FOREWORD

Section 8.1 of the Canada/Manitoba Northlands Agreement states that information regarding progress shall be made available regularly to the people in northern Manitoba. Reports for the years 1976/77, 1977/78, 1978/79, 1979/80 and 1980/81 were published earlier. The Federal and Provincial Managers of the Canada/Manitoba Northlands Agreement respectfully present the following Progress Report for 1981/82.

This report, recording progress achieved during the fourth year of the Agreement, begins with a discussion of the Canada/Manitoba Northlands Agreement under five headings; Background, Purpose and Objectives, Structure, Management and Financing. This section is followed by the main body of the report which parallels the format of the Agreement; that is, Northlands programming is divided into sectors, programs, projects and activities. An overview of financial flow for the first four years of the Agreement is found in Appendix Financial information is identified for sectors, programs and projects. Information on expenditures for 1981/82 at the activity level is provided in the activity progress statements. A listing of Federal and Provincial implementing departments is found in Appendix B.

The Managers and Secretaries responsible for the management of the Agreement wish to acknowledge the contributions of those members of the Federal and Provincial departments who submitted, compiled and edited the information presented in this publication.

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THE CANADA/MANITOBA NORTHLANDS AGREEMENT

BACKGROUND

In June of 1974, the Governments of Canada and Manitoba signed a General Development Agreement (GDA) providing for the joint development of specific agreements which would ensure the implementation of social and economic programs intended to improve the circumstances of Manitobans. With the recognition that the problems of the north require special action, a major component of the strategy described in the GDA dealt with the development of Manitoba's northlands.

While a long-term Northlands Agreement was being developed, the two governments entered into an Interim Northlands Agreement (April 1, 1974 to March 31, 1976) to facilitate immediate action in areas of obvious priority. Signatories of the Interim Agreement were the Department of Regional Economic Expansion (DREE) and Transport Canada on behalf of the Government of Canada and the Manitoba Department of Northern Affairs on behalf of the Government of Manitoba.

On September 15, 1976 at Norway House, Manitoba, the federal and provincial governments signed a five-year Canada/Manitoba Northlands Agreement which included two additional federal departments - the Department of Manpower and Immigration and the Department of Indian Affairs and Northern Development. To provide for continuity of projects initiated under the Interim Agreement, the Long-Term Agreement was made retroactive to April 1, 1976 and continued for an initial five-year period ending March 31, 1981. This represented the first phase of a longer term development strategy which is anticipated to be of 15 years duration.

In 1979, a Third Year Review was undertaken of the transportation program, and at the same time, it provided the opportunity to assess the progress and financial situation of the other programs under the Agreement.

As a result of this review, the Northlands Agreement was broadened to provide for new programming in the areas of forestry, parks, mineral initiatives, and to facilitate modifications to the transportation programs. Amendments No. 1 and No. 2, signed March 30, 1979, facilitated the inclusion of these new and revised programs, and provided additional funding authority to the Agreement. The total Agreement allocation was increased from \$138.7 million to \$155.4 million.

AMENDMENT NO. 3 AND NO. 4

The Northlands Agreement was to expire on March 31, 1981. Because a new Northern Development Agreement had not yet been signed and a number of major projects begun under Northlands were incomplete, it was agreed by the Governments of Canada and Manitoba to extend the Northlands Agreement. Amendment No. 3 extended the Agreement for one year to March 31, 1982 and facilitated the completion of two road projects and selected community infrastructure projects.

Amendment No. 4, signed December 18, 1981, provided an additional \$7.5 million to facilitate the continued cost-sharing of human development programs. These were extension and community affairs, manpower support services and adult professional development. This additional authority increased the total Agreement allocation from \$155.4 million to \$162.9 million.

PURPOSE AND OBJECTIVES

The Northlands Agreement is a commitment on the part of the governments of Canada and Manitoba to a comprehensive program directed towards socioeconomic development, increased opportunities for employment and an improved standard of living for northerners. It is intended to help residents of the remote north bridge the gap between their current circumstances and the real opportunities available both within their own communities and in the industrial urbanized centres of northern Manitoba.

Programming under the Agreement is designed to pursue the following objectives:

- a) to enable the people of the area to contribute to and participate in the development of northern Manitoba;
- b) to enable those people of the area who wish to do so, to continue their own way of life with enhanced pride and purpose; and
- c) to encourage the orderly utilization of the natural resources of northern Manitoba in harmony with resource conservation and for the benefit of the inhabitants, the province and the region.

STRUCTURE

The Northlands Agreement is structured to encompass a wide variety of development initiatives under four broad sections:

SECTOR A: Resources and Community Economic Development

SECTOR B: Human Development and Community Services

SECTOR C: Transportation and Communication

SECTOR D: Coordination and Pilot Action Research

Each sector is further divided into programs, projects and activities as shown in Figure 1 (fold-out).

MANAGEMENT

Coordination and management of the Agreement is the responsibility of both federal and provincial governments through their appointed representatives, the Joint Managers. The Department of Regional Economic Expansion (DREE) coordinates federal programming through the federal Joint Manager, while the Department of Northern Affairs coordinates the programs of twelve provincial departments through the provincial Joint Manager. The actual delivery of programming is the responsibility of the implementing department noted in Appendix A of this report.

