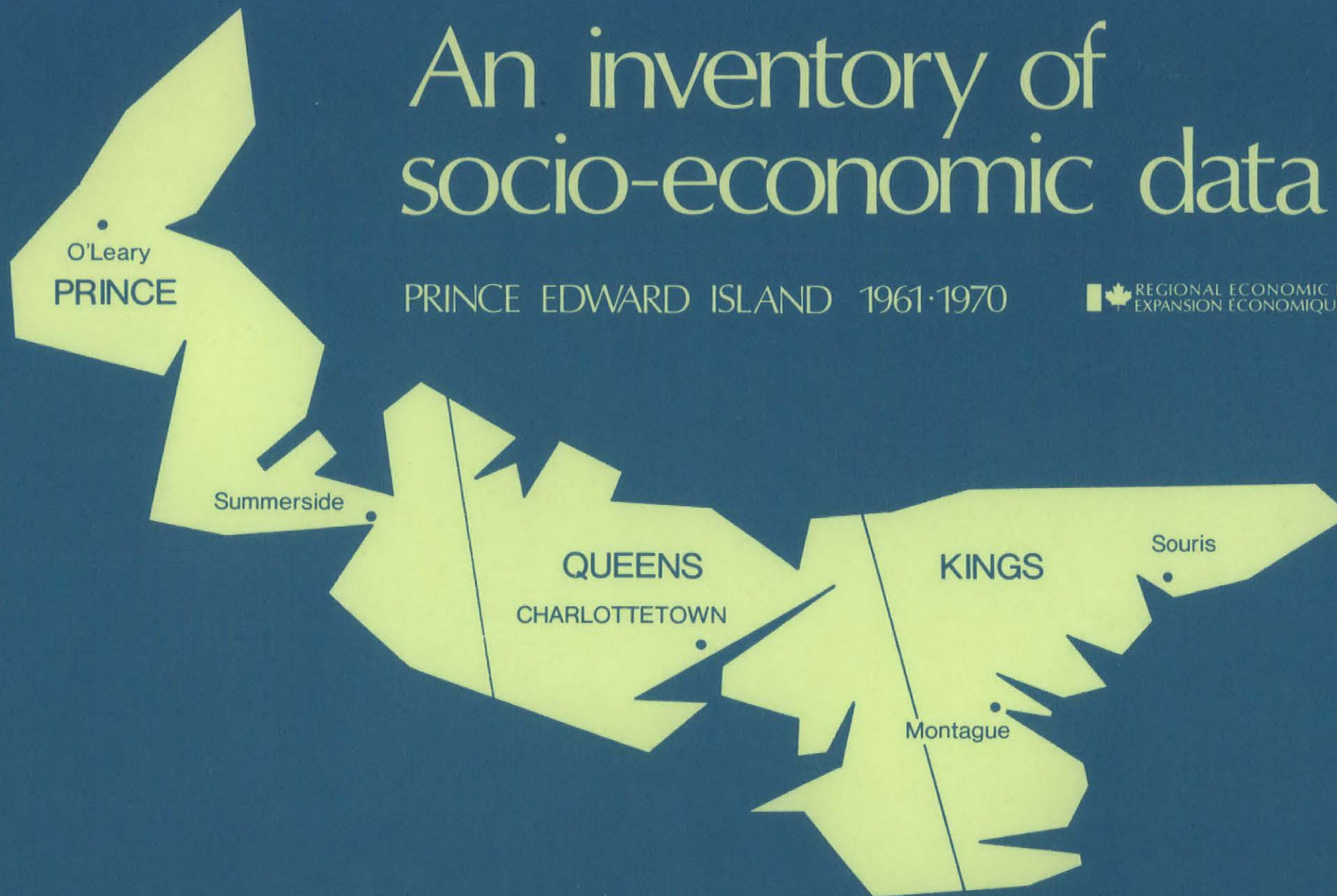

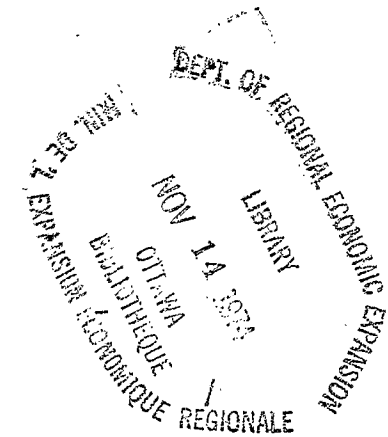

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FOREWORD

Undertaken by the Program Evaluation Branch of the Canada Department of Regional Economic Expansion with the cooperation and assistance of the Government of Prince Edward Island, the following inventory compilation was approved jointly by Canada and the Province under "The Development Plan for Prince Edward Island".

Presented whenever possible as a time series from 1961 - 1970, the data inventory is intended to give a statistical picture of all the important sectors of P.E.I. influenced by "The Plan". As data for the Atlantic Provinces and Canada are given in many instances, comparisons can be made among various regions of Canada.

The Inventory's uses are expected to be many. Those wishing to study the Island may use the data to measure the provincial economic and social environment discretely or they may choose to project the data to simulate baseline conditions. However, it should be recognized that since "The Development Plan for Prince Edward Island" is comprehensive in scope and is in fact designed to effect major revisions in the Island make-up, the trends apparent in the time series may well shift dramatically.

It is anticipated also that individual program and project managers of "The Plan" will use the data for management purposes. Implementors, armed with both trend patterns and actual figures, may be able to establish yardsticks with which to effectively gauge their own performance and formulate macro-goals for which to strive.

Continued updating of this document would be desirable if it is to retain its currency. We anticipate that this will be agreed to and will occur.

The data, compiled by Messrs. T. Brennan, R. Callaghan, J. Cronier, J. Gibson and T. Rankin under the supervision of M. Parnes was amassed during the three month period, June - August, 1971.

