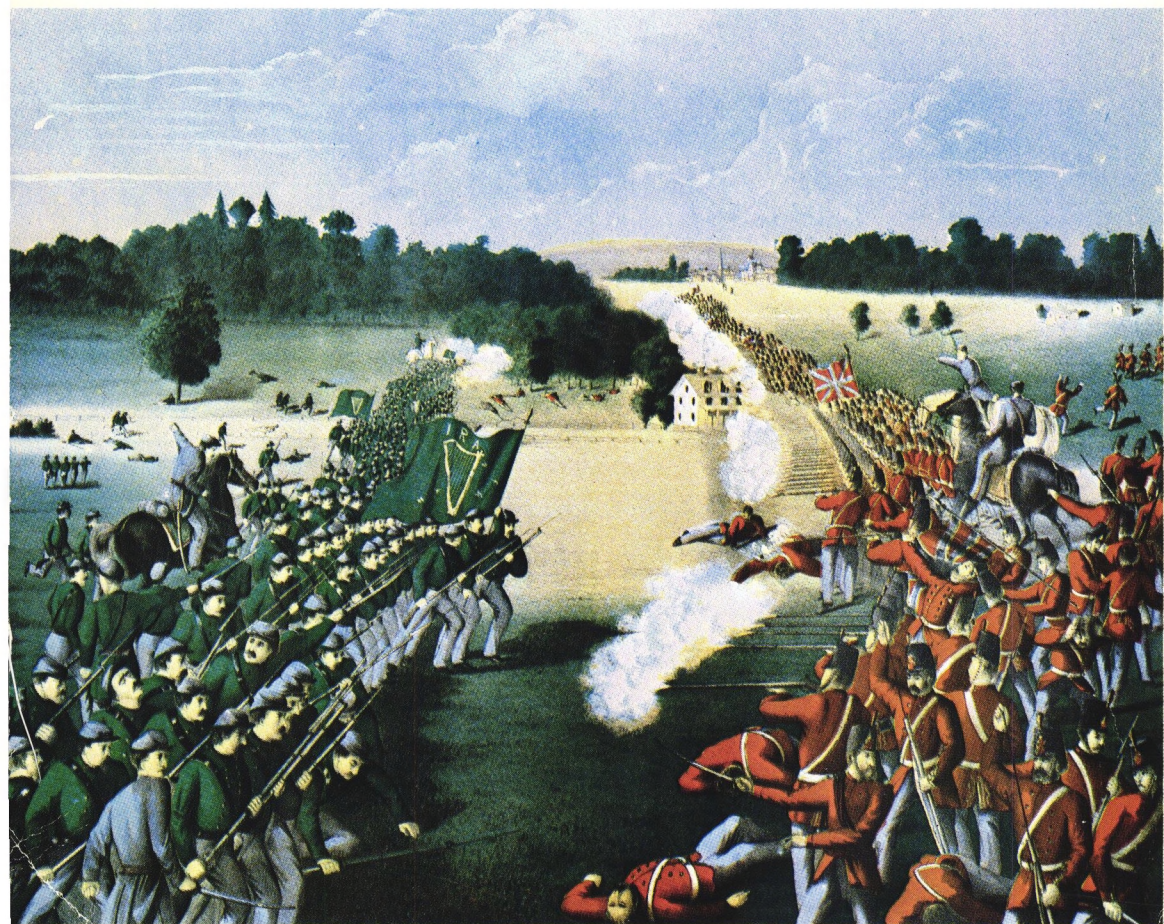

Foreword to the Second Edition

“The saving grace of all scholarship,” wrote Desmond Morton in the 1982 issue of the *Revue internationale d'histoire militaire*, (édition canadienne), “is that it is never finished and, in the realm of Canadian military history, it is entering an exciting and expansive phase.” This volume is testimony to that fact. Since 1979, when the first edition of this bibliography appeared as an Occasional Paper, there has been a spate of new military books in Canada. The need for an up-to-date guide has become increasingly evident, and it has offered the opportunity to make some desirable improvements to the original publication. A new section has been added to the bibliography, including titles covering the period since the unification of the armed forces in 1968. It is also hoped that the larger format will make this second edition more convenient to use and annotate. In addition, there is now an index, conferring obvious benefits to all researchers.

The author, Owen Cooke, has profited from the comments of readers of the first edition. Since it is still intended to maintain a continuing and complete record of works in the field, observations or information from readers will be most welcome.

