



A Quick Reference of Available Programs in the Atlantic Region

Welcome to the updated 1997 version of the Environmental Funding Guide! There have been many changes since the Guide was first produced in the summer of 1995. This edition includes updated information on existing programs, as well as many new ones. The Guide was printed in this new format so that it can be put into a binder and easily updated. We will be sending out updated pages periodically; each one will have the date it was updated on the bottom right corner.

This Guide provides information on funding programs available for environmental projects in the Atlantic Region (New Brunswick, Newfoundland, Nova Scotia, and Prince Edward Island). It is aimed at non-profit, non-governmental organizations, although it does include information on some programs that will fund individuals and municipalities. A brief, one-page description is provided for each program. This information is not comprehensive, but is only intended to give you a general idea of what each program is about. You should always contact the program sponsor before applying to get further details on the program criteria, the application process, and any recent changes to the program or deadlines.

In addition to the programs listed in this Guide, there may be numerous other sources of support available in your local community. Many local businesses, governments, and individuals will support worthwhile community initiatives, even though they do not have formal funding programs. This support can include in-kind donations, such as office space, volunteer labour, lumber or garbage bags. All of these types of support add up and we urge you to contact members of your local community in your search for project resources.

Index by Who Can Apply

This index lists the programs by the type of group that can apply. Please note that:

- This Guide is targeted at non-profit, non-government organizations (NGO's) and every attempt has been made to include all of the funding programs available to them in the Atlantic Region as of March 1997.
- Of the programs open to NGO's, some are only open to a specific type of group. For
 example, some programs are only open to youth groups, some only to school groups,
 one only to native groups, and some only to organizations that are registered charities.
 These are listed separately as sub-categories under the heading of Non-profit, NonGovernment Organizations.
- The programs listed under the category Individuals are listed separately because they
 are the only environmental funding programs we are aware of that will fund an
 individual. These programs are also open to NGO's and are also listed under that
 category.
- The programs listed under the category Municipalities are not necessarily all of the programs available to municipalities. We listed those we were aware of.

Action 21 Community Funding Program

Who is the Program Sponsor?

Environment Canada

What is the Program About?

The Community Funding Program provides financial support to groups to undertake projects in their communities that will result in positive, measurable impacts on the environment. The program focuses on four of Environment Canada's priorities: atmospheric change, biodiversity, ecosystems, and toxic substances.

Who can Apply?

Non-profit, non-governmental groups.

What Projects can be Funded?

Priority for funding will be given to the following types of projects:

- Atmospheric Change/Air Pollution reducing emissions that contribute to smog, climate change and ozone depletion.
- **Biodiversity** conserving or increasing wildlife and plant populations.
- Ecosystems conserving, rehabilitating or enhancing wetlands, rivers, lakes, coastal areas and urban green spaces.
- Toxic Substances reducing/diverting hazardous and toxic substances such as pesticides, fertilizers, herbicides and hazardous household products.

In addition, to be considered eligible for funding the applicant must:

- Demonstrate that the project will have a positive, measurable impact on the environment by the time the project is completed; and
- Have financial or in-kind support from sources other than the federal government for at least 50% of the total eligible project cost.

What is the Maximum Funding Available?

\$100,000, however most projects will be funded at levels well below this amount. The total federal government contribution can not exceed 50% of the total eligible project cost.

The 50% that you must raise from non-federal government sources can include cash; in-kind donations of materials, tools, equipment, labour and technical expertise; and anticipated revenues from the project including product sales and tax rebates.

What are the Deadlines for Applying?

February 1, May 1 and October 1 annually. Your complete Project Proposal must be post-marked or received on or before the deadline date.

A copy of the "Applicant's Guide to Submitting A Project Proposal" is available from the office listed below. It contains further details on the application criteria and process, as well as details on the information required in your project proposal. Applicants are encouraged to call the regional office to discuss their project idea before applying.

What is the Program About?

Atlantic Salmon Federation Matching Grants Program

Who is the Program Sponsor?

Atlantic Salmon Federation

What is the Program About?

It provides part of the funds needed by its member organizations for proposed salmon conservation projects. They fund projects targeted at enhancement, habitat improvement, public awareness or education activities. The projects should have direct involvement of local communities, and partnerships with other groups, industry, municipalities etc. are favored.

Who can Apply?

Non-profit organizations who are members of the Atlantic Salmon Federation.

What Projects can be Funded?

Examples include:

- Fish habitat rehabilitation
- · Educational programs on fish habitat

What is the Maximum Funding Available?

Varies from year to year. In the past few years the total funding has been \$40,000, which is divided up among the provinces in the Atlantic Region. For this reason, grants are usually small.

What are the Deadlines for Applying?

April 1 annually.

Who is the Program Sponsor?

The Body Shop Canada

What is the Program About?