FINANCING

The Northlands Agreement, with Amendments No. 1 and No. 2, provided a five year framework for the total commitment of \$155.4 million. With the extension of this agreement through Amendment No. 3 and the additional funding provided through Amendment No. 4 the six year total was increased to \$162.9 million. Financing under the agreement was designed to focus on resources and community economic development, human development and community services and transportation and communication.

Of the total \$162,916,000, the federal government's share of \$110,509,000 is contributed by the Department of Regional Economic Expansion, Department of Indian Affairs and Northern Development, Canada Employment and Immigration Commission and Transport Canada. The provincial government's share of the total is \$52,407,000.



SECTOR A

RESOURCES AND COMMUNITY ECONOMIC DEVELOPMENT

SECTOR A

RESOURCES AND COMMUNITY ECONOMIC DEVELOPMENT

The objective of this sector, as stated in the Agreement, is:

to provide the resources necessary for the assessment, planning, development and support of resource-based and other opportunities for a community economic development approach, emphasizing local participation, which is designed to provide long-term employment and increased well-being in communities on the basis of converging basic human needs with productive activity arising from the resources of the region;

Sector A encompasses three programs which are cost-shared between DREE (60%) and the Province of Manitoba (40%). These are Community Economic Planning and Support, Regional Resource Development Planning and Resource Development and Employment.

In 1981/82, programs in this sector had substantially reduced cost-sharing in comparison to previous years as Amendment No. 3 facilitated only the utilization of un-expended dollars. There were no additional funds provided to this sector.

PROGRAM COMMUNITY ECONOMIC PLANNING AND SUPPORT

This program provides assistance needed in the initiation of planning, research and experimentation required by communities, groups or associations, to formulate projects and activities that will encourage economic development in remote northern Manitoba communities.

This program consists of one project.

Project 1 Community Economic Feasibility and Support Services

This project provides for technical and planning services, management advisory services, market and feasibility studies, applied experimentation, data collection and resource analysis. It is the intention of this project to provide activities which are related to economic development at the community level.

Activity 1 Community Wildlife Management

It was the general intention of this activity to explore possibilities of effective utilization of local wildlife resources in northern Panitoba. Identification and development of both consumptive and non-consumptive uses of wildlife was undertaken in consultation with the local people.

Activity in 1981/82 related to polar bear management. Through this activity the program of effective polar bear depredation was continued.

This activity was implemented by the Manitoba Department of Natural Resources with expenditures of \$4,353.47 cost-shared 60/40 between DREE and Manitoba.

PROGRAM RESOURCE DEVELOPMENT AND EMPLOYMENT

The objective of this program is to provide financial assistance to develop the natural resources of the region in order to increase the number of employment opportunities and to efficiently utilize resources for the benefit of northerners.

Project 1 Park Development

This project was designed to provide for the construction and/or upgrading of parks infrastructure in order to enhance the utilization of recreational options offered by the natural resources region. In addition, local employment opportunities would be increased both directly and indirectly, in the tourist and associated service industries.

Activity 1 Parks Infrastructure Development and Planning

This activity was implemented by the Manitoba Department of Natural Resources, Parks Branch. In 1981/82, expenditures of \$4,961.88 were shared 60/40 between DREE and Manitoba and related to construction activities at the Troy Lake Wayside, located along the Thompson-Split Lake Road.

Project 2 Community Economic Development and Employment

The purpose of this project was to provide the technical and financial assistance required for the development and implementation of community-oriented initiatives aimed at increasing local employment and income opportunities and is intended to enable residents to utilize resources more efficiently.

Activity 1 Northern Gardening

The purpose of this activity was to develop local skills in the production of vegetables in northern and remote communities, thereby improving the nutritional base of residents living in those communities.

During 1981/82, assistance was provided through the purchase of a tractor for use with the large tiller. A total of 127 gardens were tilled in preparation for the planting of vegetables during the summer months.

This activity was implemented by the Manitoba Department of Agriculture utilizing a staff of two. In 1981/82 expenditures of \$7,610.18 were costshared 60/40 by DREE and Manitoba.

SECTOR B

HUMAN DEVELOPMENT AND COMMUNITY SERVICES

SECTOR B

HUMAN DEVELOPMENT AND COMMUNITY SERVICES

The objective of this sector, as stated in the Agreement, is:

to assist families and communities to provide a social and physical environment conducive to the improvement of the quality of life and the participation of people in community affairs and development opportunities;

Amendments No. 3 and No. 4 facilitated support to these programs: Extension and Community Affairs, Northern Manitoba Human Development Services, Man-power Development Services, Northern Community Services, and Indian Reserve Community Services.

PROGRAM EXTENSION AND COMMUNITY AFFAIRS

The objective of this program is to improve the capacity of northern communities to manage local government and community economic development. This program consists of one project: Extension and Community Affairs.

Project 1 Extension and Community Affairs

The intention of this project was to provide financial assistance for those activities which encourage participation in local government and community affairs and which provide opportunities to northern youth to broaden their general education and experiences.

This project consists of four activities: Local Government and Community Services, Youth Travel, Cultural and Recreation Services and 4H North.