Avant-propos de la deuxième édition

Dans le numéro de 1982 de la *Revue internationale d'histoire militaire* (édition canadienne), l'historien Desmond Morton s'exprimait ainsi: «L'un des grands mérites de l'érudition, c'est que le savant n'a jamais fini d'étendre le champ de ses connaissances, et, dans le domaine de l'histoire militaire du Canada, nous sommes au seuil d'une période passionnante qui connaîtra un grand essor du savoir.» C'est là un fait dont le présent ouvrage porte témoignage. Depuis 1979, lorsque la première édition de cette bibliographie a paru sous la forme d'un journal occasionnel, une profusion de nouveaux livres portant sur le domaine militaire ont été publiés au Canada. Il était donc devenu de plus en plus évident qu'il fallait un guide à jour, ce qui offrait l'occasion d'apporter des modifications souhaitables à la publication originelle. On a ajouté une nouvelle partie à la bibliographie qui comprend des titres d'ouvrages ayant trait à la période depuis l'unification des forces armées en 1968. Par son plus grand format, cette deuxième édition devrait être plus commode à utiliser et plus facile à annoter. De plus, l'on a inclus un index, ce qui constitue un avantage évident pour tous les chercheurs.

Foreword to the First Edition

Occasional papers are published by the Directorate of History at National Defence Headquarters in Ottawa. They contain information that, although it is of great interest, is too detailed for inclusion in the official histories of the Canadian armed forces. The first such book was T.W. Melnyk's *Canadian Flying Operations in South East Asia, 1941-1945*, published in 1976.

Occasional Paper No. 2, O.A. Cooke's *The Canadian Military Experience, 1867-1967: a Bibliography* represents years of patient investigation to fill a serious gap in our knowledge about published sources of Canadian military history. The extraordinary number of books and pamphlets in this field tends to belie the popular impression that Canadians are an unmilitary people. To be sure, careful examination will show that there are relatively few works of great substance, but that is not the point. What is important is that for the first hundred years after Confederation there was sufficient public interest to warrant the efforts required to write and publish over 2000 books and pamphlets purely on military affairs. They all need to be consulted by historians of Canada's military past, and we can say with some assurance from this evidence that the subject has enjoyed a continuing and dynamic interest in the nation.

The editor would have had to expand this bibliography significantly had he included titles dealing with political and social affairs that also touched on military topics. Such titles have therefore been omitted. They are readily found in standard Canadian bibliographies such as those mentioned in Part A of the text. The purpose of this book is to guide readers to purely military titles that are often left out of all the listings now in print.

The Canadian military experience is of course bound up in geography. The 3000-mile border with the United States, the transatlantic economic and political ties with European nations, the coastline that includes our polar regions as well as two very long seaboard, on the Atlantic and Pacific Oceans, have on the one hand placed Canada in a position of some strategic importance and on the other have always rendered it vulnerable to military threats from powerful neighbours. The entries that deal adequately with such questions should be fairly self-evident, even though no attempt has been made to provide annotations for the list. But the military experience is also bound up in personalities and outlooks formed by the various backgrounds of the authors here represented. Whether they had military experience themselves or not, on land, sea or air, they were all formed by the circumstances of their lives, by such things as education, religion, political leanings and climate. Understanding the Canadian military means understanding these people, and in that respect the

Avant-propos de la première édition

Le Service historique de la Défense nationale, à Ottawa, publie parfois des ouvrages qui, même s'ils sont d'un grand intérêt, sont trop détaillés pour paraître dans les histoires officielles des Forces armées du Canada. Le premier de ces ouvrages, *Les opérations aériennes du Canada dans le Sud-Est asiatique, 1941-1945*, de T.W. Melnyk, a été publié en 1976.

Le deuxième ouvrage, *Bibliographie de la vie militaire au Canada, 1867-1967*, édité par O.A. Cooke, représente plusieurs années de travail acharné pour combler une profonde lacune de nos connaissances des documents publiés sur l'histoire militaire du Canada. Le nombre incroyable de volumes et de brochures publiés dans ce domaine tend à démentir l'impression générale voulant que les Canadiens ne soient pas un peuple militaire dans l'âme. Bien sûr, un examen attentif montrera qu'il y a relativement peu d'ouvrages de grande valeur, mais là n'est pas la question. Ce qui importe c'est qu'au cours des cent années qui ont suivi la Confédération le public a montré suffisamment d'intérêt pour qu'on fasse l'effort d'écrire et de publier plus de 2000 livres et brochures sur des sujets purement militaires. Les historiens s'intéressant au passé militaire du Canada se doivent de les consulter et nous pouvons dire avec quelque assurance à partir de ces chiffres que le sujet a connu et continue de connaître une grande vogue au pays.

Le rédacteur aurait dû augmenter considérablement cette bibliographie s'il y avait inclus les titres des ouvrages portant sur des questions politiques et sociales qui touchent également à des sujets militaires. Il les a donc laissés de côté. On peut néanmoins facilement trouver ces titres dans les bibliographies régulières du Canada comme celles mentionnées dans la partie A du texte. Le présent ouvrage vise plutôt à orienter les lecteurs vers les volumes purement militaires, qu'on ne retrouve pas dans les listes imprimées actuelles.

