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FOREWORD

The Canada/Manitoba Northern Development Agreement was signed November of 1982 and was originally scheduled to expire on March 31, 1987. On November 17, 1987 the Northern Development Agreement 1982-87 was extended for two years until March 31, 1989. The total funding committed to the extension by both jurisdictions is \$75.35 million. This increased the total funding by both governments to \$261.55 million to 1989. During the period of 1982-89, the Government of Canada committed \$173.21 million and the Government of Manitoba \$88.34 million.

This report, recording progress achieved during the sixth year of the Agreement, (April 1, 1987 to March 31, 1988), begins with a discussion of the Northern Development Agreement, detailing the Agreement's background, strategy, management, financial structure and program structure. This section is followed by the main body of the report, which parallels the format of the Agreement; that is, the Agreement's programming is divided into programs, projects and activities. A summary of expenditures for 1987/88 is provided at the back of the report.

The Co-Managers responsible for the management of the Agreement wish to acknowledge the contributions of those members of the Federal and Provincial departments who submitted, compiled and edited the information presented in this publication.

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NORTHERN DEVELOPMENT AGREEMENTI. Introduction

On November 29, 1982, the governments of Canada and Manitoba signed the Canada/Manitoba Northern Development Agreement. This Agreement has the following objectives:

- a) to develop locally-based income and employment opportunities;
- b) to increase participation of the northern labour force in employment opportunities, particularly in major resource sectors;
- c) to facilitate increased participation of individuals in northern development by removing physical barriers to human and economic development.

On November 17, 1987 the Canada-Manitoba Northern Development Agreement 1982-87 was extended for two years until March 31, 1989. The total funding committed to the extension by both jurisdictions is \$75,350,000, this increased the total funding by both governments to \$261.55 million to 1989. During the period 1982-89, the Government of Canada committed \$173.21 million and the Government of Manitoba \$88.34 million.

Canada and Manitoba agreed that the two year extension to the Northern Development Agreement will ensure continuity of the programs while providing the opportunity to review the future of regional development strategies in the northern area of the province and to consult with Native people on the future direction of Native economic programs currently offered by the Department of Regional Industrial Expansion.

This amended Agreement reflects a continuing commitment by both levels of government to a development strategy which began in 1974 with the Canada/Manitoba Northlands Agreement.

II. Background - Canada/Manitoba Northlands Agreement

In June 1974, Canada and Manitoba entered into a 10-year General Development Agreement (GDA) for the purpose of selecting and implementing initiatives for the economic and socio-economic development of northern Manitoba. Under the GDA, the Manitoba Northlands Interim Agreement (1974-1976) was signed. This was followed by the Manitoba Northlands Long-Term Agreement (1976-1982). The initiatives under this Agreement were to form an integral part of a strategy designed to encourage the long-term development of northern Manitoba.

III. Strategy

The Northlands Agreement supported socio-economic development measures and assisted in the placement of rudimentary services for rural and remote northern communities. While assistance for programs with these objectives is still required, consultation with northern and Native peoples for a new agreement revealed a need to assist long-term economic development.

IV. The Northern Development Agreement (1982-1989)

The Northern Development Agreement places a greater emphasis on local economic activities through the utilization of the natural resources available. At the same time, the Agreement recognizes that human development measures and community improvements are still required.

V. Northern Development Agreement - Management and Co-ordination

The management structure of the Agreement includes a Ministers' Committee and a Management Board. An Agreement Advisory Committee has been established to assist the Ministers' Committee and Program Advisory Committees have been formed to help the Management Board.

The Ministers' Committee is comprised of the federal Principal Minister (from the Department of Regional Industrial Expansion or as designated), and the provincial Principal Minister (from the Department of Northern Affairs).

An Agreement Advisory Committee has been appointed by the Ministers' Committee. This Advisory Committee has eight members who represent northern and Native organizations. Its purpose is to review the progress of programs and projects under the Agreement and to advise on future directions and any other matters referred to them by the Ministers.

A Management Board has been constituted to provide overall management and co-ordination of the Agreement. There are eight members on the Board, four of whom represent federal departments or agencies (Regional Industrial Expansion, Employment and Immigration, Indian Affairs and Northern Development, Public Service Commission) and four of whom represent provincial departments (Northern Affairs, Natural Resources, Employment Services and Economic Security and Manitoba Energy Authority).

Program Advisory Committees have been established by the Management Board to assist in the effective implementation of Programs 1, 2 and 3. Each committee has eight members who represent northern and Native organizations and related federal and provincial departmental officials.

Consultation with Northern Residents

It is the intent of the Northern Development Agreement to provide mechanisms which will allow for effective consultation with the residents of northern Manitoba. Several mechanisms have been developed:

1. The Agreement Advisory Committee which advises the Ministers has the following representation:
 - two elected officials from each of the:
 - Northern Association of Community Councils
 - Manitoba Métis Federation
 - Manitoba Keewatinowi Okimakanak Inc.
 - one elected official from each of the:
 - First Nations Confederacy
 - Brotherhood of Indian Nations
2. The Program Advisory Committee, which supports the Management Board in the implementation of Program 1 (Community/Regional Economic Development Planning) and Program 2 (Resource Opportunity Development), has the same representation from northern and Native organizations as does the Agreement Advisory

Committee. In addition, there is a similar committee which has been established to consider projects under Program 3 (Northeast Manitoba Development).