It supports community-based, actionoriented projects/programs in three key areas:

- Environmental issues
- · Animal protection, and
- · Human rights

Who Can Apply?

Registered charitable organizations. Special emphasis is given to projects/programs carried out by indigenous peoples, youth and women.

What Projects can be Funded?

A wide range of projects/programs are considered. The Foundation focuses on funding daring, entrepreneurial ways to enhance the well-being of communities.

What is the Maximum Funding Available?

\$100 - \$25,000.

What are the Deadlines for Applying?

Proposals for under \$1,000 can be submitted at any time and will generally be reviewed within eight weeks. The deadlines for proposals over \$1,000 are November 30 and May 31. Interested applicants should submit a letter of interest including the following: a brief description of the organization; a clear statement of project objectives; a brief overview of budget and specific amount requested; and a copy of the organization's registered charitable number certificate issued by Revenue Canada.

Canadian Wildlife Federation's Funding Program

Who is the Program Sponsor?

Canadian Wildlife Federation (CWF)

What is the Program About?

It provides funding to promote wildlife habitat and the wise use of wildlife resources in Canada. Funding consists of repayable loans, and partial financial contributions for projects (other funding partners are required).

Who can Apply?

Non-profit organizations or individuals. Government agencies and crown corporations may also apply, but will receive lower priority.

What Projects can be Funded?

- Scientific or other research projects in the area of wildlife habitat
- Conservation action programs such as the reintroduction of an endangered species
- Conservation education programs

What is the Maximum Funding Available?

Varies. Average funding of a few thousand dollars.

What are the Deadlines for Applying?

April 14th. Contact CWF for specific application requirements.

What is the Program About?

To assist local conservation groups to secure natural heritage land (including purchase).

Who Can Apply?

Non-profit organizations.

What Projects can be Funded?

The securement of natural heritage land. Priority lands for securement are nationally or provincially significant lands, and habitats for vulnerable, threatened or endangered species.

What is the Maximum Funding Available?

Only technical and organizational assistance provided.

What are the Deadlines for Applying? None.

Who is the Program Sponsor?

DuPont Canada

What is the Program About?

DuPont donates at least one percent of its pre-tax earnings to initiatives in areas of social services, hospitals, cultural and civic projects, the environment, personal safety, and scientific and technological literacy.

Who Can Apply?

There is no limitation on who can apply. DuPont prefers to fund registered charitable organizations, but don't limit their grants to these groups.

What Projects can be Funded?

Projects vary. Funds have been granted to a wide range of initiatives in the past, but most fall within the categories outlined above.

What is the Maximum Funding Available?

Varies. Usually no more than \$100,000 per grant.

What are the Deadlines for Applying?

The Donations Committee meets every two months to review proposals.

Interested applicants should send or fax a letter to the Committee explaining their proposed project, goals and objectives and anticipated results.

What is the Program About?

The Foundation was established in 1958 by John David Eaton, T. Eaton Co. Ltd, and Eaton Holdings. It focuses on the Arts, Education, Health and Social welfare. Within those areas, it funds projects in the areas of Education, Universities, Professional Development, Arts & Culture, Performing Arts, Art Galleries, Historic Preservation, Health Care, Hospitals, Physically Disabled, Community Services, Youth, Seniors, United Way, Olympics, and the Environment. Grants are awarded in heavily populated areas of Canada.

Who Can Apply?

Registered charitable organizations, educational institutions, museums etc.

What Projects can be Funded?

What is the Maximum Funding Available?

Varies. Average about \$5,000 - \$10,000.

What are the Deadlines for Applying?

The donation committee meets in February, June, October and December.

Applicants should submit a proposal including a copy of a financial statement, list of board members, salaried staff and number of volunteers, list of other confirmed sources of funding, and operating budget. Contact the Foundation for more details on submitting a proposal.

The Foundation provides grants to local community environmental initiatives.

Who Can Apply?

Registered charitable organizations.

What Projects can be Funded?

Land preservation and nature sanctuaries; environmental scientific research; local environmental initiatives.

What is the Maximum Funding Available?

\$3,000 to \$100,000.

What are the Deadlines for Applying?

None. Grants are awarded in the spring and fall of each year. Interested organizations should send an initial letter of inquiry to The EJLB Foundation providing the organization's history, a brief description of the proposed project, the amount of the grant sought and the organization's charitable registration number.

Endangered Species Recovery Fund

Who is the Program Sponsor?

World Wildlife Fund of Canada

What is the Program About?

It sponsors high-profile conservation projects to help the recovery of endangered wildlife and their natural habitats in Canada. Wildlife is considered to be any non-domestic plant or animal that is native to Canada.

Who can Apply?

Non-government organizations such as universities, a natural history society, research institute or a non-profit conservation group. Businesses may also get funding but priority is given to non-profit organizations.

