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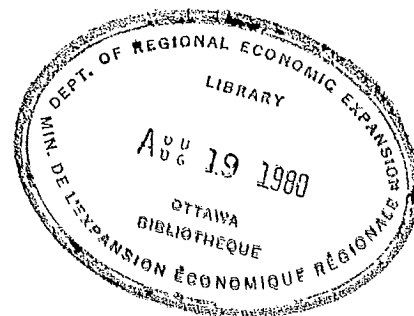


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FOREWORD

Under the General Development Agreement (GDA) signed June 5, 1974, the governments of Canada and Manitoba agreed to share the costs of certain development programs to improve the economic and social conditions of Manitobans. A major component of the strategy included in the GDA deals with the development needs of Manitoba's Northlands.

During two years of cost-sharing of programming under an Interim Agreement, a long-term Sub-Agreement was being planned and was signed on September 15, 1976. The long-term Agreement is effective for the five year period from April 1, 1976 - March 31, 1981, and is designed to deal with development issues in northern Manitoba including economic development planning, community infrastructure, human development and manpower and transportation.

The Agreement also states that information regarding past performance and progress shall be made available regularly to the people of northern Manitoba.

This report presents a community by community listing of 1976/77 Northland activities. This information is drawn from the "Canada/Manitoba Northlands Progress Report for the period April 1, 1976 - March 31, 1977" which reports on Northlands activities within the "sector, program and project" structure of the Agreement.

The report has four sections:

- 1) an alphabetical listing of the northern communities,
- 2) a listing of activities according to the structure of the Agreement,
- 3) a listing of activities by community, and
- 4) a glossary of terms.

The information is presented in a format that will be most meaningful to northern people. However, given that this is the first attempt to do so, there may be some errors. If errors are noted, please bring them to the attention of the Co-Secretaries of the Agreement. The Co-Secretaries are:

GLOSSARY OF TERMS

GLOSSARY OF TERMSSECTOR ABusiness Management Advisory Services

The provincial Communities Economic Development Fund utilized the efforts of four staff (an equivalent of two full positions is actually cost-shared) in the provision of various types of assistance and advisory services to clients. For 1976/77, the activity was focussed primarily on providing assistance in the areas of marketing, production, accounting systems and general organization, but also served the purpose of liaising with government departments and other agencies where necessary. A degree of internally oriented staff training and development was undertaken to the extent that these efforts had bearing on the matter of client accounts, financial management systems and project appraisal.

Horizontal Control Station

A permanent marker for which the exact location on a plan is known and recorded.

First Order Vertical Control

A vertical control station is a permanent marker for which the elevation with respect to sea level is known and recorded. A first order vertical control survey is one that meets certain predetermined and defined standards of density and accuracy. The same applies to first order horizontal control surveys.

Aerotriangulation

Triangulation is a horizontal control survey technique. Aerotriangulation uses aerial photography to facilitate the surveying of an area.

Cadastral and Shoreline Survey

Cadastral surveying shows or records property boundaries, subdivision lines, buildings and related details. In this report, it also includes shorelines.

Cadastral Contour and Photobase Survey

Aerial photography is used to make contour maps (a map showing lines connecting the points on a land surface that have the same elevation) of a township.

Planimetric Contour Shoreline Cadastral

A townsite plan showing contours and shorelines.

SECTOR BInformation and Extension Program (I/C Program)

This program consists of an extension services project designed to meet the basic informational needs of residents of northern Manitoba. Efforts are aimed at increasing an awareness which will allow residents to participate in a developing range of social and economic opportunities. In particular, the program is directed to the involvement of these persons in local government and in the acquisition of personal and group skills.

Pimadjihowin

This activity was initiated as the "Northeast Manitoba Development Study". The first major phase was to establish an appropriate mechanism for the participation of a particular region in the social and economic development process. From 1974-77, an organizational mechanism was established, there was contact with communities, information and technical reports were generated and development opportunities initially identified.

Youth Travel

Planning, program design, administrative and financial assistance were provided to more than enhance the likelihood that school youth in northern and remote Manitoba communities would be able to participate in educational travel projects.

4-H North

4-H North aims at expanding the number of members, leaders and clubs in northern communities. The purpose is to develop 4-H as a self-directed organization capable of assisting people to acquire skills, attitudes and knowledge in the areas of project learning and group process. While this activity has been focussing on the more urban of the northern communities in terms of club development, promotion of youth activities in more remote areas was carried out through northern youth conferences, public meetings with organizations and groups and the Northern Women's Conference.

