
FOREWORD



GLOSSARY OF ACTIVITIES AND SPECIALIZED TERMS

Airstrip Development and Upgrading

This activity provided for the construction and/or upgrading of all-weather reliable airstrips in northern Manitoba which did not possess alternate and/or adequate transportation facilities.

Brandon University Northern Teacher Education Program (BUNTEP)

The intent of this activity was to meet the need and demand for teachers and to serve as a focus for the development of post-secondary education in northern and remote communities. This was done by providing teacher training and support to students who would otherwise have limited access to this opportunity.

Business Management Advisory Services

Under this activity the provincial Communities Economic Development Fund provided various types of assistance, advisory services and training to participants in northern enterprises.

Career Resource Centre

The objective of this activity was to stimulate career awareness and to provide career planning and counselling to interested northern residents. The Career Resource Centre, located in Thompson, was officially opened on September 23, 1980.

Channel Area Loggers

Channel Area Loggers Company Ltd. is a pulpwood cutting operation at Berens River. The intent of this activity was to produce an economically viable operation harvesting the forestry resource in the area, to provide training and employment to northern residents and to ultimately transfer control to these residents.

Community Infrastructure Services/
Fire Prevention/Protection

The objective of this activity was to emphasize the need for fire safety. It places emphasis on Fire Prevention, in an attempt to reduce the needless loss of life and property from fire. This activity was designed for application in northern Indian Reserves but is applicable, with minor variations, to all Manitoba Indian Reserves.

Community Infrastructure Services/
Internal Transportation

The objective of the activity was to provide internal transportation services to northern Indian communities. This included the design and construction of internal transportation works such as new roads, upgrading of existing roads, bridges, causeways and docks.

Community Infrastructure Services/
Safe Water Supplies

The objective of this program was to provide one or more sources of potable water, with a rudimentary delivery system, for northern Indian communities. This included the identifying of potential sources of water, the design and construction of potable water systems entailing intake pipes, wells, pumphouses and treatment facilities; the placement of distribution systems (standpipes or truck delivery); and other features related to the supply of safe water.

Community Planning

This activity was designed to provide technical advice and funds to northern Indian communities providing a framework for long range comprehensive policies and programs with regards to community development.

Community Resource Planning and
Feasibility Analysis

This activity undertakes feasibility studies, data and information gathering, and recommends management strategies relating to known and/or potential resource development opportunities in Manitoba.

Community Roads

This activity provided basic internal community access systems such as roads, causeways, bridges, ferries, docks and the stockpiling of materials in advance of these projects.

Community Wildlife Management

This activity was designed to benefit residents of northern communities by examining methods of improving the utilization and management of wildlife resources.

Cross Lake Road

This project was undertaken to provide surface access between Jenpeg, Cross Lake and Norway House, a total of 64 miles. It included a new road linking Jenpeg, Sea River Falls and Norway House; a cable ferry, The "M.V. James Apetegon" across the Nelson River; and a ferry barge, The "M.V. Charlie Sinclair" linking the new road at North Whiskey Jack to Cross Lake.

Cultural and Recreation Services

This activity assisted northern communities in developing recreational opportunities, as well as to provide the opportunity for northern residents to experience a variety of cultural events not normally available to them. It is composed of two components - Cultural Services and Recreational Services.

"Concerts in the North" - provided exposure to otherwise unobtainable entertainment and an opportunity for the development of local talent.

conferences - to provide a forum for the exchange of ideas and information regarding the planning of recreation activities at the local, regional and provincial levels.

consultative services - provided consultation and support in the planning and management of recreation services, programs and facilities.

demonstrations - to expose communities to new recreational activities at the local, regional and provincial levels.

energy assistance programs - provided aid and offset the effects of Manitoba Hydro's demand billing system on major recreational facilities.

equipment grants to remote communities - provided grants to assist remote northern communities in the purchase of recreation equipment.

facilities consultation - provided a consultative service to communities and districts for the planning, operation and maintenance of major recreation facilities.

facility grant - a program funded out of lotteries revenue, in support of the construction and renovation of recreation facilities.

fitness development - provided sponsors for special events, aided community programs, provided consultation and produced resource material, for the purpose of increasing awareness of fitness.