Activity 1 Local Government and Community Services

The purpose of this activity is to provide information services, training and exposure programs and other required resources in support of residents of northern remote communities for their increased participation in local and regional socio-economic opportunities and for their increased participation in the development of local government and community affairs.

In 1981/82, this activity provided for a consultation process between the Department of Northern Affairs, DREE, and northern and native organizations. Seven consultation meetings were held with nine organizations to discuss local priorities related to a new Northern Initiative.

This activity was implemented by the Manitoba Department of Northern Affairs.

The total cost of the consultation was \$16,040.28 of which \$6,154.18 was cost-shared 60/40 between DREE and Manitoba.

Activity 2 Youth Travel

The intent of the Youth Travel activity is to provide students from Grades I through XII, in northern and remote Manitoba communities, with the opportunity to participate in educational travel in order to:

- increase the knowledge of students regarding educational employment opportunities, services, and lifestyle variation in other communities of the province;
- enrich educational programs offered in these schools by providing a practical learning experience in which students plan, organize, implement and participate in curriculum and/or career related travel projects; and
- experience the economic, cultural, social and geographic aspects of different regions of Manitoba as they pertain to cirriculum studies and interact with people who live and work in these regions.

During 1981/82 assistance was provided to 12 travel groups representing 14 schools and a total of 522 students under the Youth Travel activity.

This activity was implemented by the Manitoba Department of Labour and Manpower. In 1981/82 expenditures of \$33,076.82 were shared 60/40 between DREE and Manitoba.

Table B.1 displays the number of students from each school who participated in the Youth Travel activity and communities they visited.

Travel destinations were as follows:

- 97% to Winnipeg and other locations in southern Manitoba
- 3% to Cranberry Portage and other northern locations.

Activity 3 Cultural and Recreation Services

The Recreation Services component of this activity was designed to assist all northern Manitoba communities in the development of community recreation development. The activity is composed of four area components: I) Community Programs Development, II) Human Resources Development, III) Exposure, and IV) Physical Resources Development. These four areas are, in turn, divided into a number of sub activities.

I COMMUNITY PROGRAMS DEVELOPMENT

Assisted Manitoba communities in the planning, implementation and coordination of community recreation development in the following activities:

- i) <u>Consultative Services</u> provided consultation and support in the planning and management of recreation services, programs, and facilities. In 1981/82, 855 consultations with communities were provided.
- ii) Grant to Regional Recreation Council Provided an administration grant of \$5,000 to the Northern Manitoba Recreation Association (NORMRA), which assumes the responsibility for coordinating regional activities such as conferences, seminars, festivals, etc. All communities north of the 53rd parallel may have representation on the Regional Recreation Council.
- iii) Northern Water Safety Provided competent water safety education and swim instruction to residents of remote Indian-Metis communities. Eighteen communities were serviced expending \$13,199.28.
 - iv) Summer Activities Program Provided leadership training and skills development activities for 4 summer recreation workers (provided by S.T.E.P.), 37 communities were serviced expending \$10,000.

II HUMAN RESOURCES DEVELOPMENT

Provided training for potential community recreation leaders and supported events which develop skills in leisure time activities, through the following:

- i) <u>Frontier Games</u> Provided competitive sport and exchange opportunities for those communities serviced by the Frontier School Division. Expenditures totalled \$22,000.
- ii) <u>Leadership Training</u> Provided workshops, clinics, and courses for the development of recreation leaders and volunteers who offer recreation opportunities in their communities.
- iii) <u>Skills Development</u> Provided 49 clinics and workshops for leaders in activities which are underdeveloped.
 - iv) Regional Sport Development Offered Northern Manitobans opportunities to participate in different sporting activities and to begin to identify athletes who have the potential of reaching higher levels of achievement. Funds totalling \$24,449 were expended allowing communities to participate in sporting activities.
 - v) Recreation for the Disabled The following communities were provided with public education and training programs to enable them to integrate the disable d into community recreation activities: Thompson, Lynn Lake, Flin Flon, The Pas, and Sasagui Rapids (attendance from Flin Flon, Lynn Lake, Gillam, The Pas, Thompson, Leaf Rapids, and Churchill).

III EXPOSURE

Increase the appreciation for and understanding of recreation by providing opportunities for Manitobans to be exposed to new and unique physical, cultural and social recreation activities.

- i) <u>Conferences</u> provided a forum for the exchange of ideas, information giving, and the planning and evaluation of local, regional and provincial recreation services. Representatives from communities were sponsored to attend conferences in Winnipeg as well as the north.
- ii) <u>Demonstrations</u> Demonstrations were held in 11 communities to present new recreation activities at the local, regional and provincial levels.
- iii) <u>New Activities Assistance</u> Assisted 28 communities to initiate new activities with the intent of establishing a program.
- iv) Regional Newsletter "Tansi" The regional newsletter provided information and allowed for communication and exchange of programs and ideas among all northern Manitoba communities on a monthly basis.
- v) <u>Fitness Development</u> Sponsored special events, aided community programs, provided consultation and produced resource material, for the purpose of increasing awareness of fitness in the communities of Cranberry Portage, Flin Flon, Lynn Lake, Snow Lake, The Pas, Wanless, Carrot Valley, Pikwitonei, South Indian Lake, Wabowden, Thompson and Duck Bay.