Culture and Recreation Services

The cultural and recreational services activity is made up of four components: human resources development, physical resources development, community programs and development and the exposure component designed to increase the appreciation of and understanding of recreational activities.

Northern Development Corps - Regional Services

The Regional Services activity undertook the delivery of a regionally-managed and community-based human development service. The following services were delivered: employment services (job information, employment counselling and employment referral systems), a Youth Corps program, a Family Home Advisory program, a northern apprenticeship service, an employment relocation support service and community-based short-term training projects.

New Careers

The program provides structured on-the-job training and employment. Approximately 70 per cent of the two-year training period is spent on the job and 30 per cent in the classroom.

Brandon University Native Teacher Education Program (BUNTEP)

The BUNTEP program provides teacher training and support to Indian and Métis residents in remote northern communities to meet the need and demand for native teachers in those communities.

BUNTEP serves those communities in which:

- the community has demonstrated an interest in cooperating with the project by requesting a BUNTEP centre;
- the community is large enough to justify a centre by providing teaching positions;
- the community is centrally located among a number of small communities, which, taken together, can provide teaching positions for graduates; and
- the community has demonstrated need on the basis of current teacher turnover rates affecting the quality of education.

Special Mature Students Program (SMSP)

The Special Mature Students Program is designed to deliver a degree level university program in selected schools and faculties at Brandon University and the University of Manitoba as well as delivering a Registered Nurses Program at Brandon General Hospital. These projects require students to attend a full calendar year at the institutions concerned, with the opportunity to pursue university degrees. Special supports and counselling are provided to assist the students.

Outreach

Outreach focusses on providing manpower services along with the ongoing placement and support services of the Department of Canada Manpower and Immigration to those residents of remote communities who lack the necessary skills to effectively participate in the labour market and who experience particular and continuing difficulty in finding and keeping satisfactory employment.

Local Employment Assistance Program (LEAP)

The purpose of LEAP is to develop new ways of creating jobs for residents of northern Manitoba. LEAP projects may be initiated by a range of sponsoring organizations -- voluntary non-profit groups, citizens' organizations, community corporations, cooperatives, individuals, or municipalities.

IMPACTE (Indian Métis Project for Careers through Teacher Education)

This is a three-year, full-time University program supporting the development of Native people leading to a degree in Teacher Education.

PENT (Project for the Education of Native Teachers)

Paraprofessional teacher aides are provided with an opportunity to further their education through this program held at Brandon University.

BJRT (Basic Job Readiness Training)

This program provides special academic training to upgrade the skills of Native people.

Community Townsite Planning

The objective of the community townsite planning activity is: to assist communities on a continuing basis in the formulation of development objectives and plans, to develop comprehensive community plans to guide the community's growth and meet its land needs over the next decade, and to develop legal planning schemes which will allow community councils to administer and control land use and development. Further assistance is given to communities by examining the resource base in their immediate hinterland and developing proposals for their utilization and protection to ensure the future benefit and economic development of the community.

Basically, this work is undertaken in six phases:

a) Initial Stage

In response to a community request to prepare a plan, the goals, needs, scope and timetable are defined. The proposal is then detailed, stating terms of reference, identifying inputs, methodology and approach, utilizing local participation via planning committees. Implementation of the process as outlined above begins after agreement with the community has been reached.

b) Inventory and Resource Analysis

Baseline studies, information gathering, research and field surveys are undertaken utilizing consulting inputs where special studies are required. The existing community situation and resource potential and needs are also identified. A preliminary report is developed at this stage.

c) Alternate Development Strategies and Recommendations

Alternate land-use and action plans and policies are identified. Each alternative is then assessed from a planning point of view. These are then reviewed by the community.

d) Community Land-Use Plan

When the community chooses one of the development strategies, a plan and report are prepared.

e) Legal Stage - Adoption of Plan

Under this phase, a basic planning statement, development plan or zoning bylaw are approved by the Minister.

f) Implementation and Administration of the Plan

Under this phase, structures such as advisory planning committees are put in place to administer the plan. These committees recommend on all development proposals, amendments and rezoning plans.

Community Base Mapping

The objective of the community base mapping activity is :

a) To provide aerial photographs and comprehensive mapping at a scale of 1:2,000 comprising the cultural, physical and cadastral nature of northern communities;

b) To provide a property ownership, land use and residents map, as well as a photo binder and location plan for northern communities.

