

HOW TO USE THIS GUIDE

This Environmental Funding Guide was produced to assist environmental organizations and individuals who are looking for financial assistance for environmental projects. Whether it is an Environmental Non-Government Organization (ENGO), Business, Government Department, Municipality, University, Student, etc. seeking funding, the handbook will provide the information needed to direct them toward the proper source.

The Guide contains information on funding programs sponsored by Federal and Provincial Government Departments, as well as Non-Government Programs. It provides a brief, one-page overview of the requirements of each program, eligibility, amount of funding available, deadlines etc.

INDEXES

A series of indexes are located at the back of the handbook to help locate programs suitable for an applicant.

The first index (1) has programs listed by Organization - Programs listed in order by Government and Non-Government sponsors. The second (2) indexes programs by Eligibility - For example, under the heading YOUTH, all programs that youth groups or individuals may apply to, are listed. The third index (3) groups programs by Type of Projects Funded. For example, under the heading Environmental Clean-ups, programs that will fund clean-ups are listed.

The indexes can be effectively used by cross-referencing between them. To find out if the type of project proposed by an applicant is funded under certain programs Index # 3 can be used first, and then use index # 2 to see if the group or individual is eligible for funding under that program. **EXAMPLE:** A **Business** organization wishes to apply for funding for a waste management program. Index # 3 shows that the DRECT Program funds waste management activities, and Index # 2 lists the DRECT program under eligible programs for Business/Industry.

CANADA/NOVA SCOTIA COOPERATION AGREEMENT ON AGRICULTURE

Agriculture Canada and Nova Scotia Department of Agriculture and Marketing

OBJECTIVE:

To work towards the conservation and enhancement of the natural resources used by the agri-food industry and minimize the impact of the industry on environmental resources that are shared with other sectors. Three sustainable agricultural programs were developed Awareness and Communication, Resource Management, and Waste Management.

ELIGIBILITY:

* Individuals, partnerships and companies, farm and commodity organizations, universities and educational organizations, and provincial and municipal government agencies in Nova Scotia.

TYPE OF PROJECTS FUNDED:

Awareness and Communication: Development, publication, and distribution of educational material on sustainable agriculture. This may include displays and presentations and educational and instructional materials.

Resource Management: Development and assessment of environmentally sound agricultural practices.

-Development of nutrient management practices which emphasize soil and crop nutrient systems. eg. better methods of fertilizer use.

-Development of environmentally safe pest management practices.

Waste Management: Development of technology that reduces or eliminates agri-food wastes. eg. development of re-useable agri-food containers and packaging.

-development of viable uses for by-products of agri-food production and processing. eg. composting

-development of **pollution abatement technologies**, eg. methods for minimizing the environmental impacts of on-farm and food processing wastes and protect soil and water from degradation

Up to 100% funding to \$50,000 maximum.

CANADIAN WILDLIFE FOUNDATION - FUNDING PROGRAM

OBJECTIVE:

CWF provides a funding to promote wildlife habitat and the wise use of wildlife resources in Canada. Funding consists of a) repayable loans, and b) partial financial contributions for projects (other

funding partners are required)

ELIGIBILITY:

* Non-profit organizations and individuals. Government agencies and Crown corporations are eligible but receive low priority.

TYPES OF PROJECTS FUNDED:

-Scientific or other research

-Conservation action programs such as the reintroduction of endangered species

-Conservation or environmental education programs

AMOUNT:

Varied. Average funding of a few thousand

-Funding is allocated for a maximum of a one year period

COMMUNITY PLANNING FUND

Environmental Citizenship (Environment Canada)

OBJECTIVE:

Supports innovative projects aimed at enhancing cooperation and consultation among local and regional groups in addressing local environmental problems and developing environmental citizenship codes and action plans.

ELIGIBILITY:

* Participation of several local interest groups from various sectors of the community is essential for funding consideration. Funding is provided to one lead, non-profit, non-government group involved in environmental or heritage activities.