IV) PHYSICAL RESOURCES DEVELOPMENT

Assisted Northern communities to develop their physical recreation resources including facilities and equipment.

i) <u>Sport Facilities '80</u> - A grants program to communities, in support of the construction and renovation of sport facilities. A total of \$26,468.86 in grants were dispersed to Leaf Rapids, Crane River, Snow Lake, and the L.G.D. of Consol.

- ii) <u>Facilities Consultation</u> Provided a consultative service to communities and districts for the planning, operation and maintenance of major recreation facilities. All communities are eligible to receive this service.
- iii) Equipment Grants to Remote Communities This grant program to assist 42 communities in the purchase of recreational equipment (up to a mazimum of \$800.00) for a total of \$31,873.98 in grants.
 - iv) Energy Assistance Program A program that provided aid, offsetting the effects of Manitoba Hydro's demand billing system on major recreation facilities to 5 communities for a total of \$31,301.54 in grants.
 - v) Recreation Facilities '81 A grant program to communities in support of the construction and renovation of recreation facilities. A total of \$104,310.65 in grants.

The recreation services activity was implemented by the Manitoba Department of Fitness, Recreation and Sport utilizing a staff of 8. In 1981/82 expenditures of \$374,175.59 were shared 60/40 between DREE and Manitoba.

Table B.2 details the delivery of the Recreation Services activity by community.

Activity 4 4-H North

The 4-H program has the objectives of helping people acquire attitudes, knowledge and skills which will contribute towards social and economic development in northern Manitoba. The core of this extension program is the formation of Clubs with adult volunteers as leaders and children (aged 9 - 19) as members. Each club carries out a variety of project work and recreational activities.

Progress during 1981/82 included the following:

- a) An agreement was made with the Department of Community Services for each 4-H Specialist to spend 60% of their time on 4-H, and 40% on the Home Economics program. It was felt that this would give workers more credibility in the remote communities and, through the health and nutrition programs, opportunities to deal with adults and children in which to develop a 4-H program.
- b) The Youth Gardening Program, a cooperative venture between the Northern Horticultural Program, 4-H North and the Nutrition Advisors of the Frontier School Division was successful in reaching approximately 50 youths in 6 communities.
- c) Newsletters to promote 4-H in urban and remote communities were printed and distributed.
- d) In Home Economics, staff promoted activities in selected communities in nutrition; money management, home improvement and family life.
- e) Club Achievement Days, camping trips, leadership and communication workshops, project training activities and other related 4-H activities.

Table B.3 lists the 4-H participants and active clubs.

This activity was implemented by the Manitoba Department of Agriculture utilizing three full-time and two part-time staff operating out of Thompson and The Pas. Expenditures of \$86,593.41 were shared 60/40 between DREE and Manitoba.

PROGRAM

NORTHERN MANITOBA HUMAN DEVELOPMENT SERVICES

The purpose of this program is to provide assistance to northern Manitoba residents with the aim of increasing work experience. Counselling and employment information is available as well to increase the range of human development services.

This program consists of two projects: Manpower Support Services, and Adult Professional Development.

Project 1 Manpower Support Services

This project provides an integrated manpower service which includes a job information and referral network, relocation services, a family support service and a youth corps program.

Activity 1 Employment Services

The Employment Services activity is intended to both assist northerners to obtain and retain employment by providing employment services and to create summer employment for northern youth. The activity consists of three components 1) Relocation 2) General Employment Services and 3) Northern Youth Corps.

- 1) Relocation: Provided counselling, home advisory and other related support services to workers and their families who were relocated for employment with northern mines. During the year, 138 workers were relocated to Flin Flon, 15 to Thompson and 13 to Leaf Rapids, for a total of 166.
- 2) General Employment Services: Provided counselling, referral, job/training placement services to unemployed northerners. Approximately 2,200 different clients were assisted with a wide variety of services. Included within this number were 35 construction jobs related to the Split Lake to Gillam road and assistance in the relocation of 24 BUNTEP students and their families in relocating to Thompson. Table B.4 contains further detail.
- 3) Northern Youth Corps: Provided for the creation of summer jobs in northern Manitoba communities by providing grants for wages to sponsors of community improvement projects. A total of 57 projects were funded, providing summer jobs for 315 youth and 32 supervisors. Table B.5 contains further detail.

Activity 2 Family Support Services

Family Support Services provides educational programs in aid of nutrition, money management, home-making skills and housing for the changing patterns of socio-economic development in the north.

Greater co-operation between provincial implementing departments resulted in joint delivery of programs to a wider coverage of the northern region and improved service to isolated communities.

This activity was implemented by the Manitoba Departments of Health and Community Services utilizing the services of 3 Home Economists and 2 support staff.

In 1981/82 expenditures of \$159,510.63 were cost-shared 60/40 between DREE and Manitoba.

Table B.7 provides a summary of this activity.

Activity 3

Career Resource Centre

The objective of this activity was to stimulate career awareness and to provide career planning and counselling to interested northern residents. In 1981/82 this activit- was composed of six main operational areas. They are as follows:

Ι. Dissemination of information: including occupational descriptions, national university and college information, job search techniques, labour market information, educational opportunities, skills assessment techniques, curriculum development aids and social services resources.