Geotechnical Land-Use Studies

Generally, the objective of this activity is to meet the needs of remote, central and northern Manitoba communities for upgrading community services which include a safe water supply, adequate waste disposal, organized townsite development and identification of construction material sources. More specifically, these are:

a) Determining the site stratigraphy and soil conditions to provide such basic data as the physical properties of the soils, depth of bedrock, depth to water table, and on the basis of this information, evaluate trenching conditions, sewage disposal systems, foundation conditions for small residential buildings, shoreline erosion and bank stability;

b) Determining flood levels, shoreline erosion and bank stability on adjacent bodies of water, in order to locate a development set back line;

c) Evaluating groundwater and surface water for their potential use as long-term municipal water supplies;

d) Locating suitable construction materials such as gravel for roads and airstrips, and concrete and clay for fill and sewage lagoon linings.

Design/Engineering for Community Facilities

Pre-engineering and design work is basically carried out in five phases as follows:

a) Advisory Phase

The community is approached as to the nature of the service which can be provided, and community preferences for location are noted.

b) Information Collection Phase

Pre-design work such as soil investigations, field surveys, site measurements and water quality testing is undertaken.

c) Design Services Phase

A preliminary design is prepared from the available information, and community meetings are initiated to discuss any differences between the engineering considerations and community aspirations.

d) Final Plans/Resolution

Following agreement with the community, the final design specifications are drawn up and approved by the community via a resolution.

e) Construction Phase

During this phase, staff lay out the work to be performed and monitor the construction to ensure adherence to design.

Sanitation Services

Sanitation services work included installation of:

- a) water treatment and distribution systems;
- b) sewage collection and treatment systems; and
- c) modification to existing supply works.

Fire Protection/Prevention

The fire protection/prevention activity is intended to provide northern remote communities with basic protective fire-fighting equipment and fire prevention knowledge.

The activity consists of six components: inspections, regional workshops, community workshops, fire training workshops, surveys and the provision of fire-fighting equipment.

More specifically, these components are as follows:

- a) Inspections consist of dwelling inspections and reinspections to identify potential fire hazards for residents, so that the hazards can be removed.
- b) Regional Workshops are designed to bring together a number of community representatives within a region for the purpose of teaching the use of maintenance of equipment such as extinguishers and pumps so that the information can be taken back to the home community.
- c) Community Workshops bring together a number of local residents for the purpose of teaching them basic fire prevention/protection measures. The workshops involve lectures and demonstrations.
- d) Fire Training Workshops involve practical work experiences in the use of equipment such as portable pumps. Training is provided in the proper use of nozzles, hoses, self-contained breathing apparatus and general methods of fire suppression and first aid.

e) Surveys and used to determine the fire prevention and fire-fighting needs of the community. They include the number of dwellings and other buildings, populations, fire apparatus and recommendations for the appropriate fire-fighting equipment.

f) Capital Equipment is purchased and then provided to communities by the Department of Northern Affairs after the need has been assessed and recommended.

Community Infrastructure Support Services

The objective of this project, which consists of community planning and community base mapping, is to provide northern Indian communities with the resources to undertake their own comprehensive community planning. Community Planning is a process which examines community desires, human and natural resources, government policy and regulations and regional relationships in order to identify the desirability, the capability, the possibility and the potential for development. A community plan consists of a report and a graphic representation of existing conditions and conditions as projected in the future.

After the plan is produced, the continuing process will result in modifications of the plan throughout time. However, the plan acts as a tool in providing direction for decision making.

Community Base Mapping involves the production of comprehensive community base maps showing topographic and other physical and cultural information.

In addition to community planning and community base mapping projects assisted under the community infrastructure support services project, there are other projects. They are: safe water supplies, waste disposal facilities, fire protection/prevention, internal transportation services and multi-purpose facilities.

The safe water supplies project aims to provide one or more sources of potable water with rudimentary delivery systems to northern Indian communities.

Activities included under the waste disposal facilities project include the design and construction of waste disposal facilities such as lagoons, sewage collection and treatment systems, incinerators and landfill sites.

Under the fire protection/prevention project, fire protection equipment and fire safety training programs are provided to northern Indian communities.

The internal transportation services project provides assistance to northern Indian communities to facilitate better movement of people and goods and to improve general public services. Activities included the design and construction of internal transportation works such as new roads, upgrading existing roads, bridges, causeways, docks and foot bridges.