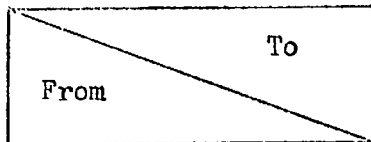

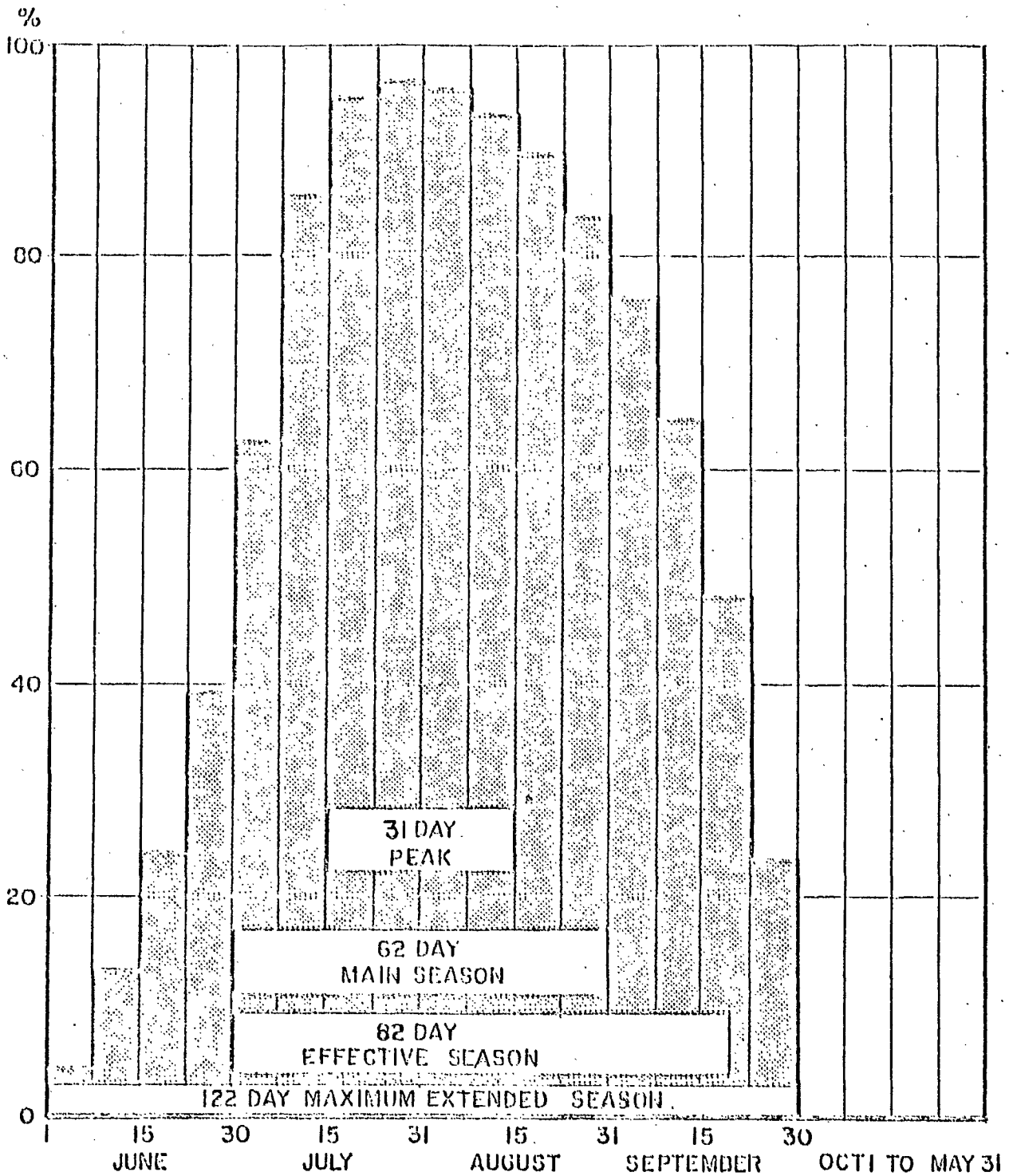

SECTION 8 RECREATION FACILITIES

PROVINCIAL PARKS:

In 1966-67, there were twenty-six provincial parks in this province containing 929 campsites and 500 individual picnic sites. By 1971-72, it is expected that there will be thirty-four parks with 1,262 campsites and 740 picnic sites.

There is a marked shoreline emphasis in the location of these parks. Sixteen of the twenty-six, or 61 per cent, have salt water frontage and offer bathing and sometimes clam-digging opportunities. However, there are also some fine inland parks in this province, notably Strathgartney and Sir Andrew McPhail Memorial Park.

No park or picnic areas are located in the basins of the Dunk, Morell, Hillsborough or Montague Rivers. Bloomfield Park located on Highway 2 between O'Leary and Alberton, is situated in the Mill River Basin.

NATIONAL PARKS:

Comprising seven square miles in a linear belt of land along the north shore of the province, Prince Edward Island National Park was established in 1937. This highly developed area is a major attraction for out-of-province tourists, and performs a significant role in local resident recreation patterns. Visitations to the park were about 946,000 in 1964, and 866,000 in 1965.

From the fiscal year 1936-37 to 1959-60, about \$3.5 million was spent for the capital development and the operation and maintenance of this park. From the fiscal year 1960-61 to 1964-65, capital development totalled \$2.1 million and operation and maintenance about \$974,000.

A master plan to guide the future development and operation of this park is in preparation.

Plans are now fairly advanced for the development of a second national park at East Point along the northeast shore of the Island. This will also be essentially a beach and oceanfront-oriented development.