Activity in this area during the year included:

- the printing of occupation posters
- provision of Reed Career services tapes to students
- mall displays in Thompson and Leaf Rapids
- two job readiness sessions in Thompson
- the holding of various meetings and fielding of inquiries.
- II. Testing and Assessment: the centre employs qualified staff who provide psychological tests to determine interests and aptitudes of clients.
- III. Counselling Services: to help individuals to establish career goals.

Activity in this area during the year included:

- 433 counselling sessions involving 245 clients
- 39 group sessions
- program held in conjunction with the Northern Youth Corps with student representation as follows:
 - 4 Oxford House
 - 5 Garden Hill
 - 4 St. Theresa Point 5 - South Indian Lake
 - 5 God's Lake Narrows 3 Norway House 5 - Cross Lake
 - 3 Ilford
 - 2 Wasagamack

- IV. Referral To Training: is provided on an ongoing basis.
 - V. <u>Referral to Appropriate Agency</u>: staff ensures clients are aware of available community resources.
- VI. <u>Career Consulting in Program Development</u>: to assist schools and organizations in the development of programs for career counselling Schools in Wabowden, Leaf Rapids and Thompson received services.

This activity was implemented by the Manitoba Department of Labour and Manpower utilizing a staff of three including one managerial consultant, one consultant and one resource technician.

In addition to the services provided by the Thompson centre, the Dauphin centre provided job and career counselling to the communities of Duck Bay, Camperville, Pine River, Rorkton, Toutes Aide and Winnipegosis.

During 1981/82 expenditures of \$143,110.15 were cost-shared 60/40 between DREE and Manitoba.

Project 2 Adult Professional Development

The objective of this project is to increase the participation of northerners in professional, technical and administrative jobs in both northern remote communities and urban centres. In 1981/82, this project consisted of three activities: (1) New Careers, (2) Brandon University Northern Teacher Education Program (BUNTEP), and (3) ACCESS (formerly Special Mature Students Programs).

Activity 1 New Careers

The intention of this activity is to increase the participation of people from remote northern communities in professional, paraprofessional, technical

and administrative jobs in both remote and urban centres. New Careers consists of on-the-job training, related specifically to the skills and knowledge needed to perform particular jobs. For this purpose, it provides for staff, costs of administration, counselling, training allowances, travel, field cost of supervision and office expenses.

This activity was implemented by the Manitoba Department of Labour and Man-power utilizing a staff of nine. In 1981/82, expenditures of \$870,285.80 were shared 60/40 between DREE and Manitoba.

As Table B.8 displays, a total of 77 persons were registered for the 1981/82 term. Of this total, six persons discontinued the program before completing the entire course, twenty-seven finished the program and graduated, while forty-four continued in their training.

The following is a summary of participants in 1981/82:

- 77% were of Native ancestry
- 36% had Grade IX education or less
- 67% had unstable or intermittent employment records
- 43% were women.

Activity 2 Brandon University Northern Teacher Education Program (BUNTEP)

The objective of this activity is to provide field-based teacher training with appropriate financial, academic and personal support to residents of remote northern communities, who would otherwise have limited access to this opportunity.

The activity is intended not only to meet the demand for a stable supply of teachers in the northern communities but also to serve as a focus for the development of post secondary education in northern and remote Manitoba

communities. BUNTEP offers northern students the opportunity to gain elementary teacher certification in northern teaching centres. The required Arts, Science and Education courses are taught by visiting instructors from Brandon University or the resident centre co-ordinator.

BUNTEP served communities where:

- the community had demonstrated an interest in co-operating with the project by requesting a BUNTEP centre;
- the community was large enough to justify a centre by providing teaching positions:
- the community was centrally located among a number of small communities, which taken together, could provide teaching positions for graduates;
- the community had a demonstrated need on the basis of current teacher turnover rates affecting the quality of education.

During FY 81/82 there were 9 centres in operation throughout northern Manitoba, as well as some students completing their program on-campus. The centres at Island Lake and Cross Lake closed during the year. One new centre opened, the Thompson centre.

Table B.9 provides further information on this program.

Of the 153 students enrolled during 1981/82 eighteen graduated, thirty-five discontinued and 100 were in training at the end of March, 1982.

Of the 100 students enrolled:

- 76% were of native ancestry
- 66% had less than a grade XII education
- 75% were women.

This activity was implemented by the Manitoba Department of Education, Post-Secondary Career Development Branch. BUNTEP and ACCESS utilized a common staff of nine, operating out of Winnipeg, for the administration of both activities.

During 1981/82 expenditures for BUNTEP were \$2,392,000 and were cost-shared 60/40 between DREE and Manitoba.

Activity 3

ACCESS

The objective of this activity is to provide access to post-secondary educational programs to northern Manitobans who traditionally have not had the opportunity. During 1981/82 a variety of degree level courses were offered with a new thrust being offered for the first time in Science Engineering which 8 students took advantage of.

Special Pre-Medical Studies Program - University of Manitoba

This program's objective is to offer a pre-medical studies program which prepares students for entrance to the School of Medicine, Dental School of the Faculty of Pharmacy.