Frontier Games - provided students within the Frontier School Division with competitive activities and an opportunity for community exchange.

grant to regional recreation council - provided an administrative grant of \$5,000 to the Northern Recreation Association (NORMA) which coordinates regional activities.

leadership training - provided workshops, clinics, and courses for the development of part-time and full-time recreation leaders who would return and work in their communities.

music in the park - provided public exposure for Manitoba musicians as well as a variety of musical experience (free of charge) for community audiences.

new activities assistance - provided communities with assistance in the initiation of new activities with the intention of establishing programs.

northern water safety - provided water safety education and swimming instruction to residents of remote communities.

recreation for the disabled - provided selected communities with public education programs to enable them to provide for the disabled to become involved in community recreation.

regional festivals - provided encouragement in the participation of artistic activities by providing assistance for demonstrations and performances by local artists.

regional newsletter - provided information as well as a medium for the dispersal of information, programs and ideas among all northern Manitoba communities.

regional sport development - offered Northern Manitoban's opportunities to participate in different sporting activities and to identify athletes who have the potential of reaching higher levels of achievements.

skills development - provided clinics and workshops to develop a base for potential leaders in presently underdeveloped activities.

sports facilities '80 - a grant program paid out of lottery revenues to communities in support of the construction and renovation of sport facilities.

summer activities program - provided leadership training and skills development activities for summer recreation workers.

tour hosting - provided tours which were designed to equalize cultural opportunities in rural and northern areas by providing special events.

Diploma Nursing

The purpose of this activity was to identify the need, and to develop a curriculum for a diploma nursing program. This program, when fully implemented, will provide clinical practice in nursing stations, small rural hospitals and community based care centres in remote northern communities.

Economic Development/Technical Services

This activity monitored and provided financial and managerial support to specific development projects for which the government has a direct funding responsibility.

Employment Services

Progress under this activity was reported chiefly in terms of the following two components:

relocation services - this component was designed to move residents of remote communities to jobs in industrial centres.

youth corps - this component was designed to create summer jobs for youths in remote communities.

Family Support Services

This activity provided support services in the area of nutrition, money management and housing for the shifting life patterns of socio-economic development in the north.

Fire Prevention/Protection (DNA)

This activity provided northern remote communities with basic protective fire fighting equipment, training necessary to operate and maintain such equipment, and fire prevention knowledge. The construction, repair or upgrading of fire halls was also included in this activity.

Forest Harvesting and Development Plan

The purpose of this activity was to provide a long-term framework for the future management and development of Manitoba's forest resources, particularly for those Manitoba's living within the forested zone.

Forest Management and Employment

This activity was directed towards increasing employment and training opportunities in the forested zone of Manitoba. This was made

possible through intensified forestry management activities.

Forest Resource Infrastructure

The purpose of this activity was to improve the availability of, and access to, the forest resources in Manitoba. Initiatives entailed the engineering, design and construction of forest access roads into areas where commercial harvesting is viable. These access roads facilitate the movement of timber and crews.

Geotechnical Land Use Studies (DNA)

This activity produced basic geotechnical reports, including: inventory, inventory extension, water and sewer feasibility, sewage lagoon site evaluation, waste disposal site evaluation, septic suitability, airstrip site investigation, water reservoir (dug-out) site evaluation, developmental setback line site evaluation and others.

4-H North

This activity is a program which assisted young people to acquire skills, attitudes and knowledge in the areas of project learning and group process. 4-H North promoted activities through northern youth conferences, public meetings with organizations and groups as well as expanding the number of members, leaders and clubs.

