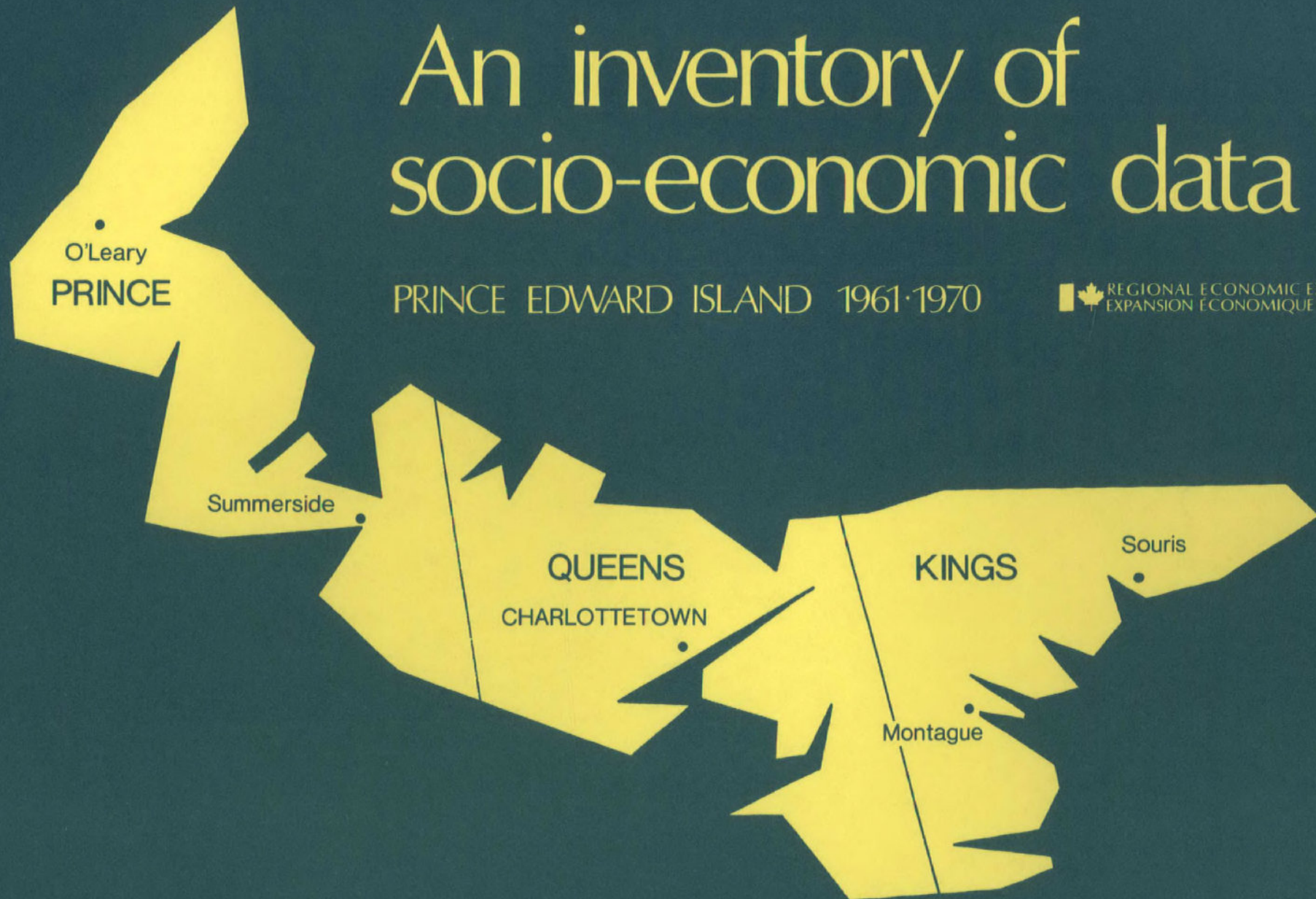

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FOREWORD

Undertaken by the Program Evaluation Branch of the Canada Department of Regional Economic Expansion with the cooperation and assistance of the Government of Prince Edward Island, the following inventory compilation was approved jointly by Canada and the Province under "The Development Plan for Prince Edward Island".

Presented whenever possible as a time series from 1961 - 1970, the data inventory is intended to give a statistical picture of all the important sectors of P.E.I. influenced by "The Plan". As data for the Atlantic Provinces and Canada are given in many instances, comparisons can be made among various regions of Canada.

