2	Please provide additional information describing the steps taken. The PBC purchases 82% of goods on the Standing Offer or Supply Arrangement (SOSA) using the SOSA application. By purchasing from suppliers that have a current agreement and are in good standing with the government, the risk of forced labour and/or child labour from the PBC's standpoint would be extremely low to none as this exercise would have already been completed by the SOSA holders. We assess internally when extracting reports what the percentage of Standing offer/Supply

	arrangement contracts are and address the purchases made outside of this to ensure they are a legitimate business with a valid Business Number and current address with contact information. These practices are consistently used throughout procurement officers. Acquisition card holders in our organization are limited to Standing Offers only under \$10K to limit exposure. We also make purchases using the same guidelines for our external client departments. Our action plan continues to be diligent with verifying the business information both when purchasing on standing offer or via purchase order/house contract. We have previously addressed a practice that had increased our risk of forced labour and/or child labour which was purchasing from online sources that have not been verified (for example: Amazon, websites without valid business information available, items shipped from various sources/countries). In this case, we have advised PBC employees to only use these sources when absolutely necessary, such as an item not being available via standing offer or supply arrangement nor via suppliers we have purchased from in the past.