Local Employment Assistance Program (LEAP)

The purpose of LEAP was to develop new ways of creating jobs for residents of northern communities. The funds provided through a LEAP contract are normally used for wages (paid at local rates) employer contributions for employee benefits and reasonable administration overhead costs. LEAP projects may be initiated by a range of sponsorship organizations, voluntary non-profit groups, citizens' organizations, community corporations, co-operatives and individuals.

Local Government and Community Services

This activity was designed to provide information services, training programs and other required resources in support of residents of remote northern communities for their increased participation in local and regional socio-economic opportunities as well as the development of local government and community affairs.

Minerals Evaluation Report

This activity consisted of publications concerning information derived from explorations in the Minerals Initiatives Activity.

Minerals Initiatives

Progress under this activity was reported chiefly in terms of the following three components:

geophysical investigations - the objective of this component was to investigate areas of anomalously high regional uranium concentration as a means to defining targets for mineral exploration.

mineral deposit studies - the purpose of this component was to describe and delineate the setting and form of all known mineral deposits and occurrences, through analysis and mapping, in order to better define the origins and controls of mineralization as an aid to future mineral exploration activities.

precambrian geological mapping - this component was designed to provide a method for developing a geological data base in order to detect and highlight the potential areas in northern Manitoba.

Moose Lake Loggers

The intent of this activity was to produce an economically viable operation harvesting forestry resources in the area, to provide training and employment to northern residents.

Moose Lake Road

This project was undertaken to provide an all weather road access between Atikameg on PR 287 and the community of Moose Lake. This 39-mile road would ultimately provide a link between Moose Lake and The Pas.

Multi-Purpose Facilities (DNA)

The objective of this activity was to provide remote northern communities with multi-purpose facilities such as community halls, arenas, garages and administrative buildings.

New Careers

This activity was designed to provide training to unskilled and/or unemployed adults to enable them to obtain positions within the public and private sector. This also includes the increasing of job skills and employability of adults confronted with special barriers to employment and education. The program tries to increase the number of trained personnel in field where little or no academic training resources exist within the province and to increase the number of trained individuals from a particular geographic area providing them with the competencies.

Northern Community Planning (DNA)

The intent of this activity was to assist remote communities by producing a variety of cultural, physical and cadastral maps also indicating property ownership, land use and residence to support community planning.

Northern Gardening

Northern horticultural programming was designed to meet the basic goal of developing land skills in the production of vegetables in northern and remote communities, thereby increasing the opportunity for improving the nutritional base of residents living in these communities.

commercial projects - six communities engaged in commercial projects in 1980/81 with development varying in size from 2 to 15 acres.

demonstrations - garden demonstrations were conducted and run by nutrition advisors who also collected production and variety performance data.

horticultural information - this was the most basic service provided under Northern Gardening to participating communities with main delivery through C.B.C. North Country Radio.

nutrition advisors - this program was the main delivery mechanism in promoting gardening in the Frontier School Division.

technical backup - provided technical assistance with emphasis on larger scale gardening projects.

workshops - workshops and seminars were held throughout the year on a variety of horticultural subjects.

Outreach

Outreach focused on providing manpower services along with the ongoing placement and support services of the CEIC to those residents of remote communities who lack the necessary skills to effectively participate in the labour market and who experience difficulty in finding and keeping satisfactory employment.

Parks Infrastructure Development and Planning

This activity provided for the construction and/or upgrading of parks infrastructure in order to enhance the utilization of recreational options offered by the natural resources region. It would also directly and indirectly increase local employment opportunities.

PR 327 - Easterville Road

This project was undertaken to upgrade the Easterville Road from PTH 6 to the junction of the Easterville access road (PR327), a total of 28 miles.

PR 391 - PTH 10 to Reed Lake

Construction along 34 miles of PR391 between PTH 10 and Reed Lake was implemented as part of an upgrading program to improve the efficiency and reliability of the northern transportation network in order to support resource and economic development, as well as to develop inter-community access.

