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SECTION I - INTRODUCTION

Scope of Analysis

This analysis of corn seed for sowing is based on a detailed examination of Revenue Canada customs import documents for the period January to December 1984.

The following Canadian International Trade Classification (C.I.T.C.) import commodity code was analyzed:

06127-10 Corn, Maize, Seed

Method

The data shown in this analysis were extracted from Revenue Canada Customs documents. These documents provide a description of the products, names of importers and exporters, quantities, dollar values, unit prices, countries of origin, provinces of entry, tariff applications and rates of exchange.

Please note that dollar values shown are based on selling price F.O.B. plant, in Canadian dollars. This selling price represents the value paid by the importer, excluding all freight, packing and insurance costs when specified. All trade discounts when applicable are also deducted from the selling price.

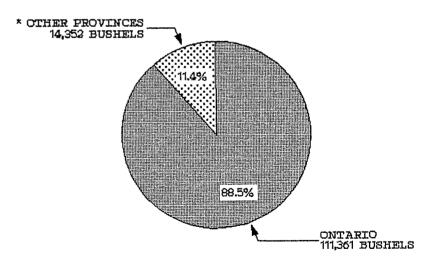
SECTION II - ANALYSIS AND OBSERVATIONS

Analysis of Imports

Imports of corn seed for sowing during the period January to December 1984, as reported on documents examined, amounted to a total quantity of 125,713 bushels or 7,029,005 net pounds for a value of \$9,228,014 (selling price).

The United States was the major country of origin accounting for approximately 99 per cent of the total dollar value.

GRAPH I - REGION OF CLEARANCE



Ontario was the province through which most corn seed for sowing entered Canada, accounting for 89 per cent of the total quantity (bushels) and 90 per cent of the total dollar value. All other provinces accounted for 11 per cent of the total quantity (bushels) and 10 per cent of the total dollar value. (Graph I refers)

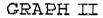

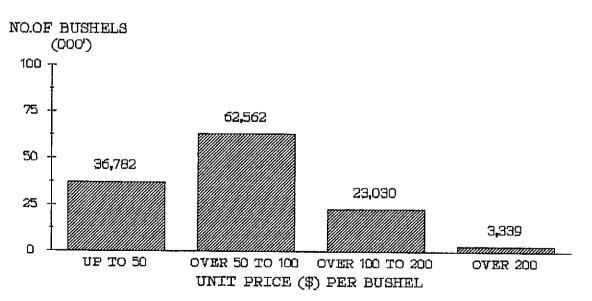
IMPORTS OF CORN SEED FOR SOWING BY UNIT PRICE

JANUARY TO DECEMBER 1984

Imports of corn seed for sowing during the period analyzed having a unit price of over \$50.00 to \$100.00 per bushel accounted for 50 per cent of the total quantity and 46 per cent of the total dollar value, as indicated in the following table.

Market Overview

The commercial seed industry registered sales of around \$360 million in 1984 representing about 3 per cent of total farm operating expenses. It encompasses many different activities including research and breeding, multiplication, processing, distribution and retailing. Firms may be involved in one or several of these activities with one or more types of crops such as cereals, forages, corn, special crops and garden vegetable seeds. There are approximately 6,000 seed growers/sellers and 120 seed companies operating in Canada. With the exception of seed potatoes there is an unfavourable trade balance for seeds and other plant propogating materials which is in part due to Canadian climatic conditions. In 1984 exports were only \$29.6 million compared to \$57.2 million imports for all types of seed.

In the case of seed corn, the domestic market consists of two major elements. The largest is corn seed planted by farmers to produce field corn for animal feed or industrial purposes; the other is sweet corn planted by farmers, market gardeners and hobbyists for human consumption. Field corn production (particularly grain corn) has increased dramatically in Canada over the last ten years as a result of the development of short season varieties. In both 1984 and 1985 more than 1.5 million hectares of field corn were planted for both grain corn and silage purposes. Most of this planting occurs in southern Ontario and southern Quebec. Ontario, the major producing province, has an estimated 25,000 - 30,000 corn producers. Corn is purchased by these producers in bags normally holding 80,000 kernels each from local farm supply dealers or directly from seed companies involved in retail operations. Prices range widely depending upon the variety but can reach as much as \$100 a bag.

Domestic requirements for sweet corn seed must be imported since there is little production in Canada. It would probably be climatically feasible to produce some varieties of sweet corn seed in southwestern Ontario but some areas of the U.S. seem more ideally suited. The Canadian market is fairly geographically dispersed. Sweet corn seed is generally sold in the domestic market packaged in 1 kg., 2 kg., 10 kg. and 25 kg. units. Prices range widely from \$50 to \$140 for 10 kg. of sweet corn seed. Seed is sold by mail order companies and numerous local garden supply and consumer retail outlets across the country. Farmers producing sweet corn under contract for major food producers will frequently obtain their seed directly from those firms.

Total corn seed imports were valued at \$9.2 million in 1984. Subdivisions of foreign companies in Canada are significant participants in the domestic corn seed market. Due to plentiful supplies and current low North America prices for grain corn, no increases in production or imports can be expected in the near future.