VI. Financial Structure

The delivery of programs under the Northern Development Agreement involves a mix of:

- programs funded and delivered by the federal government;
- programs funded and delivered by the provincial government;
- programs cost-shared between Canada and Manitoba and delivered by the federal government;
- programs cost-shared between Canada and Manitoba and delivered by the provincial government.

VII. Northern Development Agreement Program Structure

The Northern Development Agreement attempts to fulfill its objectives by delivering activities under the following four sectors:

- a) Community Economic Development
- b) Human Development
- c) Community Improvement
- d) Management and Consultation

Each sector is divided into programs, projects and activities.

Sector A - Community Economic Development - \$71.8 million

Objective:

- Stimulate and respond to locally-based income and employment opportunities.
- Provide a development program for northeast Manitoba.
- Develop activities relating to northern resources such as forestry, wildlife and agriculture.
- Enhance development of local government in provincial communities.

Sector B: Human Development - \$144.2 million

Objective:

- Increase the participation of the northern labour force in northern employment opportunities through resource development.
- Co-ordinate the preparation of the northern labour force for employment by providing professional, technical and skills training opportunities.
- Provide opportunities for the youth of northern Manitoba to participate in pre-employment opportunities.

Sector C: Community Improvement - \$38.4 million

Objective:

- Provision of basic levels of community services in northern remote communities where extreme health and public safety disparities persist.

Sector D: Management and Consultation - \$7.2 million

Objective:

- Provision of the overall management of the Agreement, as well as planning, consultation, public information and evaluation of the progress and effectiveness of the Agreement.

PROGRESS BY PROGRAM

PROGRAM 1COMMUNITY/REGIONAL ECONOMIC DEVELOPMENT PLANNING

The purpose of this program is to assist local and regional groups and organizations in the identification and development of new employment opportunities. The program provides for the costs of undertaking analysis, feasibility studies, market research and an array of services necessary to develop sound economic development projects at the local and regional levels.

The program allocation is \$3,500,000 and is cost-shared between Canada (DRIE 60%) and Manitoba (40%). The program is implemented by the federal Department of Regional Industrial Expansion.

In 1987/88, 10 projects were recommended for support by the Program Advisory Committee, composed of representatives of northern and Native organizations and related government officials. Committed amounts to these 10 projects were \$455,350.

Expenditures totalling \$206,280 were incurred in 1987/88. Of this amount, \$49,260 relates to projects approved in 1987/88; \$100,540 relates to 1986/87; \$56,480 relates to 1985/86.

PROGRAM 2RESOURCE OPPORTUNITY DEVELOPMENT

The purpose of this program is to stimulate and respond to locally-developed economic development proposals which create new income and employment opportunities. The program provides support to projects which lead to long-term economic development in rural, remote and northern communities.

The program allocation is \$18,500,000 and is funded 100% by Canada (DRIE). The program is implemented by the federal Department of Regional Industrial Expansion.

In 1987/88, 21 projects were recommended for support by the same Program Advisory Committee as stated in Program 1. Committed amounts to these 21 projects were \$2,388,938.

Expenditures totalling \$2,292,704 were incurred in 1987/88 of which \$1,307,201 relates to projects approved in 1987/88; \$854,829 relates to 1986/87; \$109,900 relates to 1985/86; \$16,027 relates to 1984/85; and \$4,747 relates to projects approved in 1983/84.

PROGRAM 3NORTHEAST MANITOBA DEVELOPMENT

The purpose of this program is to provide for the planning and implementation of development measures for northeast Manitoba. The program provides support to the formulation of a development plan for the region, and to the identification, analysis, development and implementation of economic development proposals.

The program allocation is \$2,500,000 and is funded 100% by Canada (DRIE). The program is implemented by the federal Department of Regional Industrial Expansion.

In 1987/88, no new projects were approved for support by the Program 3 Advisory Committee, composed of representatives of northern and Native organizations and related government officials.

Expenditures totalling \$294,296 were incurred in 1987/88 in continuous support of six projects of which \$284,042 related to five projects approved in 1986/87 and \$10,254 to one project approved in 1985/86.

PROGRAM 4RESOURCE DEVELOPMENT

The purpose of this program is to contribute to the economic development of northern communities through the improved usage and management of northern resources while providing employment opportunities for northern residents.

The program allocation is \$40,000,000 and is funded 100% by the provincial government. Projects within this program are implemented by the Manitoba Departments of Agriculture and Natural Resources.

For the period of April 1, 1987 to March 31, 1988, the following projects and activities were initiated to a cost of \$14,142,000.

A. Forestry Management:

The purpose of this project is to assist in the renewal and the protection of forests while creating employment opportunities in northern Manitoba.

1. Forest Renewal:

The purpose of this activity is to provide for a continued supply of wood as well as to contribute to local economic development and employment opportunities.

This activity is implemented by the Manitoba Department of Natural Resources through its Forestry Branch.

This activity provides for initiatives such as site preparation for planting, manual and mechanical tree planting and regeneration surveys.

Please see the attached Table 4A for details of activity initiatives, hours of employment generated and employee type by location.