The Inventory's uses are expected to be many. Those wishing to study the Island may use the data to measure the provincial economic and social environment discretely or they may choose to project the data to simulate baseline conditions. However, it should be recognized that since "The Development Plan for Prince Edward Island" is comprehensive in scope and is in fact designed to effect major revisions in the Island make-up, the trends apparent in the time series may well shift dramatically.

It is anticipated also that individual program and project managers of "The Plan" will use the data for management purposes. Implementors, armed with both trend patterns and actual figures, may be able to establish yardsticks with which to effectively gauge their own performance and formulate macro-goals for which to strive.

Continued updating of this document would be desirable if it is to retain its currency. We anticipate that this will be agreed to and will occur.

The data, compiled by Messrs. T. Brennan, R. Callaghan, J. Cronier, J. Gibson and T. Rankin under the supervision of M. Parnes was amassed during the three month period, June - August, 1971.

SECTION 3 ADULT EDUCATION

Agricultural Extension Services

Extension Services serves primarily as a resource, information centre for Island farmers. As well as providing actual courses, and financial assistance to enable island farmers to further their education, Extension Services provides individual contact and advice to the agricultural sector through district offices, 4H clubs, Women's Institute, and information in the media.

In 1964 one P.E.I. student attended the Dairy School at Guelph University in Ontario. The department sponsored Farm Management Meetings in eight centres under the Agronomy Fieldman. These courses included methods of calculating profit and loss, farm inventory, labour efficiency and size of business, and farm machinery use and repair. The following table summarizes the attendance and number of meetings.

In the winter of 1965 the department sponsored monthly farm management meetings for four months covering topics as crop yields, livestock yields, size of business, labour efficiency, combination of enterprises, and capital turn-over. These meetings averaged 12 to 15 attendance. Short courses on farm management were offered at O'Leary and Alberton. As well farm business analysis forms were distributed to interested farmers.

In 1966 four farm management accounting courses were offered in cooperation with Man-Management Development Section of the federal department of Manpower and Immigration.

In 1967 the extension services division worked through the Community Schools in cooperation with other government departments, corporations and agencies to offer courses of interest to P.E.I. farmers.

In 1968 14 students attended three, four week short courses at the Nova Scotia Agriculture School.

In 1971, eight week programs in the following areas were offered by extension services--marketing, farm records, farm arithmetic, credit and credit management, and general information involving Land Development Corporations, Farm Credit Corporation and other relevant government boards, corporations and agencies. Attendance averaged 25 participants. Forty one-week courses of a specialized nature were offered, averaging 20 participants. As well, 4,5 week farm machinery courses, involving a total of 80 farmers were offered.

FOREWORD

This report presents, in a tabular form, a course-by-course review of the training results for adult members of the labour force who participated in the Canada Manpower Training Program (C.M.T.P.) in the Atlantic Region.

The results are based on a continuing follow-up survey of former C.M.T.P. trainees conducted by the Planning and Evaluation Branch, P.D.S., of the Department of Manpower and Immigration, and covers those who completed full-time non-apprentice courses during Jan.-Dec. 1969. Not included in the survey are those who received training in private training institutions and in industries under C.M.T.P.

The follow-up is designed to cover at least one out of every four graduates of basic training and upgrading courses (B.T.S.D.) and all graduates of full-time non-apprentice skill courses, about three to four months after completion of the courses. The number of the above graduates during Jan.-Dec. 1969 in the Region represented just over 11,900 and of the 9,083 graduates surveyed 4,715 (54%) responded.

The survey results will be made available on a regular quarterly basis, covering a "rolling" twelve-month period.

REMARKS

The survey results shown in the attached tables should be interpreted with caution. First of all, the results should be carefully evaluated against the number of respondents and then the response rate for each individual course. These are shown in the last two columns under the heading "Survey Response". It can be generally stated that the results tend to be more reliable the greater the above-mentioned figures. This point cannot be overstressed. To take an extreme example, it would be meaningless to assume that the success rate was 100 per cent in the case of the only respondent who found a job after training. The converse is equally true, namely in a case where the only respondent failed to find employment it would be meaningless to assume that the success rate was zero per cent and that therefore the training was a complete waste. Such sweeping generalizations on the basis of replies received from a small number of respondents (say, ten or below) would be unwarranted. Hence the need for extreme care and caution in interpreting the results of the survey, especially in such cases.

Still other factors that should be taken into account in interpreting the survey results are drop-out rates, seasonal employment variations and the supply and demand conditions peculiar to local areas. One might even consider such non-quantifiable factors as personal gains in terms of functional betterment, which would enhance the trainee's chance of participating in the labour market.

