


MOTORCYCLE

IN CANADA, 2016 to 2020

On average, 180 motorcycle fatalities occurred every year

in Canada between 2016 and 2020.1,2

The three most common types of fatal motorcycle collisions represented over half of all motorcycle fatalities.





At least one risk factor was reported in **over half** of motorcycle fatalities, while at least two risk factors were reported in **nearly one-third** of motorcycle fatalities.³

Alcohol, cannabis or other drug consumption was reported in nearly 1 in 3 (31%) motorcycle fatalities.

Losing control was reported in more than 1 in 4 (27%) motorcycle fatalities.

Driving at high speed was reported in nearly 1 in 4 (24%) motorcycle fatalities.





- 1. Includes transport-related motorcycle fatalities where the motorcycle was in motion at the time of the incident. Excludes electric bicycles, mopeds and off-road vehicles (such as all-terrain vehicles, snowmobiles and dirt bikes). Data for Manitoba are not available in the Canadian Coroner and Medical Examiner Database.
- 2. All data are considered preliminary and include information on complete investigations only.
- 3. More than one behavioural risk factor can be identified for a single death.
