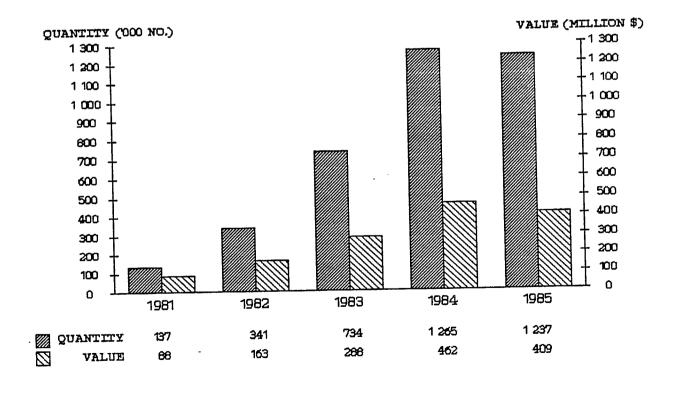

INTRODUCTION AND SCOPE

This report is one of a continuing series designed to increase business awareness of the potential existing for domestic production and to stimulate Canadian business to further explore potential opportunities in both the Canadian and export markets. It is important to emphasize that this report does not attempt any assessment as to the feasibility of manufacturing or competing in a particular market and should be treated as an indicator or starting point for the manufacturer or entrepreneur.

This report covers imports of Video Cassette Recorders (VCRs) Canadian International Trade Classification (C.I.T.C.) 634-75-40, Recorders/Players, Tape, Video Except TV Broadcast. The types used in television broadcasting are excluded and classified to (C.I.T.C.) 634-95-49. This report does not cover audio tape recorders for domestic, automobile or commercial use: these are found in (C.I.T.C.) 634-75-20, 634-75-25 or 634-75-30. However, video players are included.

IMPORT TRENDS: OVERVIEW



From 1981 to 1985, imports of Video Cassette Recorders increased at an average annual rate of 73 per cent in quantity and 47 per cent in terms of dollar value.

In 1985, some 1.2 million VCR's were imported into Canada, with a total value of \$409 million. From 1981 through 1984, VCRs showed a very rapid growth, at average compound rates of 110 per cent per year in quantity and 74 per cent in value. Unit prices declined steadily from \$643 to \$365. In 1985, however, import growth stabilized abruptly, average price decreased further to \$330, and the value of imports fell by 11 per cent.

The cumulative number of VCRs imported since 1981 is shown in the following table. Also shown are the cumulative imports per hundred households, based on 8.6 million households in Canada in 1983. These data show a market nearing maturity, in which competition can be expected to play an increasing role.

Japan has consistently been the major exporter to Canada, accounting for 96 to 99 per cent of the quantity and value through 1984, and 90 per cent in 1985. In 1985, United States imports were up 211 per cent in quantity and 145 per cent in value compared to 1984, giving that country eight per cent of the market. Unit prices dropped to near those from Japan for the first time. Imports from the Republic of Korea rose from negligible values to about two per cent of the market in 1985.

The 10 top importers accounted for 85 per cent of the total imports. Of these 10, six were manufacturers who accounted for \$268 million, and four were wholesalers importing \$123 million. The majority of the 10 top companies are located in Ontario.

There were 110 known importers of VCRs in Canada during 1984 of which the top 29 accounted for 96 per cent or \$443.6 million. Of these 29 importers, seven were manufacturers and 19 were wholesalers representing 58 per cent and 38 per cent respectively of the total imported value. Of the seven importers who are manufacturers, none currently manufacture VCRs in Canada.

Six of the 19 firms classified as wholesalers are subsidiaries whose parent companies currently manufacture brand name electronic equipment outside of Canada. These six firms account for \$141 million of 1984 imports.

CANADIAN PRODUCTION

VCRs are not currently produced in Canada.

DEPARTMENT OF SUPPLY AND SERVICES PROCUREMENTS

The Department of Supply and Services reports that its purchases for the federal government of all types of VCRs including industrial quality during the fiscal year 1984/85 amounted to one million dollars.

NOTE: This figure is for purchases by the Department of Supply and Services only, and may not include direct purchases by other federal government departments.

MARKET SUMMARY

The success of the VCR in the home entertainment market has been remarkable. From 1981 to 1984, unit sales grew tenfold. Annual volume is now \$400 million. This growth offers a substantial investment opportunity in Canada since there is no Canadian presence either in the manufacturing or assembly of these products. Despite this lack of a manufacturing base, the major suppliers have been able to sustain their marketing efforts using the same distribution channels as the T.V. receiver industry—i.e. the major department store chains, the wholesalers/importers, the home entertainment retail chains, the buying groups and the independent retailers and department stores.

In 1985, 43 per cent of Canadian homes had a VCR. Comparable figures for the United States indicate a 38 per cent penetration while in Japan, this rate was more than 60 per cent. Market researchers in the United States predict a continued strong demand there for VCRs with annual sales averaging 12 to 15 million units and the penetration reaching 60 per cent by 1990.

Both the Canadian and United States markets are beginning to show signs of maturity. Canadian unit sales in 1984 and 1985 remained stable and market data for early 1986 shows a slight drop in demand. In the United States, sales grew to 12 million units in 1985, a 58 per cent increase over 1984. However, this growth is not being maintained, and the market recently suffered the first month decline in its history. This slowing in growth has been matched by a proliferation of models and a decline in individual shares of the brand leaders.

Japanese firms dominate production, shipping 34 million units in 1985. This dominance is now being challenged by a group of Korean firms which have started to produce their own models using Japanese parts. Korean made models have generally been private labelled and priced below Japanese brands in order to enter markets. In the United States, there have been attempts to establish a Korean brand, but in Canada, similar efforts have yet to take place. The emergence of new suppliers has reduced the Japanese share of the Canadian market from 97 per cent to 89 per cent with most of this loss going to imports from the United States, some of this being reexports.

It is expected that Canadian demand will continue to be strong as penetration increases and new models are introduced. Continuing product innovation has led to the addition of new features and improved performance. These innovations have resulted in the introduction of stereo hi-fi, camcorders, Super 8, VHS-C and a number of other product enhancements.

The strong demand in Canada and the proximity of the large U.S. market provide an ample opportunity for VCR manufacturing in Canada. Because of the proprietary nature of VCRs, the most likely business arrangement is a wholly-owned subsidiary of one of the major VCR manufacturers. However, there are possibilities for joint ventures/partnerships with established Canadian companies. To be competitive, there is a need for a large-scale production/assembly facility, capable of supplying the North American market.