ACCESS - Brandon General Hospital

The objective of this program is to provide a Registered Nursing diploma level course at the Brandon General Hospital to natives and northern people who would not otherwise have access to this type of training.

ACCESS - Red River Community College

The objective is to provide human resource development through the delivery of post-secondary level educational programs to people who have traditionally been deprived of such opportunities. Students pursue a wide range of community college courses from the trades to Business Education Teacher Training. The length of the courses vary depending on the course chosen. A specially designed "pre-College" preparation program has proven very successful.

Table B.10 provides further information on the ACCESS activities.

A profile of participants in the various ACCESS activities is as follows:

- 80% were of native ancestry
- 78% had less than Grade XII
- 69% were women.

This activity was implemented by the Manitoba Department of Education, Post-Secondary Career Development Branch. ACCESS and BUNTEP utilized a common staff of nine, operating out of Winnipeg for the administration of both activities.

During the 1981/82 expenditures for ACCESS were \$1,952,004.97 and were cost-shared 60/40 between DREE and Manitoba.

BACKGROUND TO COMMUNITY SERVICES PROGRAMS

The Northern Community Services Program and the Indian Reserve Community Services Program are both designed to support the expansion of community services in remote northern Manitoba communities. Two separate programs are required because of separate jurisdictional responsibilities. The Northern Community Services Program, undertook projects and activities in northern communities which were located on lands other than Indian Reserve lands and which fall under provincial jurisdiction. For this programming, DREE and Manitoba shared costs on a 60/40 basis. The Indian Reserve Community Services Program undertook similar activities on northern Indian Reserve lands or those traditionally served by the federal Department of Indian Affairs and Northern Development (DIAND). Costs for this programming are shared 60/40 between DREE and DIAND. Although the programs are administered separately, they are similar in terms of purpose and content.

PROGRAM

NORTHERN COMMUNITY SERVICES

This program consists of two projects, Community Infrastructure Support Services and Community Infrastructure Services. The former provides planning tools for use in future development, while the latter is concerned with actual delivery of facilities.

Project 1 Community Infrastructure Support Services

This project is designed to develop plans to assist community residents in the appropriate use of lands and other resources, and to aid in the development of basic facilities. In 1981/82 this project consisted of one activity.

Activity 1 Northern Community Planning

The intent of this activity is to assist remote communities with the preparation of comprehensive land use and sub-division development plans and maps for townsites and their immediate hinterland.

The projects undertaken in 1981/82 with residual funding available in the Agreement were the preparation of subdivision plans for the communities of Herb Lake Landing and Cross Lake.

This activity was delivered by the Manitoba Department of Municipal Affairs with expenditures of \$1,548.10 cost-shared 60/40 between DREE and Manitoba.

Project 2 Community Infrastructure Services

The objective of this project is to work towards providing remote northern communities with basic community infrastructure services. Activities delivered under this project included safe water supply and community roads.

Activity 1 Safe Water Supply

This activity provides communities with a source of portable water using redimentary safe water delivery systems. Systems consist of either intake pipes (if surface supply) or wells (if groundwater source), pumphouses (equipped with filtration and chlorination), heat-traced distribution lines and one or more standpipe buildings.

Upon completion of the construction phase, the provincial department assesses operating costs, conducts on-site inspections, tests water for quality and chlorination levels, and trains local residents in the operation and maintenance of the system prior to turning it over to the community.

In 1981/82, water distribution and sewage collection mains were constructed in Wabowden to the "Point" sub-division. Banville Excavation, the contractor provided a total of 18 man months of employment for local residents.

This activity was delivered under contract by the Manitoba Water Services Board and the Manitoba Department of Northern Affairs. Expenditures of \$290,323.03 were cost-shared 60/40 between DREE and Manitoba.

Activity 2 Community Roads

This activity provides basic internal community access systems in communities under the jurisdictions of the Manitoba Department of Northern Affairs for the movement of people, goods and services. Components of the activity include roads, causeways, bridges, ferries, docks and the stockpiling of materials in preparation for these projects.

In 1981/82, work included some upgrading of the Norway House internal road system, construction of bridge approaches and the construction of a bridge over the east channel of the Nelson River linking West and Fort Islands.

The Norway House bridge, located immediately north of the Hudson Bay store, was designed and constructed as a single span, steel trussel bridge having a single lane 3.7 metres wide and 82.6 metres in length. The bridge was completed in November, 1981.

Contracts awarded for the construction of internal roads, approaches and the steel trussel bridge included:

- 1. Riverside Gravel: rock embankment and crushed aggregates,
- 2. Martel's Machine Shop: supply and fabrication of metal for bridge,
- 3. Tyndall Development Corp.: substructure and deck for bridge,
- 4. Dominion Bridge: supply, fabrication and erection of structural steel for bridge.

This project provided a total of 27,927 man-hours of labour. Approximately 11,893 or 42% of this labour was undertaken by northern residents.

The Department of Highways and Transportation incurred expenses of \$1,078,000.00 shared 60/40 between DREE and Manitoba.