For the period of April 1, 1987 to March 31, 1988, total expenditures of \$2,061,900 were incurred.

2. Forest Fire Protection:

The purpose of this activity is to provide for the placing, equipping and maintaining of fire suppression crews in order to facilitate the effective protection of the forest resource.

This activity is implemented by the Manitoba Department of Natural Resources through its Regional Services Branch.

This activity provided for initiatives such as co-ordinating fire suppression training of selected local individuals, providing air and ground transportation to fire suppression crews and maintaining fire-tac and heli-tac crews at critical sites throughout the forested area of Manitoba. The activity also provides for detection observers assisted by approximately seven lightning strike locators under the Fire Detection Program, fire rangers under the Pre-Suppression Program, back-up to the Pre-Suppression, Fire-Tac and Heli-Tac Programs under the Extra Suppression Program and fire prevention awareness under the Fire Prevention Program.

Please see the attached Table 4B for details of the activity locations and employee breakdowns.

For the period of April 1, 1987 to March 31, 1988, total expenditures of \$11,356,200 were incurred.

B. Parks Development

1. Parks Development

The purpose of this project and its related activity is to provide for the construction and/or improvement of parks infrastructure in northern Manitoba in order to enhance utilization of recreational resources, as well as increase local employment.

For the period of April 1, 1987 to March 31, 1988, total expenditures of \$236,000 were incurred.

C. Agricultural Opportunities:

The purpose of this project is to provide for research, development and ongoing support for activities aimed at advancing agricultural production in northern Manitoba.

1. Northern Horticulture:

The purpose of this activity is to provide for the development of local horticultural skills, technical assistance in support of crop production and the provision of workshops and demonstrations on garden tunnel operations.

This activity is implemented by the Manitoba Department of Agriculture.

This activity provides such services as land-breaking, tilling, the provision of tillage equipment, research material and horticultural information, as well as workshops and demonstrations on garden and tunnel technique. Please see Table 4D for details of the activity's initiatives by community.

For the period of April 1, 1987 to March 31, 1988, total expenditures of \$82,100 were incurred.

Northern Horticulture provided technical back-up to the following semi-commercial projects:

4. Flin Flon - seasonal greenhouse operation - bedding plants.

6. Stevenson Island - five acre project expanding to thirty acre market garden.
7. Leaf Rapids - potato project.
8. Snow Lake - mixed self-sufficiency unit.
9. Wabowden
 - a) commercial greenhouse and market garden
 - b) beef cattle operation
 - c) forage seed operation
 - d) forage hay operation
 - e) planned small market garden
 - f) school greenhouse - bedding plants
10. Thompson - seasonal greenhouse operations - bedding plants.

2. Agricultural Development:

The purpose of this activity is to identify potentially viable agricultural Crown land in Manitoba's north. This activity will provide for initiatives based on a review of the Northern Agricultural Study.

This activity is implemented by the Manitoba Department of Agriculture.

For the period of April 1, 1987 to March 31, 1988, no expenditures were incurred under this activity.

3. Wild Rice:

The purpose of this activity is to assist residents of northern Manitoba to achieve a leading role in the wild rice industry.

This activity is implemented by the Manitoba Department of Natural Resources, through its Lands Branch offices in Winnipeg, The Pas and Thompson.

This activity provides for initiatives such as the licensing of wild rice producers; a wild rice seeding program to explore potentially productive areas; liaison and consultation with the Native Wild Rice Advisory Committee; and the provision of information, advice and technical support to producers and potential producers.

During 1987, research continued to be an important part of the Wild Rice Program. The Wild Rice Section continued five research projects on identified production problems: nutrients, seed maturation, seed viability, water level manipulation and remote sensing. These projects will continue during the summer months of 1988.

For the period of April 1, 1987 to March 31, 1988, a total of 437 licences, 45 harvest permits and 5 buyer's permits were issued.

The 1987 wild rice harvest yielded a province-wide production total of 1,650,000 pounds. Purchases made by wild rice buyers for 1987-88 totalled 1,470,000 pounds at an average price of \$.57 per pound.

For the period of April 1, 1987 to March 31, 1988, expenditures of \$174,800 were incurred.

D. Wildlife Management:

1. Community Wildlife Management:

The purpose of this project and its related activity is to provide for the protection and effective utilization of local wildlife resources in northern Manitoba.

This activity is implemented by the Manitoba Department of Natural Resources through its Wildlife Branch offices in Churchill and Thompson.

This activity provides for such initiatives as the continuation of Manitoba's commitments to the "Beverly and Kaminuriak Barren-ground Caribou Management Agreement", (an inter-jurisdictional management plan for barren-ground caribou), the extension of studies concerning the management of woodland caribou of Cape Churchill, support for deterrent studies and a control program concerning polar bears; and formulation of the wildlife management plan at Cape Churchill. In addition, continuing assistance is provided to the Wildlife Advisory and Planning Board under the Northern Flood Agreement.

Initiatives for 1987-88 included:

- 42 land use applications (including cabin applications, lodge/outcamp applications, etc.) were reviewed with comments/recommendations provided.
- 40 licensing advisory committee applications were received and comments/recommendations were provided.
- 3 presentations were made to special interest groups regarding environmental issues and concerns.

Please see Table 4E for specific details outlining the content and significant progress of these initiatives.

