About this report

This report, which is tabled under section 20 of the *Service Fees Act*,ⁱ the *Low-Materiality Fees Regulations*,ⁱⁱ and subsection 4.2.9 of the Treasury Board *Directive on Charging and Special Financial Authorities*,ⁱⁱⁱ contains information about the fees which the Privy Council Office (PCO) had the authority to charge in fiscal year 2023–24.

The report covers fees that are subject to the Service Fees Act.

For reporting purposes, fees are categorized by fee-setting mechanism. There are three mechanisms:

- Act, regulation or fees notice The authority to set these fees is delegated to a department, minister or Governor in Council pursuant to an act of Parliament.
- 2. Contract

Ministers have the inherent authority to enter into contracts, which are usually negotiated between the minister and an individual or organization, and which cover fees and other terms and conditions. In some cases, that authority may also be provided by an act of Parliament.

3. Market rate or auction

The authority to set these fees comes from an act of Parliament or a regulation, and the minister, department or Governor in Council has no control in determining the fee amount.

For fees set by act, regulation or fees notice, the report provides totals for fee groupings, as well as detailed information for each fee. PCO did not have fees set by contract, market rate or auction.

Although the fees that PCO charges under the *Access to Information Act* were subject to the *Service Fees Act*, they are not included in this report. Information on PCO's access to information fees for 2023–24 will be made available in our annual report^{iv} to Parliament on the administration of the *Access to Information Act*, once the report is published.

Remissions

In 2023–24, PCO was not subject to the requirements to issue remissions under section 7 of the *Service Fees Act*. This report does not include remissions amounts.

Upon the adoption of the *Statutory Instrument Act* in 1972, Parliament provided the right to any person, upon paying the prescribed fee, to inspect and obtain copies of any statutory instrument that had been registered by the Clerk of the Privy Council.

With technological developments and the arrival of the Internet, approved Orders-In-Councils (OIC) are systematically posted on PCO's OIC website^v on the third working day following their approval and they can be accessed free of charge. As a result, no user fees have been collected since 2013–14.

Under the *Statutory Instruments Regulations*, vi PCO has the authority to set five (5) fees listed under Schedule III (1a, 1b, 2a (i), 2a (ii) and 2b).

Fees for inspection of statutory instruments.

- For inspection of any statutory instruments issued, made or established more than five years before the request for inspection is made.
- For inspection of any statutory instruments not described in paragraph (a).

90% of requests will be completed within 5 business days. This standard became effective as of September 2005 and is still in use.

All requests were systematically referred to the OIC website, where the information can be accessed free of charge.