Another point which should be noted is the presence of statistics from CMCs operating in other provinces or regions. The reason for this is that the CMCs listed are the authorizing CMCs. Thus, such occurrences merely indicate that CMCs from outside a given province have authorized clients to take training in that province. In this Region, however, the number of trainees whose training was authorized from outside the province is negligible, being highest in Nova Scotia at less than 4%.

SUMMARY OF REGIONAL HIGHLIGHTS

Over 68% of those who completed training during 1969 were fully employed within three to four months.

The comparable figure for skill-course graduates and B.T.S.D.-course graduates was 72% and 47%, respectively.

Sixty-two per cent of the employed group of skill-course graduates found jobs in occupations closely related with their training.

Of the employed group in occupations which are not related to the training received, 44% had reported earning significantly more than their pre-training wages.

The proportion of trainees not entering the labour market upon graduation is much higher for B.T.S.D. graduates (34%) than for skill-course graduates (5%). The former, however, includes trainees who proceed on to skill courses.

THE POLICY OF
STUDENT GRANTS FOR STUDIES
LEADING TO A UNIVERSITY DEGREE

A. Objective

The objective of this policy is to encourage young men and women from rural P. E. I. to take university training leading to professional occupations in the agricultural sciences, veterinary medicine or home economic sciences, and that the practice following graduation will be in P.E.I.

B. Assistance

1. The assistance under this policy is in the form of a \$500 grant for each university academic year in which a student is enrolled in studies leading to a Bachelors Degree in Agricultural, Home Economics science or Veterinary Medicine.

The assistance is limited to the minimum number of university years to obtain a basic degree.

C. Regulations

1. The assistance under this policy is restricted to bonafide P.E.I. farm residents whose parents' major occupation is farming.

2. The candidate for assistance must have proof of enrolment from the university in a course of studies leading either to a degree in Agricultural Science, Home Economics Science or Veterinary Medicine.

3. The candidate may make use of this policy at any of the recognized universities which grant the required degrees as stated in this policy.

4. The candidate or student must make application each year.

5. Applications for this assistance are to be forwarded to the Director of the Extension Services Branch of the Department of Agriculture.

D. Administration

This policy is administered by the Director of the Extension Services Branch of the P. E. I. Department of Agriculture.

TECHNICAL AND VOCATIONAL AGRICULTURAL
COLLEGE TRAINING ASSISTANCE POLICY

A. Objective

The objective of this policy is to encourage young men and women to take Vocational-Technical Agricultural training as a prelude to entering into a farm business, associated agrobusiness, or scientific laboratory technician.

B. Assistance Available

Plan "A"

1. The Department will make an annual grant to the Nova Scotia Agricultural College for each registered student under this policy in the amount as established under the Atlantic Provinces Agricultural Vocational and Technical Training Agreement with a maximum period of three years.

2. The Department will make a grant to each approved student in the amount of \$15 per week as a contribution toward the cost of board and room. This is limited to the number of weeks under the academic calendar in any one year with a maximum of three academic years.

Plan "B"

1. In the event that space is not available at the Nova Scotia Agricultural College and students have acceptable qualifications for other Agricultural Colleges, it will be the policy to provide assistance on behalf of each approved student in the amount of tuition, \$15 per week allowance toward board and room and the round-trip railway fare equivalent in each academic year with a maximum of three years.

C. Regulations

1. This policy is restricted to children of bona-fide Prince Edward Island residents.

2. It is expected that whenever possible that upon graduation with a diploma that the graduate would return to farms in Prince Edward Island or into agro-business, or into scientific support services.

This clause is made with full recognition that opportunities must be available and with competitive levels of remuneration.

3. Students between the 2nd and 3rd year of academic training must, wherever possible, become employed on farms, in agro-business in P. E. I., Government or technical activities.

4. Application for assistance to cost of living is to be made to the Director, Extension Services Branch of the P. E. I. Department of Agriculture.

D. Who may apply

1. Young people who have made application and have been accepted for entrance to the Nova Scotia Agricultural College or under "Plan B" regulations

2. The student must make application for assistance for each academic year.

E. Administration

1. This policy is administered by the Director of the Extension Services Branch of the P. E. I. Department of Agriculture.

2. The Department will take part in student counselling activities at the colleges - particularly during the third year to ensure that students are fully aware of opportunities for employment in P. E. I.

3. The Department will also maintain a roll of the graduates with information on the place and type of employment in which each is engaged for a period of five years following graduation.

4. Payments under this policy will be made to the Comptroller of the college or university in which the student is registered.