For the period of April 1, 1987 to March 31, 1988, expenditures of \$231,000 were incurred.

PROGRAM 5LOCAL GOVERNMENT DEVELOPMENT

The purpose of this program is to provide information services, training programs and other developmental assistance to enhance the local government capabilities of those residents of communities under the jurisdiction of the Manitoba Department of Northern Affairs.

The program allocation is \$7,300,000 and is funded 100% by the provincial government. Activities included within this program are implemented by the Manitoba Department of Northern Affairs, through the Local Government Development Division.

For the period April 1, 1987 to March 31, 1988, the following project and activities were initiated at a cost of \$1,106,500.

A. Local Government Development:

The purpose of this project is to provide support and technical services to ensure that the municipal requirements of northern communities are met.

1. Local Government Services:

The purpose of this activity is to ensure that northern communities receive a basic level of informational services and training programs in order to stimulate the development of efficient local government.

Local Government Services is implemented by the Manitoba Department of Northern Affairs through its Thompson, The Pas, Dauphin, and Selkirk offices.

This activity provides a co-ordination and advisory service in a number of diverse areas, including monitoring and advising northern communities on local affairs and legislative policy, directing and assisting local government administration and developing local government capacities for community delivered projects. Projects are complemented by the training of community councils and employees in such functions as local hiring procedures, tenders administration, material purchases and project monitoring.

During fiscal year 1987/88, the communities of Fisher Bay and Cormorant advanced from Trust to Self-Administration status.

For the period of April 1, 1987 to March 31, 1988, expenditures of \$552,500 were incurred.

2. Municipal Support:

The purpose of this activity is to ensure that the municipal requirements of northern communities are met through the provision of technical and support services.

This activity is implemented by the Municipal Support Services Branch of the Local Government Development Division of the Manitoba Department of Northern Affairs.

Municipal Support Services provides co-ordination for local fire and emergency training by assisting community and regional fire departments with financial administration, equipment purchases, and inventory management services; co-ordinates the organization of the tri-annual community census; co-ordinates the hiring of community constables and the acquisition of related equipment; provides engineering and design services related to capital projects and community infrastructure; and provides training for maintenance and operation of community sewer and water systems. Additional training programs provided include seminars for municipal government staff of various aspects of community administration.

For the period of April 1, 1987 to March 31, 1988, expenditures of \$554,000 were incurred.

PROGRAM 6CANADA CAREER OPPORTUNITIES

The purpose of this program is to increase the participation of Indigenous people in the Public Service of Canada by increasing employment opportunities in technical category positions. The program supports the recruitment and training of Indigenous residents of Manitoba, and of northern Manitoba in particular, in developmental positions within federal departments and agencies.

The program allocation is \$1,400,000 and is funded 100% by Canada (DRIE). The program is implemented by the federal Department of Regional Industrial Expansion, with the assistance of the Public Service Commission, Manitoba region. In 1987/88 expenditures in support of the program were \$167,277.

The Canada Career Opportunities Program was completed on March 31, 1988. During 1987/88, its implementation by a program officer and support clerk ended and administration, thereafter, was undertaken by the Human Resources unit of DRIE.

Of the 13 candidates engaged during 1987/88, 10 were appointed permanently to positions, two were transferred and one was released. Table 6 displays the placement of the candidates. A total of 7.25 person years were utilized for 1987/88.

PROGRAM 7CANADA EMPLOYMENT PROGRAMS AND SERVICESINTRODUCTION

The purpose of this program is to provide the direct federal funding of projects to provide residents of northern Manitoba with employment development and related services to assist their participation in northern economic activities.

The program allocation for the seven year term of the Agreement is \$56,000,000. Employment and Immigration Canada implements the program and provides 100% of the funding. In 1987-88, the program was implemented through two projects: Project A - Employment Services; and Project B - Canadian Jobs Strategy. For 1987/88, total expenditures for display under the Northern Development Agreement were \$4,934,673.

Project A - Employment Services

The objective of this project is to provide employment services to northern Manitoba employers, community organizations and individuals through a network of Canada Employment Centres and Outreach Projects. In 1987-88, expenditures displayed under the Northern Development Agreement were \$1,751,805. The project had two related activities:

Activity 1 - Services by Canada Employment Centres

In 1987-88, Canada Employment Centres in northern Manitoba referred 7,306 people to employers resulting in 2,698 job placements. A major portion of this activity entailed the referral and placement of northern residents at the Limestone Hydro Project; 587 northern residents were placed in jobs on the project.

During the fiscal year, a major initiative was undertaken to collect labour market information from employers in northern Manitoba. This information is used to advise both employers and those seeking employment about the supply of labour and the job opportunities available. Information was collected through over 1,500 interviews with employers. The information compiled included wage rates, turn-over rates and occupational qualifications requirements.

For 1987/88, total expenditures for display under the Northern Development Agreement was \$842,630.

Activity 2 - Outreach

Seventeen projects were supported under the Outreach Program. The projects, operated by agencies within the communities, provide a range of employment services to the respective communities as an extension of the Canada Employment Centres. Twenty-nine persons were employed by the sponsors of the projects.