What Projects can be Funded?

Practical, applied work such as:

- Support for recovery teams and the development of a recovery plan for endangered species
- Re-introduction and captive breeding programs
- Practical field work and public awareness programs that lead to the recovery and protection of a nationally designated extirpated, endangered, threatened, or vulnerable species

What is the Maximum Funding Available ?

Varies: Average funding \$5,000 - \$10,000. ESRF will only fund up to two thirds of project costs.

What are the Deadlines for Applying?

Deadlines change every year, but are usually sometime in January. If you are interested in applying, you should contact the World Wildlife Fund Office for dates.

Who do I Call for More Information?

Varies. No limit. The Trust funds many small projects under \$5,000, as well as some larger projects. Projects are only funded for a maximum of one year.

Nova Scotia and Newfoundland -Environmental Leadership Program

Who is the Program Sponsor?

Nova Scotia Youth Conservation Corps; Conservation Corps of Newfoundland and Labrador; Canada World Youth; Asociacion De Apoyo Y Promocion De Ideas Para El Desarrollo.

What is the Program About?

It is a program aimed at youth aged 21-24. Its main objective is to bridge the gap between countries and communities and instill in participants the conviction that they can improve the environment. As part of the ELP team, young people have the opportunity to share their knowledge, experience and skills in helping the environment, while working in Canada and Costa Rica.

The first 7-8 weeks of the program is in Costa Rica, where youth take part in environment and development workshops as well as work on environmental projects. The second phase of the program (8-9 weeks) takes place in Nova Scotia or Newfoundland and Labrador. Each person has the opportunity to join a crew in their area on an environmental project in their own community, using the skills they developed in Cost Rica.

Who can Apply?

Youth, aged 21-24 in Nova Scotia, Newfoundland and Labrador. This is a pilot program by Canada World Youth, and they are eventually hoping to expand to PEI and New Brunswick.

What Projects can be Funded?

Only students interested in doing environmental projects locally and in Costa Rica are eligible, funding is not given for specific projects.

What is the Maximum Funding Available?

The program will pay participants \$12 per week while in Costa Rica, and \$20 per week while in the Canadian phase of the program. All travel

and accommodations to Costa Rica will be paid, and at the completion of the program, each participant will receive an honorarium.

What are the Deadlines for Applying?

Mid to late February each year.

- An announcement about the program and call for applications will be sent out in newspapers and student employment centres around mid-February.
- To apply you should send in a resume and cover letter to your regional Conservation corps office. The letter should describe what you expect to gain from the program, and what you felt you can contribute.

Alliance of Manufacturers and Exporters Canada; Human Resources Development Canada (HRD)

What is the Program About?

It focuses on unemployed persons who have a professional or educational background in an environmental field, and are receiving unemployment insurance benefits. The program places individuals in jobs where they will use their skills and gain valuable work experience. If a group, industry, municipality or institution is interested in employing skilled workers, the program will provide qualified individuals and pay them enhanced unemployment insurance benefits. These "employers" are required to pay \$100 per week to the program to cover management and technical support costs.

Who can Apply?

Industry, non-profit groups, institutions, and municipalities.

What Projects can be Funded?

The Program targets Environmental employment opportunities for its participants. Examples of projects that may benefit from ON-SITE employees include:

- Environmental management
- · Reduction of solid waste
- Reduction and management of hazardous waste

- · Occupational health and safety

What is the Maximum Funding Available?

Funding is provided only for salaries. This may be up to \$448 per week, per worker.

What are the Deadlines for Applying?

PEI Small Marsh Program (Eastern Habitat Joint Venture)

Who is the Program Sponsor?

PEI Department of Environmental Resources; Environment Canada; Ducks Unlimited Canada; and Wildlife Habitat Canada (Program is a part of the North American Waterfowl Management Plan).

What is the Program About?

It aims to restore approximately fifteen wetlands in the province per year, ranging from one to ten acres in size. The program sponsors will do the work at no cost to landowners who choose to participate in the program. Landowners participating in the program must sign an agreement with the PEI Department of Environmental Resources to maintain the restored wetland for a 25 year period.

Who Can Apply?

PEI Landowners.

What Projects can be Funded?

Wetlands considered for this program should be at least one acre in size and in a relatively flat area or basin. Freshwater sites which are congested with aquatic vegetation and have water present for at least part of the year tend to be good sites. Restoration work involves excavating much of the aquatic vegetation and using this material to build islands within the wetland.

What is the Maximum Funding Available?

Total costs of the restoration will be provided, and the work will be carried out by the PEI Department of Environmental Resources. Since funds are limited, wetlands are selected for restoration according to their biological value.

None. Landowners with a candidate wetland site should contact the Department of Environmental Resources to arrange a site visit for assessment for possible restoration.