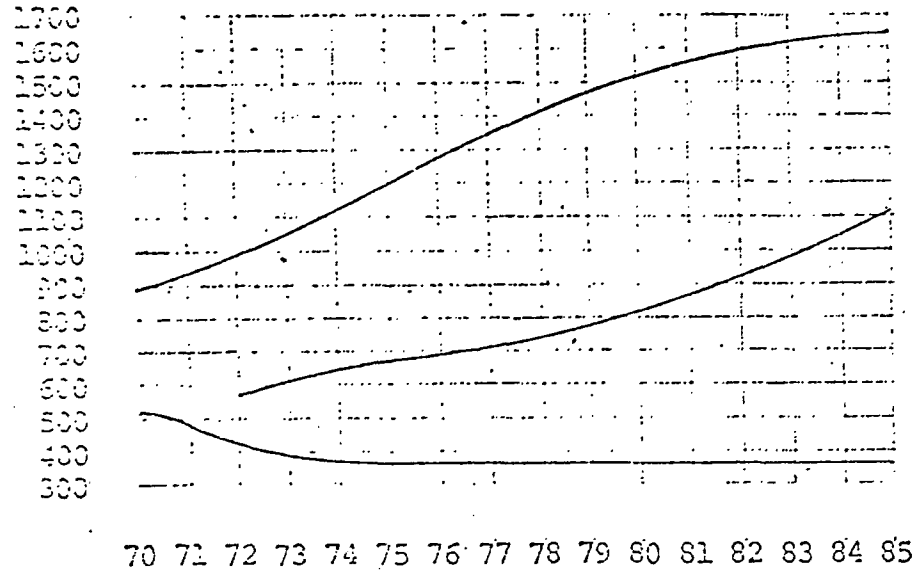
5. The university or college administration is authorized to withhold payment to students or on behalf of students where disciplinary action warrants such procedure and is subject to confirmation by the Department of Agriculture.