TYPES OF PROJECTS FUNDED:

-The organization of conferences, seminars and workshops, which assist in the exchange of information and ideas among interest groups from various sectors on environmental or heritage issues

-Projects that broaden the access to and increase the participation of community groups in decision-making processes related to sustainable development

-Projects that foster the development of environmental citizenship codes and action plans at the community level

\$2,000 To \$5,000 (usually up to \$3,000)

DEMONSTRATION PROJECTS AND BUSINESS SUPPORT PROGRAM

Canada/Nova Scotia COOPERATION Agreement on Sustainable Economic Development

OBJECTIVE:

- To provide assistance for the exploration and demonstration of new, potentially sustainable procedures, policies and products;
- To provide assistance for the adoption and demonstration in Nova Scotia of recognized and successful, sustainable procedures, policies, and products;
- To provide assistance for applied research and planning activities that will enhance the capabilities of governments, businesses, and non-governmental organizations to move Nova Scotians closer to the realization of a sustainable society.

ELIGIBILITY:

* Businesses, business organizations; non-governmental organizations; universities, colleges, academic institutes; governments, including municipalities, boards and commissions; individuals.

TYPES OF PROJECTS FUNDED:

- -Projects that show -by example- ways and means to put sustainable economic development into practice in Nova Scotia.
- -Ones that apply innovative technologies and practices in new ways;
 -Ones that solve problems impeding the acceptance of sustainable development in Nova Scotia.

AMOUNT:

Contributions of up to 75 percent of a project's costs may be made, to a maximum of \$200,000.

Environment Canada

OBJECTIVE:

The DRECT program shares the costs of developing and demonstrating prototype systems, of promising new technology which may provide solutions to the problem of waste reduction.

ELIGIBILITY:

* Private industries, organizations, provincial and municipal departments working with innovative new methods, procedures, processes or equipment aimed at waste reduction.

TYPE OF PROJECTS FUNDED:

-Projects to reduce wastes

-To recover or recycle wastes

-Energy saving projects, especially energy derived from non-renewable

-Projects to cut down on pollution and recover energy from municipal and industrial wastes

AMOUNT:

Up to 50 percent of total project costs.

* Cross-disciplinary teams led by university researchers, focusing on Canadian ecosystems. Doctoral fellowships are open to students at Canadian universities who are involved in research training.

EDUCATION AND PUBLIC INFORMATION PROGRAM

Canada/Nova Scotia COOPERATION Agreement on Sustainable Economic Development

OBJECTIVE:

Designed to assist individuals or groups interested in educating and providing information to business people and the public about the nature, role and importance of sustainable development in Nova Scotia.

ELIGIBILITY:

* Companies and business people, non-governmental organizations, individuals, and government staff and departments.

TYPES OF PROJECTS FUNDED:

-Ones that involve the development of educational materials which will be used to inform the public on the nature, role and importance of sustainable economic development. This involves providing accessible information and informed consultation to the business people and the public.

AMOUNT:

75 % of a project's costs to a maximum of \$30,000.

ENDANGERED SPECIES RECOVERY FUND

World Wildlife Fund of Canada

OBJECTIVE:

To sponsor high-priority conservation projects to assist the recovery of endangered wildlife and their natural habitats in Canada. Wildlife is considered here to be any non-domestic plant or animal that is native to Canada.

ELIGIBILITY:

- * Non-government organizations such as universities, natural history society, research institute or a non-profit conservation group.
- Companies may be funded but priority is given to non-profit organizations

TYPES OF PROJECTS FUNDED:

Practical, applied work such as:

- -Support for recovery teams and the preparation of Recovery Plan for endangered species';
- -Re-introduction and captive breeding programs;
- -Practical field work and public awareness programs that lead to the recovery and protection of a nationally designated extirpated, endangered, threatened or vulnerable species.

AMOUNT:

-ESRF may provide a maximum of two thirds of project costs. -Average funding from ESRF is \$5,000 to 10,000 per year.

ENVIRONMENTAL ASSISTANCE TO BUSINESS PROGRAM

Canada/Nova Scotia COOPERATION Agreement on Sustainable Economic Development

OBJECTIVE:

Designed to encourage and support initiatives by small and medium-sized businesses to combine environmental and economic considerations into their development planning.

ELIGIBILITY:

* Primary, secondary, and environmental service sectors. Companies must fall into the small-to medium-size range. In general, businesses with less than 200 employees, \$10 million in annual sales and \$25 million in assets are eligible.

TYPES OF PROJECTS FUNDED:

- -Ones that **implement sustainable development activities** in individual businesses:
- -Development of **new products**, services and processes that are in keeping with sustainable development principles;
- -Projects that foster the growth of the environmental business sector in the areas of import substitution and export;
- -Testing of new products and services pertaining to sustainable development;
- -Those that elevate the level of knowledge and expertise relating to sustainable economic development.