PROGRAM

INDIAN RESERVE COMMUNITY SERVICES

In 1977/78, the Department of Indian Affairs and Northern Development (DIAND) identified as a priority the placement of new or improved potable water systems in northern Indian communities. Using the principle of "worst first", a priority list of communities was established by DIAND and the Manitoba Regional Office of Medical Services Branch. After the communities were identified, installation cost estimates proved to be much higher than anticipated. In order to meet the requirements for safe water activities, funds were transferred from other activities within the Indian Reserve Community Services Program, principally Community Planning and Waste Disposal Activities. These changes are reflected in the accompanying displays. Note that all expenditures displayed for each activity are those claimed under the Northlands Agreement only.

Project 1. Community Infrastructure Support Services

The objective of this project is to provide northern Indian communities with technical advice, maps and financial assistance to undertake their own comprehensive community planning.

In 1981/82, expenditures were directed to community planning only. No mapping or geotechnical land use studies, the other two activities in this project, were undertaken during the year.

Activity 1 Community Planning

The Community Planning activity is designed to assist communities in assuming the responsibility of planning their own development. The objective is to provide technical and financial resources, upon request, to all interested northern Indian communities.

Community Planning is a multi-disciplinary process designed to provide a framework for long-range comprehensive programs and policies; to determine the most efficient and effective use of financial, human and natural resources; and to encourage local government by providing an opportunity to formulate a strategy for community development.

In 1981/82, expenditures for this activity were \$20,000. These costs were shared 60.40 between DREE and DIAND. See Table B.11

Project 2 Community Infrastructure Services/Safe Water Supply Systems

The objective of this project is to provide one or more sources of potable water with a rudimentary delivery system to northern Indian communities.

In 1981/82, total expenditures were \$1,976,290.00 cost-shared 60/40 between DREE and DIAND.

During the year, these activities related to studies to identify potential sources of water and to recommend system types; to the design and construction of potable water systems entailing intake pipes, wells, pumphouses and treatment systems; distribution systems (standpipes or truck delivery): and other features related to the supply of safe water. The results of these activities are displayed in Table B.12

Project 3 Community Infrastructure Services/Waste Disposal Facilities

The objective of this project is to develop and provide facilities for the disposal of wastes in northern Indian communities. Activities include the design to upgrade and expand existing lagoons and plants, or to construct waste disposal facilities such as lagoons, sewage collection and treatment systems, incinerators, landfill sites, etc.

In 1981/82, total expenditures were \$27,500.00 shared 60/40 between DREE and DIAND.

Activity during 1981/82 was limited to the clearing and construction of two sanitary landfill disposal sites as displayed in Table B.13.

Project 4 Community Infrastructure Services/Fire Prevention and Protection

This project continued to emphasize the need to reduce the needless loss of life and property from fire on Indian Reserves. In 1981/82, expenditures were \$377,042.05 shared 60/40 between DREE and DIAND.

The project is developed by the Regional Fire Safety Officer and staff in consultation with Band Chiefs and Councils. It is designed for application on northern Indian Reserves but is applicable, with minor variations, to all Manitoba Indian Reserves.

The following components are included in this project:

- 1. Fire prevention awareness
- 2. Fire extinguisher training and placement
- 3. Provision and placement of smoke detectors in residences
- 4. Provision and placement of portable and/or mobile fire-fighting equipment in communities (i.e. pumps, water trailers, combination water delivery/fire trucks and auxiliary equipment)
- 5. Equipping and training volunteer fire-fighters. Basic training is conducted on-Reserve and advanced training at various locations in the Province, i.e. Manitoba Fire College at Brandon
- 6. Provision and installation of "alerting" systems
- 7. Adoption, by the Band, of a fire safety budget
- 8. Adoption, by the Band, of a fire protection code
- 9. Inclusion of equipment and training for fighting forest fires which threaten a community.

The long-range goals for the project continue to be (a) The control by Indian Bands of all fire safety requirements and (b) A reduction in annual fire losses. In 1981/82, a continuing effort was made to bring the "fire safety" message to as many communities as possible.

A further aspect of the project in 1981/82 was the establishment of a working arrangement with the Offices of Provincial Northern Affairs and Fire Commissioner. This arrangement allows for utilization of respective field staffs in formulating total community training programs. By this arrangement Volunteer Fire Department Provincial standard for towns and villages will be used on Indian Reserves. It also provides access to Manitoba Fire College facilities in Brandon and Thompson for theory and practical training.

The "Learn Not To Burn", (LNTB) School Curriculum which was introduced last year is continuing.

This phase of the Fire Safety Program was introduced in 1981/82. The activity thus far has centered on the purchase and distribution of portable equipment to fight forest fires and the utilization of Provincial Natural Resources personnel to provide basic training for community volunteers.

Project 5 Community Infrastructure Services/Internal Transportation

The objective of this project is to provide internal transportation services in northern Indian communities which will facilitate the better movement of people and goods and improve general public services. Activities include the design and construction of internal transportation works such as new roads, upgrading of existing roads, bridges, causeways and docks.

In 1981/82, total expenditures were \$2,510.00 shared 60/40 between DREE and DIAND.

Details of activities are displayed in Table B.19.

Project 6 Community Infrastructure Services/Multi-Purpose Facilities

There were no expenditures in support of this project in 1981/82.