A total of \$909,175 was spent on the projects under the Agreement. A list of the projects and the expenditures for each follows:

Project B - Canadian Jobs Strategy

The objective of this project is to assist eligible individuals to acquire necessary training, work experience or other services to enable them to take advantage of employment opportunities available and to assist eligible employers and employer associations to provide necessary training and other employment preparation activities for their employees.

In 1987/88, total expenditures for display under the Northern Development Agreement were \$3,182,868.

Activity 1 - Assistance to Individuals

Assistance available to northern residents under this activity includes the following measures:

- 1) Arrangements for enrollment, costs of training and income support for participation in institutional training courses and contracts and other arrangements with managing co-ordinators;
- 2) Assistance to relocate to employment or to explore potential employment in an area where designated skills are in demand;
- 3) Assistance to students for summer employment.

In 1987-88, expenditures incurred for display under the Northern Development Agrèement were \$1,000,000.

Activity 2 - Assistance to Employers and Employer Associations

Assistance available to northern residents under this activity includes the following measures:

- 1) Assistance for on-the-job training and institutional training in designated occupations for unemployed workers and for employed workers who require retraining to adapt to changing technology.
- 2) Assistance for on-the-job and institutional training as well as work experience for the long-term unemployed.

In 1987-88, expenditures incurred for diplay under the Northern Development Agreement were \$1,000,000.

Activity 3 - Direct Job Creation and Assistance to Communities

Assistance available to northern residents under this activity includes the following measures:

- 1) Financial assistance for projects through which short-term jobs are created;
- 2) Financial and consulting assistance for economic and community development.

In 1987-88, expenditures incurred for display under the Northern Development Agreement were \$1,182,868.

PROGRAM 8INDIAN PROFESSIONAL DEVELOPMENT

The purpose of this program is to provide assistance which will increase the participation of registered Canadian Indians of Manitoba in professional, para-professional, technical, administrative and skilled jobs through post-secondary and other educational activities with related support services.

The program allocation is \$14,200,000 and is funded 100% by Canada (DIAND). For 1987/88, total expenditures for display under the Northern Development Agreement (NDA) were \$2,001,200.

Under the Indian Professional Development Project, the following six activities may be implemented. In 1987/88, four of these activities incurred expenditures.

1. Regular University Training - assistance was given to 188 students enrolled at universities, community colleges and other post-secondary institutions. In 1987/88, expenditures incurred for display under the NDA were \$1,800,000.
2. PENT (Project for Education of Native Teachers) - assistance was given to eight teacher aides enrolled at Brandon University for teacher training. In 1987/88, expenditures for display under the NDA were \$22,000.
3. Mature Entry Program - assistance was given to 13 persons attending Brandon University as "mature" students. In 1987/88, expenditures for display under the NDA were \$49,200.
4. Support to BUNTEP Facilities - DIAND may provide support for the provision of teaching facilities and utility services to a number of BUNTEP centres on Indian Reserves. In 1987/88, no expenditures were displayed under the NDA. Actual costs are included within Regular University Training.
5. Occupational Skills Training - assistance was given to 75 persons enrolled in educational centres for job training, academic upgrading and occupational skills training. Types of activities included general welding, carpentry, electrical, plumbing, auto mechanics, clerk-typing, job readiness and on-the-job training. In 1987/88, expenditures for display under the NDA were \$130,000.
6. Indian Band Staff Training - No assistance under the NDA.

During the past year, Indian Professional Development, as displayed under the NDA, has been delivered by many Indian organizations. Contribution Agreements relating to the administration and financial control of all activities under the program were entered into between DIAND and the following northern Indian organizations:

PROGRAM 9NORTHERN MANITOBA AFFIRMATIVE ACTION

The purpose of this program is to increase the participation of northern residents, particularly those of Native ancestry, in technical, professional and para-professional opportunities.

The program allocation is \$59,400,000 over the 7-year term of the Agreement and is cost-shared (60/40%) between the federal and provincial governments.

For the period April 1, 1987 to March 31, 1988, the following projects and activities were implemented by the province at a cost of \$9,302,000.

A. Career Training:

The purpose of this project is to provide residents of northern Manitoba with opportunities for direct employment training.

1. New Careers:

The purpose of this activity is to provide northern Manitobans, particularly those of Native ancestry, with an alternative adult post-secondary education and training program leading to meaningful full-time employment in the public and private sectors. The community-based education approach combines classroom instruction with on-the-job training.

This activity is implemented by the Manitoba Department of Employment Services and Economic Security.

Please see the attached Table 9A for details of the activity.

For the period of April 1, 1987 to March 31, 1988, expenditures of \$2,014,900 were incurred.

OTJ - On-the-Job Training

B. BUNTEP (Brandon University Northern Teacher Education Program)

The purpose of this project is to increase the participation of residents of northern Manitoba in employment opportunities through the provision of a field-based teacher training program.

1. BUNTEP

The purpose of this activity is to stabilize the supply of teachers in northern and remote communities.

This activity is implemented by the Manitoba Department of Education through its Post-Secondary Career Development Branch.

This activity provides for field based post-secondary teacher training, delivered in accordance with an agreement between the Department of Education and Brandon University. The activity provides students with financial assistance, as well as academic and personal support.

Please see attached Table 9B for details of the activity's enrollment statistics by location.

For the period of April 1, 1987 to March 31, 1988, expenditures of \$3,010,000 were incurred.