PR 391 - Thompson Airport to Pipe Lake Mine Road

Road construction between Thompson Airport and Pipe Lake Mine Road (26.1 miles) was implemented as part of an upgrading program to improve the efficiency and reliability of the northern transportation network in order to support resources and economic development, as well as to develop inter-community access.

Improvements made to the access road into Paint Lake were also included in this project.

BUNTEP Facilities

This activity was an off-campus teacher training program delivered to students residing in remote northern communities. It is a three-year program which leads to an elementary teaching certificate. DIAND assisted in the operation of the BUNTEP centres, located in northern Indian Reserve Communities, by providing classroom facilities in schools or by providing suitable instructional area elsewhere to facilitate program delivery.

Community College Training

This activity provided the opportunity to acquire specialized skills required for gainful employment in a wide range of occupations. Support is provided to Treaty Indian students attending community college both within and outside Manitoba. Support was available for attendance in private colleges and in commercial training centres where approved courses of specialized skills at a post-secondary level are offered.

PENT (Project for Education of Native Teachers)

This activity provided teacher aides with an opportunity to further their education at Brandon University. Participants were sponsored for five spring and summer sessions (May through August) leading to teacher certification. Those graduating are employed at an initial salary above the normal intake level based upon the number of years' experience gained

Regular University Training

This activity enabled Treaty Indian students enrolled at universities in Manitoba, or an approved university outside the province, to pursue required training for professional employment. Support was provided in the form of

tuition fees, books, travel costs, living allowances, counselling services and special needs.

Surveys and Mapping

The intention of this activity was to ensure that a system of surveys and map control measures for identification, field data gathering, planning, implementation and management of natural resources was in place.

Thompson-Split Lake Road

This project was undertaken to provide all weather surface access between the City of Thompson and the community of Split Lake. During construction of the road link between the two communities, a ferry barge was to provide access between a navigable point at the junction of the Burntwood and Odei Rivers and the community of Split Lake. The marine vessel, the "M. V. Joe Keeper" was relocated upon completion of the road to mile 81 to provide access to the communities of Split Lake and York Landing.

Waste Disposal Facilities

The objective of this activity was to develop and provide facilities for the disposal of wastes in northern Indian communities.

Wild Rice Development

The purpose of this activity was to provide developmental assistance to communities in rice producing areas to maximize the economic benefits derived from the production of wild rice.

Youth Travel

The intent of this activity was to provide an opportunity for students in Grades I through XII in northern and remote communities to participate in educational travel.

PR 391 - Wabowden to Saob Lake

This project was undertaken to provide reliable year round surface access to northern Manitoba communities through the strengthening of the regional road network in support of resource development and inter-community access.

PR 391 - Watsko Lake to Hughes Lake

This project involved the upgrading of PR 391 between Watsko Lake and Hughes Lake (a distance of 21 miles) to improve the efficiency and reliability of the northern transportation network in support of resource development and inter-community access.

Sanitary Waste Management (DNA)

The objective of this activity was to develop and provide facilities for the disposal of waste material in remote northern communities.

Sewer and Safe Water (DNA)

This activity provided remote communities with potable water utilizing rudimentary delivery systems. Systems consists of either intake pipes (if surface supply) or well (if groundwater source), pumphouse (equiped with filtration and chlorination), heat traced distribution lines and one or more standpipe buildings.

Upon completion of the construction phase the department assesses operating costs, conducts on-site inspection, tests water for quality and chlorination levels, and trains local residents in operation and maintenance of the system prior to turning it over to the community.

Special Mature Students Program (ACCESS)

The Special Mature Students Program was designed to deliver a degree level university program, community college diploma or entrance in the School of Medicine to people who traditionally have not had the opportunity for such an education. Courses offered in selected schools and faculties at Brandon University, the University of Manitoba, Brandon General Hospital (which offers a Registered Nursing Program) and Red River Community College. The Brandon University program ended with the 1980/81 fiscal year.

It provided for training allowances, instruction costs, program support costs, counselling, costs of administration, field costs of supervision and office expenses.
