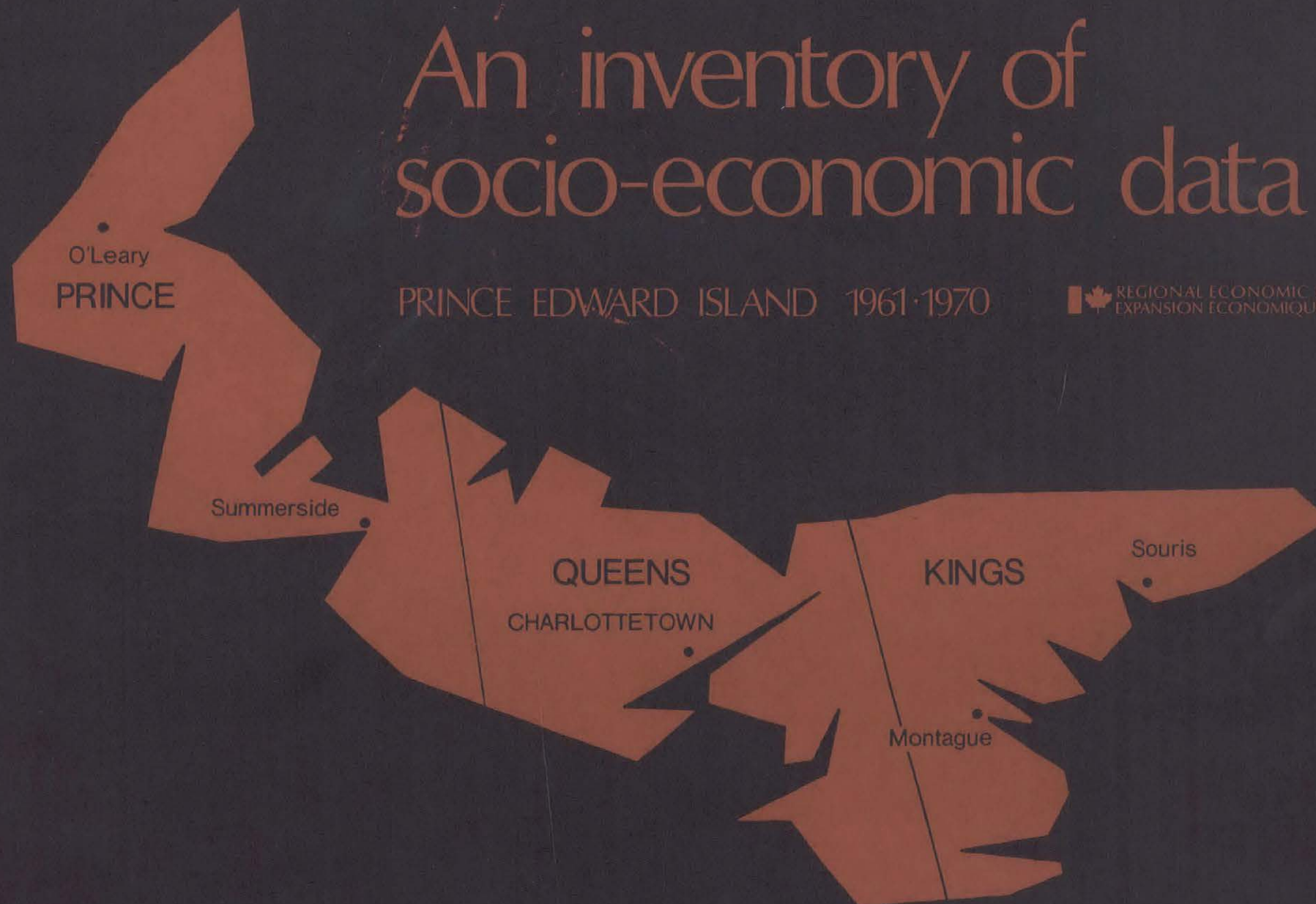

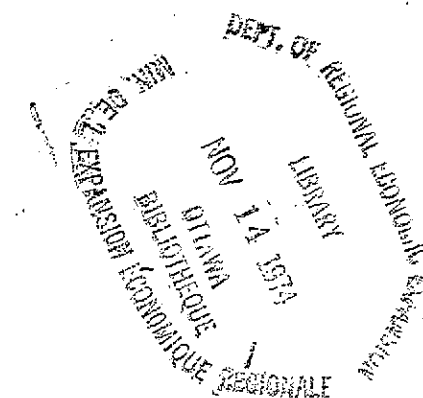

FOREWORD

Undertaken by the Program Evaluation Branch of the Canada Department of Regional Economic Expansion with the cooperation and assistance of the Government of Prince Edward Island, the following inventory compilation was approved jointly by Canada and the Province under "The Development Plan for Prince Edward Island".

Presented whenever possible as a time series from 1961 - 1970, the data inventory is intended to give a statistical picture of all the important sectors of P.E.I. influenced by "The Plan". As data for the Atlantic Provinces and Canada are given in many instances, comparisons can be made among various regions of Canada.

The Inventory's uses are expected to be many. Those wishing to study the Island may use the data to measure the provincial economic and social environment discretely or they may choose to project the data to simulate baseline conditions. However, it should be recognized that since "The Development Plan for Prince Edward Island" is comprehensive in scope and is in fact designed to effect major revisions in the Island make-up, the trends apparent in the time series may well shift dramatically.

It is anticipated also that individual program and project managers of "The Plan" will use the data for management purposes. Implementors, armed with both trend patterns and actual figures, may be able to establish yardsticks with which to effectively gauge their own performance and formulate macro-goals for which to strive.

Continued updating of this document would be desirable if it is to retain its currency. We anticipate that this will be agreed to and will occur.

The data, compiled by Messrs. T. Brennan, R. Callaghan, J. Cronier, J. Gibson and T. Rankin under the supervision of M. Parnes was amassed during the three month period, June - August, 1971.

DEPARTMENT OF WELFARE (1969-70)

This year, with a social worker devoting full time to juvenile delinquents, a great improvement was realized in the treatment of juvenile offenders. One hundred twenty-seven juveniles (117 boys and 10 girls) appeared in 219 court hearings and were adjudged to be delinquent. Of these, 23 or 36% were recidivists who committed 34% of a total of 154 offences. A breakdown of the offences committed is as follows:

Of the 127 juveniles adjudged, 64 were placed on probation, 5 were committed to training school and 4 were placed in the custody of the Director for placement in foster homes. The remainder were returned to the custody of their parents.