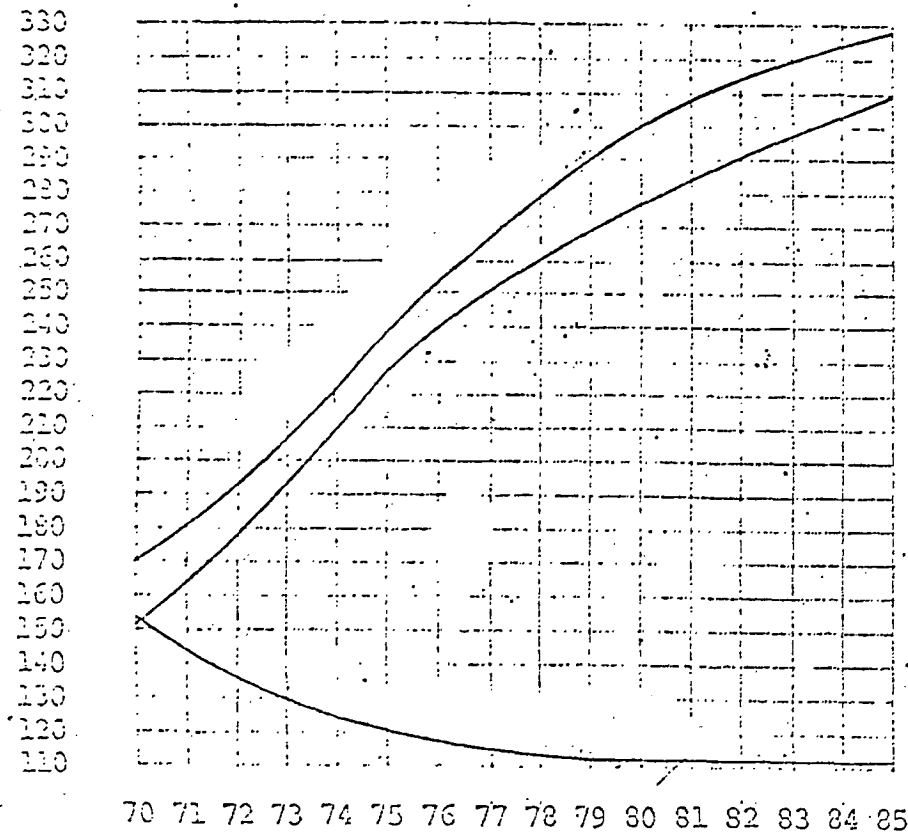

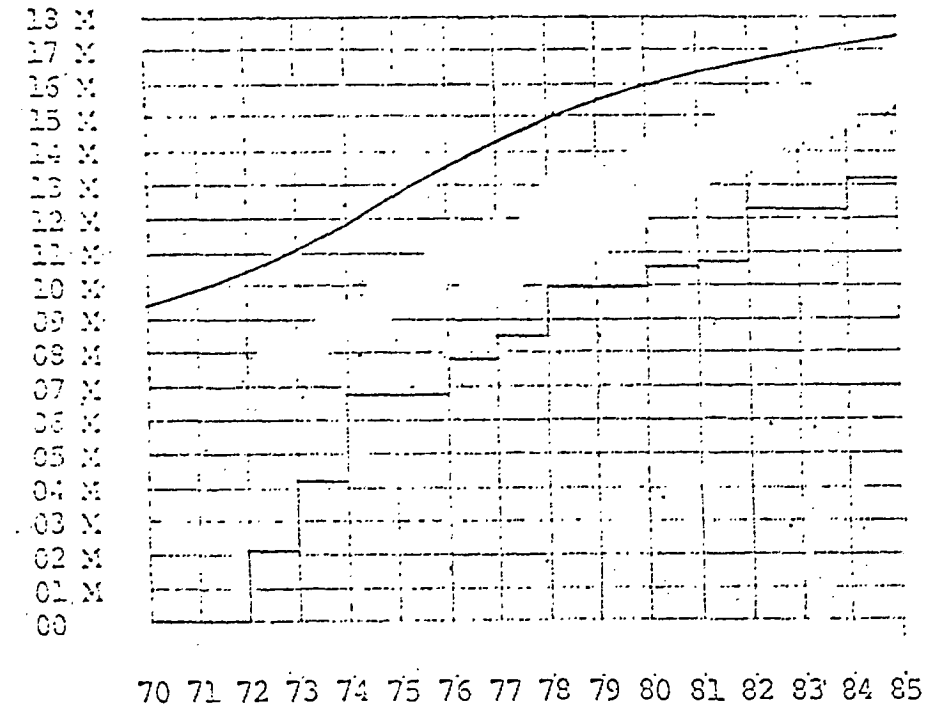

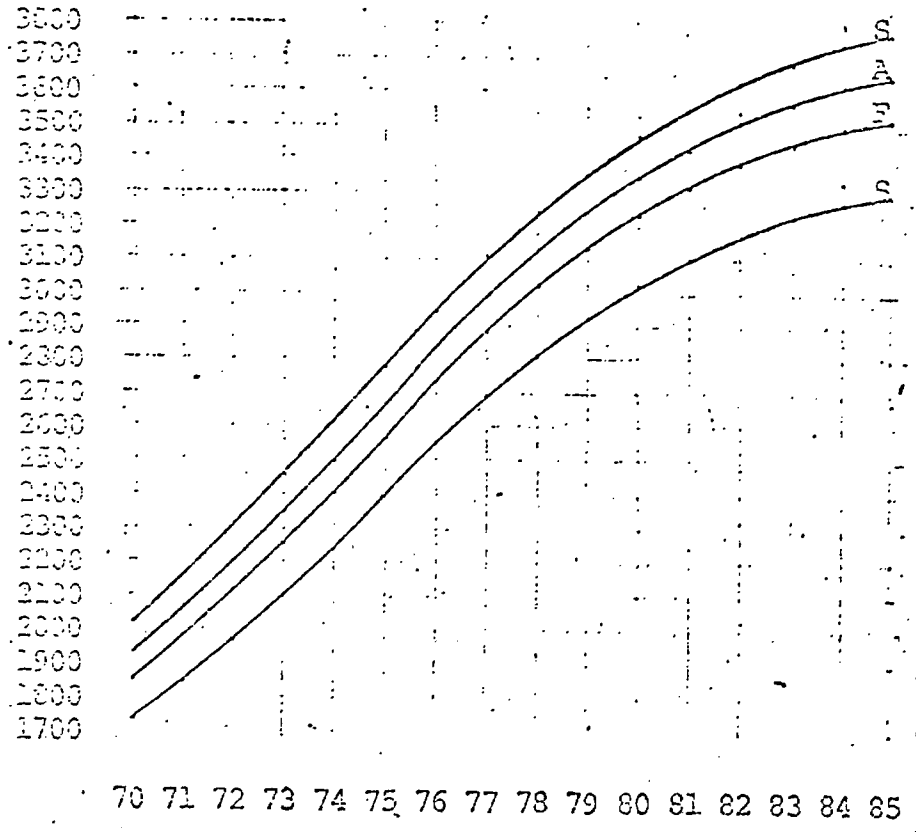
