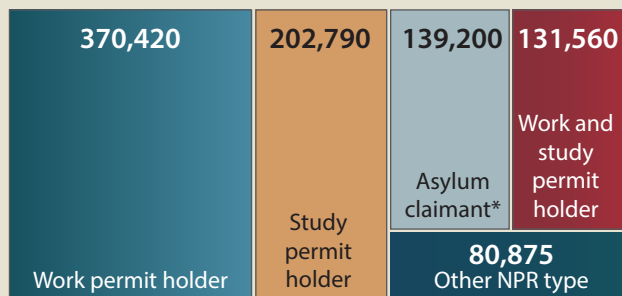


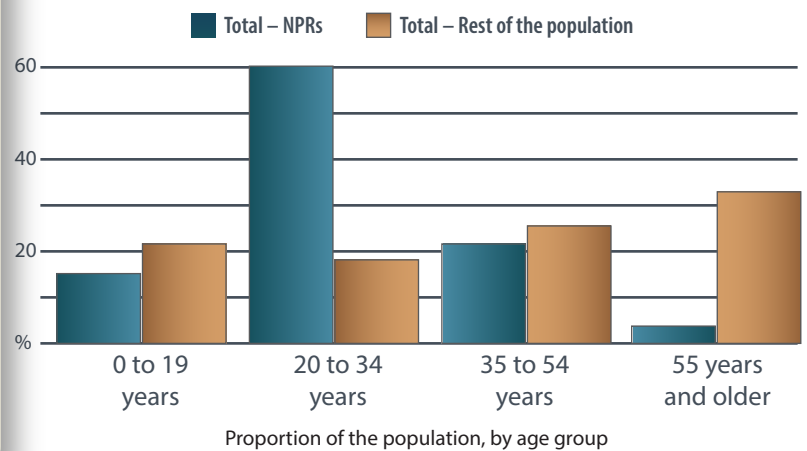
A portrait of NON-PERMANENT RESIDENTS in Canada

Over **924,000** non-permanent residents (NPRs) were enumerated in the 2021 Census, making up **2.5%** of Canada's population

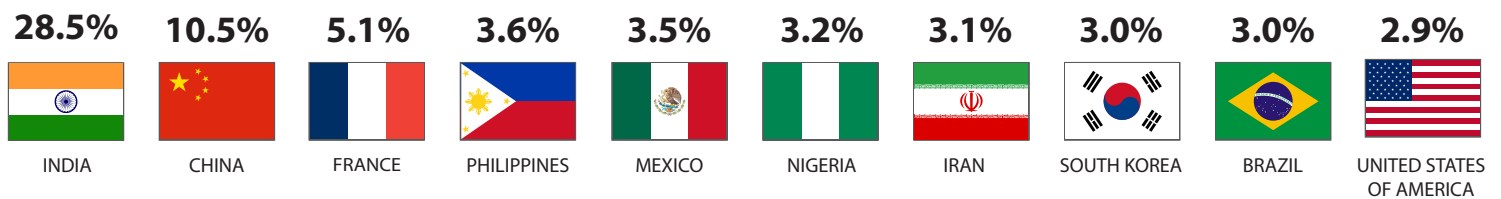

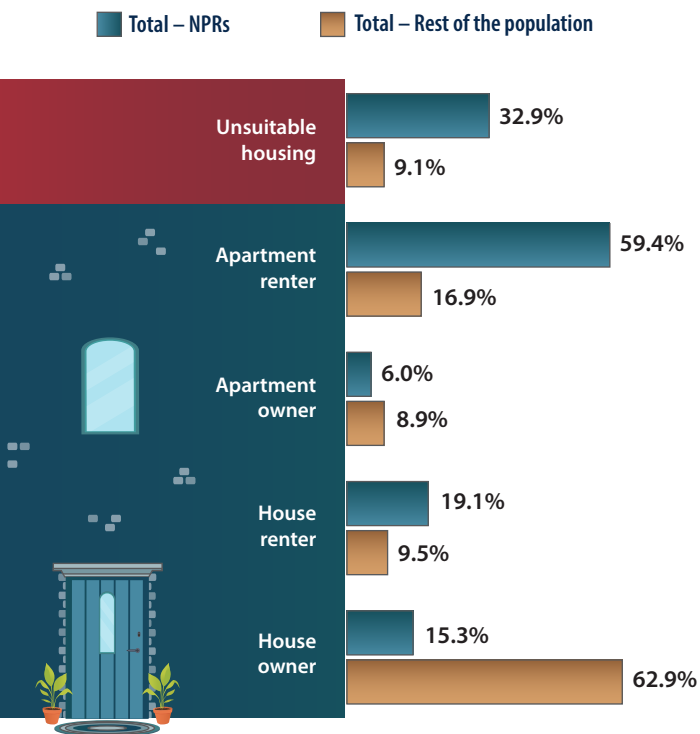
60.1% of NPRs were between 20 and 34 years of age



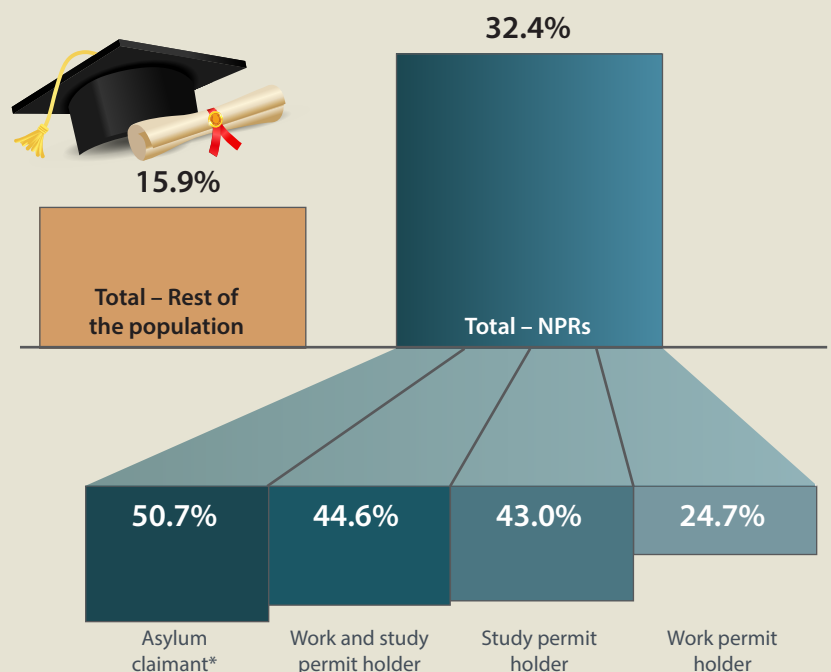
Top 10 places of birth of NPRs

Among NPRs with a bachelor's degree or higher, asylum claimants were most likely to be overqualified² for their job

1. Housing suitability refers to whether a dwelling for those living in private households has enough bedrooms to accommodate the size and composition of the household.
2. Overqualification refers to the share of people with a bachelor's degree or higher working in an occupation that requires a high school diploma or less. Managerial occupations are excluded from the denominator.
