis of provincial program performance data on a monthly and quarterly basis. Also, a six-month performance report was produced and published in conjunction with the federal government.
- 6. The collection and analysis of progress report information on provincially implemented programs throughout the report period. Planning, production and publication of the NDA progress report was jointly undertaken and accomplished by

the Northern Development Agreement Branch and federal representatives.

7. A work plan for fiscal year 1986-87 was drafted and distributed to relevant provincial departments and agencies.

For the period of April 1, 1985 to March 31, 1986 expenditures of \$177,900 were incurred.