AMOUNT:

Varied. Up to 50 percent of eligible capital costs (which includes the purchase, lease, or improvement of capital equipment) to a maximum of \$100,000 and up to 75 percent of eligible non-capital costs (which include third party expenses as well as in-house costs, including an allowance of up to 50 percent of actual salaries to cover overhead expenses) to a maximum of \$50,000.

ENVIRONMENT AND DEVELOPMENT SUPPORT PROGRAM

Canadian International Development Agency

OBJECTIVE:

To fund international networking with the goal of encouraging global thinking and resolving the environmental crisis. To establish working relationships/partnerships between Southern and Canadian ENGO's to encourage institutional cooperation; develop and support joint policy dialogues and create international networks and to stimulate international information sharing.

ELIGIBILITY:

- * ENGO's that are incorporated in Canada as a non-profit organization.
 -Funding can also be received by channelling the request via an incorporated group
 - -Organization must have experience in environmental issues and a base of support for itself and its overseas partner organization (if there is one).
- * Note: Any ENGO's already receiving funding from CIDA's NGO Division are not eligible under this program.

TYPES OF PROJECTS FUNDED:

-projects which contribute to long term change in the policy and structures which brought about the environmental problems in the first place

-projects which will strengthen the institutional and advisory capacity of NGO's or networks in the South by sharing information, training or other resources

-projects which, through the linkage will enlarge the understanding of the NGO's involved

-projects which support Southern and Canadian ENGO's in developing a global understanding of environment and development issues

-projects which provide opportunities for Southern NGO's to work with other Southern NGO's

ENVIRONMENTAL INNOVATION PROGRAM

Supply and Services Canada (& EC)

OBJECTIVE:

EIP is a Green Plan Initiative to involve promote Canadian environmental innovation outside government. It aims to involve them as active partners in contributing fresh ideas to the research and development effort required to meet the environmental challenges we face. It was designed to strengthen Canada's environmental science and technology.

ELIGIBILITY:

* Canadian industry, universities, native groups, non-government organizations and individuals who submit innovative research and development proposals in the areas of natural sciences, the social sciences, the health sciences and the humanities.

TYPE OF PROJECTS FUNDED:

-Those that will result in tangible new environmental products, processes, or services.

-Projects must directly support goals and objectives of Green Plan;

-Clean air, water and land;

-sustainable use of renewable resources;

-protection of our special spaces or species;

-preserving the integrity of our North;

-global environmental security;

-environmentally-responsible decision making;

-minimizing the impacts of environmental emergencies.

AMOUNT:

EIP provides only partial funding for projects; partnerships with other organizations, governments etc. are required.

ENVIRONMENTAL PARTNERS FUND

Environmental Citizenship (Environment Canada)

OBJECTIVE:

A partnership fund which encourages Canadians to get personally involved in community based environmental projects. These projects include activities which protect, enhance and restore their environment; or, provide knowledge on environmental issues enabling people to take responsible environmental action.

ELIGIBILITY:

* Non-profit organizations who are involved in local, community based environmental projects. Approved projects may receive up to 50 percent of the project's total costs.

TYPES OF PROJECTS FUNDED:

-Clean up or rehabilitation of natural areas, lakes and rivers

-initiate waste management activities, or campaigns to collect hazardous household project

-organize community efforts to conserve supplies of energy and water -protect and restore the natural habitats of Canada's fish and wildlife populations

-foster knowledge of environmental issues; through learning programs to specific audiences at the community level which encourage and lead people to action.

AMOUNT:

Maximum contribution of \$50,000 over one fiscal year. Partner(s) must match funding amounts with in-kind and/or cash contributions.

OBJECTIVE:

Green Plan program aims to provide funds for the first - time

demonstration of innovative environmental technologies.

ELIGIBILITY:

* Corporations or partnerships operating in Canada demonstrating a new

environmental technology. It must have significant domestic and export market potential and its exploitation must significantly benefit Canadian

Industry. Up to 50% of project costs may be funded.

TYPE OF PROJECTS FUNDED:

-Ones that show how it can exploit and market the technology without

further government funding.

Canada Trust donates \$5 for every customer who declares their savings account "Green". This means that 1 cent per \$1 of interest earned each month goes into the green fund which is matched by Canada Trust.