SECTOR C

TRANSPORTATION AND COMMUNICATION

The objective of this sector, as stated in the Agreement, is:

to move toward providing reliable and reasonable access to all northern remote communities for the transportation of people, goods and services, and further to ensure the provision of communications infrastructure to increase the participation of people in community, provincial and national affairs.

Sector C consists of two programs, Surface Transportation and Remote Airstrip Improvement.

PROGRAM

SURFACE TRANSPORTATION

This program is designed to provide year-round surface access to remote northern Manitoba communities in order to facilitate the movement of people, goods and services, both on a community and regional basis. Road construction projects under the Surface Transportation program are cost-shared 30/30/40 between DREE, Transport Canada and Manitoba. Where water crossing facilities are required, costs are shared 60/40 between DREE and the Province.

During 1981/82, work was undertaken on two projects:

- (1) Thompson-Split Lake Road Project
- (2) Jenpeg-Cross Lake-Norway House Road Project.

These roads are being constructed or upgraded to provincial Department of Highways Design Standard (HDS) 09. Department of Highways Design Standards are displayed on Table C.1.

Project 1 Thompson-Split Road


This project was undertaken to provide all-weather surface access between the City of Thompson and the community of Split Lake. During construction of the road link between the two communities, a ferry barge provided access between a navigable point at the junction of the Burntwood and Odei Rivers and the community of Split Lake. Upon completion of the road to mile 81, the marine vessel, the "M.V. Joe Keeper" was relocated to provide access from mile 81 to the communities of Split Lake and York Landing. Figure C.1 locates this project.

a) Road Construction: mile 78 to community of Split Lake

This component of the Thompson-Split Lake Road project included the construction of an access road from mile 78 to the ferry landing site in the community of Split Lake. A contract to Smook Bros. included clearing, grading, consolidation and environmental clean up of burrow pits along the road way. The access road, completed in July 1981, provided a total of 4,655 man-hours of employment. Forty-seven percent or 2,200 man-hours were local labour.

b) Orr Creek

This component of the project included the reconstruction of the road at mile 46, over Orr Creek. A contract was awarded to North Point Construction to install a special baffle culvert system in the roadway to allow fish in the area waters to pass up or down stream. The project required that the stream be temporarily relocated in order for construction to take place. After the baffle culverts were set in place, the roadway was backfilled and the water was routed back to its original stream bed. The road embankment was completed in July 1981.



Construction at Orr Creek provided a total of 5,857 manhours of labour; 5,557 were northern, of these 1,987 were local.

The completion of these two components completes the Thompson-Split Lake Road project. During the 1981/82, the Department of Highways incurred expenses of \$346,744.63 which were shared 60/40 between DREE and Manitoba.

The marine vessel, the "M.V. Joe Keeper" is presently providing remote access to York Landing from the community of Split Lake.

Project 2 Jenpeg-Cross Lake-Norway House


This project was undertaken to provide all-weather road access between Jenpeg, Cross Lake and Norway House. A road has been completed between Jenpeg and Norway House. A cable ferry, the "M.V. James Apetagon" provides passage across the Nelson River at Sea River Falls. Figure C.2 locates this project.

Access to the community of Cross Lake involved the construction of a new road from Jenpeg, the placement of a cable ferry the "M.V. Alfred Settee Sr." across the north arm of the Nelson River at (Pipestone Channel), and upgrading of the existing road leading into Cross Lake.

In 1981/82, the new road Section, mile 0-18, was completed. This included gravel placement, road bed consolidation and clean-up for winter drainage. Preliminary design work on the cable ferry was undertaken by Dillion and Associates. Until this cable ferry is ready for use, the ferry vessel "M.V. Charlie Sinclair" is being used to cross Pipestone Channel.

Equipment rental agreements for the upgrading of mile 18-21 of the road were initiated with the local community Councils. The completion of the entire project is scheduled for the fall of 1982.

Expenditures of \$333,406.60 were shared 60/40 between DREE and Manitoba. Construction activities provided a total of 9,206 man-hours of labour of which 3,850 or 41% were local.



PROGRAM 2 REMOTE AIRSTRIP IMPROVEMENT

This program provided for the construction and/or upgrading of all-weather reliable airstrips in northern Manitoba communities which did not possess alternate and/or adequate transportation facilities in order to improve the movement of people, goods and services.

The program included the construction and/or upgrading of airstrips to a class D. geometric standard, provision of capital equipment to maintain the facilities, installation of basic navigational equipment to improve reliability of use, and the provision of various ancillary facilities as required at particular sites.

Project 1 Airstrip Development and Upgrading

Since its inception this program has generated some 88 man-years of employment in northern Manitoba. Twelve of these were involved with management, administration and staff development. The remaining 76 staff man-year positions existed at the field level in functions identified with airport managers, equipment operators, flight service officers and airport service workers. Approximately 98% of the staff at the field level were locally recruited.

During 1981/82 approximately 114 man-months of employment were generated in construction of facilities in 10 communities. These sites are located on Figure 3.C.


This project was implemented by the Manitoba Department of Highways and Transportation. Individual sites constitute activities. In 1981/82 expenditures of \$1,144,404.00 were cost-shared 60/40 between DREE and Manitoba.