C. ACCESS:

The purpose of this project is to increase the participation of northern residents, particularly those of Native ancestry, in employment opportunities through the provision of post-secondary education and training.

These activities are implemented by the Manitoba Department of Education through its Post-Secondary Career Development Branch.

These activities provide students with financial assistance, as well as academic and personal support.

For the period of April 1, 1987 to March 31, 1988, expenditures of \$4,277,100 were incurred. These costs were for ACCESS support services (\$31,900), as well as expenditures in the following activities.

1. ACCESS - University of Manitoba (U.M.A.P.)

The purpose of this activity is to increase the accessibility of northern Manitobans to a university education. A variety of degree level courses are available through various faculties at the University of Manitoba.

Included under this activity are the Special Pre-Medical Studies Program (SPSP) and the Professional Health Program (PHP), which are also delivered through the University of Manitoba. Under SPSP, students take the pre-medical courses required to continue medical studies. Upon completion of SPSP, students who are accepted into professional health faculties (eg. Medicine, Dentistry, Pharmacy) may be assisted under PHP.

For the period of April 1, 1987 to March 31, 1988, expenditures of \$1,599,500 were incurred.

2. Community College ACCESS Program (C.C.A.P.)

The purpose of this activity is to increase the accessibility of northern Manitobans to a community college education. A variety of courses are available at Red River Community College.

For the period of April 1, 1987 to March 31, 1988, expenditures of \$533,700 were incurred.

3. ACCESS - Northern Nursing Program

The purpose of this activity is to increase the accessibility of northern Manitobans to registered nursing training. This program is delivered in Thompson.

For the period of April 1, 1986 to March 31, 1987, expenditures of \$840,700 were incurred.

4. ACCESS - Northern Bachelor of Social Work Program

The purpose of this activity is to increase the accessibility of northern Manitobans to a Bachelor of Social Work degree program. This program is delivered in Thompson.

For the period of April 1, 1986 to March 31, 1987 expenditures of \$1,271,300 were incurred.

PROGRAM 10RELOCATION AND SUPPORT SERVICES

The purpose of this program is to increase employment opportunities as well as provide related support services to northern Manitobans, particularly those of Native ancestry.

The program allocation is \$9,400,000 and is cost-shared (60/40%) between the federal and provincial governments.

Activities within this program are implemented by the Manitoba Department of Employment Services and Economic Security.

For the period of April 1, 1987 to March 31, 1988, the following project and activity was initiated at a cost of \$1,710,300.

A. Employment Services:

1. Employment Counselling and Support Services:

The purpose of this project and its related activity is to increase employment opportunities for and provide related support services to northern Manitobans, particularly those of Native ancestry.

The activity is implemented by the Manitoba Department of Employment Services and Economic Security through its Churchill, Thompson/Limestone, The Pas/Flin Flon, Leaf Rapids and Lake Winnipeg Northern Employment and Support Services (NESS) offices.

The service delivered by Northern Employment and Support Services (NESS) include job creation, employment assistance, relocation support, youth employment and assistance in training identification. Counselling and financial assistance are provided to help individuals access any of the employment thrusts that are available. In 1987/88, NESS engaged approximately 3,700 northern residents, both Native and non-Native in all its activities.

Within its services, the NESS Thompson office provides specific support to the Limestone Hydro Project. An on-site counselling service has been established. Counsellors provide site orientations, personal counselling and crisis intervention focusing on work adjustment problems, cross-cultural adjustments and money management. During the past year 423 individuals were in contact with the Thompson/Limestone counselling centres.

As well, all NESS offices provide support to individuals before they arrive at the construction site. The regional offices disseminate information on employment opportunities at the Limestone site, register individuals, conduct pre-employment counselling and provide financial assistance for transportation, tools and/or work clothing. During the 1987/88 construction season, 154 individuals received financial assistance in support of employment at Limestone.

PROGRAM 11YOUTH DEVELOPMENT

The purpose of this program is to provide opportunities for young residents of northern Manitoba to participate in activities which prepare them to enter the labour force.

The program allocation is \$3,800,000 and is cost-shared (60/40%) between the federal and provincial governments. Activities included within this program are implemented by the Provincial Departments of Agriculture and Employment Services and Economic Security.

For the period of April 1, 1987 to March 31, 1988, the following projects and activities were initiated at a cost of \$660,600.

A. Career Awareness:

The purpose of this project is to broaden the awareness and experience of young people by providing activities which increase career opportunities and which provide participation in work experience.

1. Youth Corps:

The purpose of this activity is to assist northern youth, particularly those of Native ancestry, in obtaining summer employment which pertains to community improvement.

This activity is implemented by the Manitoba Department of Employment Services and Economic Security through its Northern Employment Support Services Branch.

Please see the attached Table 11A for details of the activity's sponsors, participation by region and statistics concerning youth and supervisors employed.

For the period of April 1, 1987 to March 31, 1988 expenditures of \$637,400 were incurred.

B. Leadership Training:

The purpose of this project is to provide youth with specific leadership skills in order that they may participate more effectively in community development.

1. 4-H North:

The purpose of this activity is to assist northern youth, particularly those of Native ancestry, in acquiring attitudes, knowledge and skills which will contribute towards social and economic development in northern Manitoba.

This activity is implemented by the Manitoba Department of Agriculture through its Technical Services and Training Branch.

This activity provides funding for member and leader transportation costs, as well as materials, manuals and supplies.

Projects undertaken by club members include those related to the areas of clothing, foods, handicrafts, beef, horses, outdoor living, photography, gardening and junior leadership.

Please see the attached Table 11B for details of 4-H club membership and leader participation by community.

For the period of April 1, 1987 to March 31, 1988 expenditures of \$23,200 were incurred.

PROGRAM 12COMMUNITY SERVICES FOR NORTHERN INDIAN COMMUNITIES

The purpose of this program is to provide an established base level of local services to northern Indian Reserves and Status Indian communities.

The program allocation is \$16,800,000 and is funded 100% by Canada (DRIE). The identification of activities, under the projects of the program, is based upon comprehensive community plans and a priority of community needs as determined by DIAND and Indian Band Councils.

The following projects may be implemented under the program. In 1987/88, three of these projects incurred costs under the NDA of \$2,848,200.

A. Community Roads

This project provides for the design, construction and/or upgrading of internal transportation systems. In 1987/88, expenditures under the NDA were \$1,915,900. (See Table 12A)

B. Safe Water Supply System

This project provides for one or more sources of potable water with rudimentary or higher level of delivery systems as warranted. Expenditures incurred under the NDA in 1987/88 were \$588,500. (See Table 12B)

C. Fire Prevention/Protection

This project provides for fire-fighting equipment, the training of local volunteers and fire prevention activities. In 1987/88, expenditures incurred under the NDA were \$343,800. (See Table 12C)

D. Public Works Facilities

Facilities related to community services (eg. community hall, multi-purpose administrative building) are supported under this project. In 1987/88, no expenditures were incurred under the NDA.

E. Waste Management

This project provides facilities for the disposal of waste material. In 1987/88, no expenditures were incurred under the NDA.

PROGRAM 13COMMUNITY SERVICES FOR NORTHERN PROVINCIAL COMMUNITIES

The purpose of this program is to provide an established base level of local services to northern remote communities under the jurisdiction of the Manitoba Department of Northern Affairs. Such services include community roads, safe water and sewer, fire prevention and protection, public works facilities and waste management.

The program is implemented by the Manitoba Departments of Northern Affairs and Highways and Transportation.

The program allocation is \$16,800,000 and is cost-shared (60-40%) between the federal and provincial governments.

For the period of April 1, 1987 to March 31, 1988, the following projects and activities were initiated at a cost of \$2,872,000.

A. Community Roads:

The purpose of this project is to construct or upgrade the northern internal community transportation system in order to improve the delivery of goods and public services, as well as provide for safe movement of northern residents.

1. Internal Roads and Transportation Facilities:

The purpose of this activity is to design, construct and/or upgrade the northern internal community transportation system.

This activity is implemented by the Manitoba Departments of Northern Affairs and Highways and Transportation.

For the period of April 1, 1987 to March 31, 1988, expenditures of \$480,100 were incurred.

PROGRAM 14REMOTE AIRSTRIPS

The purpose of this program is to provide year-round, reliable, all-weather airstrips and related facilities in rural and remote northern communities which do not have alternative or adequate means of transportation. The program allocation is \$4,750,000 and is cost-shared (60-40%) between the federal and provincial governments.

Projects within this program are implemented by the Provincial Department of Highways through its Airport and Marine Division.

A. Air Transportation Facilities:1. Airport Development:

The purpose of this project and its related activity is to provide remote and northern communities with all-weather airstrips and facilities to improve the movement of people, goods and services, as well as to improve medical and other evacuation capabilities.

This activity is implemented by the Manitoba Department of Highways through its Airport and Marine Division.

Please see the attached Table 14 for further details.

For the period of April 1, 1987 to March 31, 1988, expenditures of \$781,000 were incurred.

PROGRAM 15MANAGEMENT

The program provides for the management and co-ordination of the Northern Development Agreement by Canada, through a Northern Development Office in Thompson. In particular, the office was established by the Department of Regional Industrial Expansion (DRIE) to co-ordinate northern economic development programs under the Agreement with other federal and provincial complementary programs. The Thompson office, in addition, is to provide for consultation measures with the northern and Native public on how best to achieve the objectives of the Agreement.

The program allocation is \$3,200,000 and it is implemented and funded 100% by Canada (DRIE). In 1987/88, expenditures under the program were \$429,756.

There are two activities in the program - Northern Development Office and Program Advisory Committees.

The Northern Development Office

Three DRIE officers with support staff administered the program during the year. Two officers from CEIC and one support staff continued to be located in Thompson to assist in the federal co-ordination of programs under the Agreement. The officer from DIAND, earlier transferred to Winnipeg, continued to provide services to the Thompson office as required.

Consultation services were effected through the Program Advisory Committees and through the renewed services of one Liaison Co-ordinator, representing the Manitoba Keewatinowi Okimakinak Incorporated (Status Indians).

In 1987/88, administrative expenditures in support of the Thompson Office were \$419,394.

Program Advisory Committees

In 1987/88, the Program Advisory Committee met four times to review 31 proposals under Programs 1 and 2. Expenditures were \$10,362.

The Advisory Committee established to assist in the implementation of Program 3 did not meet in 1987/88.

PROGRAM 16PUBLIC INFORMATION

The program is to inform the northern general public about the strategy, objectives, programs and projects under the Agreement; to develop communication techniques and to ensure a co-ordinated federal/provincial public information system.

The program allocation is \$1,000,000 and is funded 100% by Canada (DRIE). In 1987/88, expenditures in support of the program were \$18,307.

Activities performed during the year included assisting individuals and groups in organizing official openings, writing news releases, attending community meetings and distributing printed material. The NDA video program was shown at several community meetings.

PROGRAM 17EVALUATION AND CONSULTATION

This program is to conduct an evaluation exercise to assess the effectiveness of programs and projects in achieving the objectives of the Agreement. In addition, the program is to provide for consultative meetings between the Ministers' Committee and Agreement Advisory Committee, and to provide for other measures to support the participation of northern and Native residents.

The program allocation is \$1,700,000 and is cost-shared between Canada (DRIE 60%) and Manitoba (40%). The program is implemented by the federal Department of Regional Industrial Expansion. In 1987/88, total expenditures were \$335,034.

There are two activities in the program - Evaluation and Consultation. In 1987/88, expenditures in support of Evaluation were \$185,502 and expenditures in support of Consultation were \$149,532.

Evaluation

The evaluation exercise, approved in earlier years by the Management Board of the Northern Development Agreement, was completed in 1987/88. This evaluation related to the following programs:

Program 1 (Community/Regional Economic Development Planning),
Program 2 (Resource Opportunity Development),
Program 9 (Northern Manitoba Affirmative Action), and
Program 13 (Community Services for Northern Provincial
Communities)

In addition to the above evaluations, a discussion paper was developed on co-ordination and consultation mechanisms of the Northern Development Agreement.

All evaluations and the discussion paper were reviewed and approved by the Management Board. Expenditures in support of the entire evaluation exercise in 1987/88 were \$105,502.

During the year, the Principal Ministers of the Agreement approved a separate "Native-directed" comprehensive evaluation of the Agreement. A contract was signed with the Agreement Advisory Committee approving that body to undertake an evaluation of all programs in the Agreement and to conduct an assessment of the impact of the programs upon the residents and communities of northern Manitoba. Expenditures in 1987/88 supporting this evaluation of programs were \$80,000.

Consultation

The Agreement Advisory Committee met with the Principal Ministers of the Agreement on November 17, 1987 respecting the proposed extension to the Agreement. At this meeting, the Agreement Advisory Committee presented a Contribution Agreement to the two Ministers which would provide funding to undertake the Native-Directed evaluation of the Agreement.

In order to assess program impact, the evaluation contract with the Agreement Advisory Committee included monies to undertake consultation with the residents of northern communities and to develop recommendations for future programming from such consultation. Expenditures in 1987/88 supporting this process were \$149,532.

PROGRAM 18CO-ORDINATION

The purpose of this program is to provide for the administration, co-ordination and management of the Northern Development Agreement by Manitoba, to ensure the effective participation of all associated provincial departments and agencies. The program allocation is \$1,300,000 and is funded 100% by the provincial government.

For the period of April 1, 1987 to March 31, 1988, the following project and activity was implemented at a cost of \$181,100.

A. Northern Development Agreement Management:1. Agreement Management

This activity is implemented by the Manitoba Department of Northern Affairs through the Northern Development and Co-ordination Branch of the Agreements Management and Co-ordination Division.

In general, the Northern Development and Co-ordination Branch provides the following Agreement-related administrative and co-ordinating functions:

1. The monitoring and supervision of agreement-related programming to ensure programs are consistent with both the terms of the Northern Development Agreement and the policies of the Province of Manitoba.
2. The establishment and maintenance of effective inter-departmental as well as intra-jurisdictional liaison, consultation and co-ordination with federal and provincial departments in areas of joint and parallel programming.
3. The maintenance, refinement and expansion of information systems to ensure an effective and efficient monitoring and analysis of agreement related issues, performance and progress.

4. Provision of information to northern residents concerning Northern Development Agreement programs, both with respect to program participation and input, as well as available resource and development opportunities.

During the period of this report, initiatives undertaken by the branch included:

1. Preparation and presentation of strategies, discussion papers and impact analysis relative to a provincial negotiating position on the extension of the Northern Development Agreement.
2. Negotiation and preparation of extension documents.
3. Assistance to provincial departments with respect to the annual preparation and presentation of financial estimates.
4. Direct participation in Program Advisory Committee meetings (4 in 1987/88) with respect to the provision of assistance and the analysis of projects.
5. The preparation and presentation of relevant information pertaining to Agreement management, co-ordination and programming for Management Board.
6. On-going assistance to the Evaluation Sub-Committee of the Northern Development Agreement and Program Evaluation Steering Committees, and preparation of materials pertaining to the evaluation process.
7. Collection and analysis of provincial program performance data on a monthly and quarterly basis.
8. The collection and analysis of progress report information on provincially implemented programs throughout the report period. Planning and preparation of progress report information was jointly undertaken and accomplished by the Northern Development and Co-ordination Branch and federal representatives.
9. A work plan for fiscal year 1987-88 was negotiated and produced, including all provincially-implemented programming.