L'expérience militaire du Canada est évidemment reliée à la géographie du pays. Sa frontière de 3000 milles avec les États-Unis, ses liens politiques et économiques avec les pays d'Europe, son littoral qui comprend les régions polaires et les rives des océans Atlantique et Pacifique ont, d'une part, placé le Canada dans une position importante sur le plan stratégique et l'ont, d'autre part, toujours rendu vulnérable à la menace militaire de ses puissants voisins. Il suffit de lire les titres des ouvrages pour savoir lesquels sont consacrés à ces questions, même si l'on n'a pas jugé bon d'ajouter des notes explicatives à la liste. Mais la vie militaire est aussi liée à certaines personnalités et à la perspective que nous donnent les origines des divers auteurs ici représentés. Qu'ils aient ou non servi dans l'infanterie, la marine ou l'aviation, ils ont tous été for-

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Introduction

Canadian military history and military matters have not been well represented in the past in retrospective bibliographies of Canadiana or in international military bibliographies. Although a small number of very useful listings of some aspects of Canadian military history, such as those on unit histories or of the writings of such prolific military authors as C.P. Stacey or G.F.G. Stanley, have been produced, no comprehensive list of references to guide the researcher interested in Canada's military past has been published.

What has been attempted here is a bibliography of published primary sources and secondary works on Canadian military topics, excluding poetry and fiction (with one exception), covering the period from Confederation to the present.

Entries in the bibliography represent printed monographs, books and pamphlets (to a minimum of ten pages), and serial titles. The prime criteria for inclusion were that the work be chiefly or uniquely both Canadian and military in its contents.

Many in-house publications, of the training pamphlet or regulations type, have been included, but only insofar as they tell us something of the armed forces themselves, rather than details of tactical doctrine or of pieces of equipment. Works by or about Canadians serving with the armed forces of other countries have been included, as well as materials relating to the military history of Newfoundland since 1867.

In order to restrict the bibliography to a reasonable size, periodical articles are not listed individually. Instead, serial titles of mainly Canadian and military content have been included, interfiled with monograph titles in the appropriate sections of the bibliography. Newspapers and newsletters have been excluded, but unit magazines and yearbooks regularly containing material of historical interest about the unit are found here.

Materials on soldiers' rehabilitation have not been considered. Veterans' publications and works about veterans have been included only if they deal directly with the wartime activities of individuals or units.

It is obvious from these criteria that a certain amount of subjective judgement has had to be exercised on the inclusion of individual items. This is most obvious in Part B, "Defence Policy and General Works," in which the criteria of mainly or uniquely Canadian and military content have been most difficult to apply.

Introduction

Par le passé fort peu d'ouvrages sur l'histoire et la vie militaire au Canada figuraient dans les recueils rétrospectifs de publications sur le Canada ou dans les bibliographies militaires internationales. Même si l'on a constitué quelques listes très utiles d'œuvres consacrées à certains aspects de l'histoire militaire canadienne, notamment l'histoire des unités, ou des écrits d'auteurs militaires aussi prolifiques que C.P. Stacey ou G.F.G. Stanley, il n'existe aucune liste complète sur laquelle peut se fonder le chercheur qui s'intéresse au passé militaire du Canada.

Nous avons donc tenté de dresser ici la liste des sources premières publiées et des œuvres secondaires, hormis la poésie et la fiction (sauf une seule exception), consacrées à la vie militaire canadienne depuis la Confédération l'époque actuelle.

La bibliographie regroupe des monographies, des livres et des brochures d'au moins dix pages, ainsi que des titres de périodiques. Notre choix des œuvres s'est fondé sur le critère primordial suivant: le sujet devrait être uniquement ou principalement canadien et militaire à la fois.

Plusieurs publications internes du Ministère, telles les manuels d'instruction ou de règlements, ont été retenues, mais seulement dans la mesure où elles nous renseignent sur les forces armées en plus de donner des détails de pièces d'équipement ou d'ordre tactique. Les ouvrages de Canadiens servant au sein de forces armées d'autres pays ou consacrés à ceux-ci, ainsi que ceux touchant l'histoire militaire de Terre-Neuve depuis 1867, ont également été catalogués.

Afin d'éviter de surcharger la bibliographie, les articles de périodiques ne sont pas répertoriés séparément. Nous avons plutôt retenu les titres des périodiques à fonds principalement militaire et canadien, que nous avons insérés avec les monographies dans les sections appropriées de la bibliographie. Les journaux et les lettres au rédacteur ont été laissés de côté, mais les revues et les livrets annuels des unités contenant régulièrement des articles d'intérêt historique ont été catalogués.

Les ouvrages portant sur la réadaptation des soldats ont été rejetés. Les publications des anciens combattants et les ouvrages qui leur sont consacrés n'ont été retenus que s'ils portaient directement sur les activités de temps de guerre des soldats ou des unités.

Comme vous le voyez, une bonne part des subjectivité a régi le choix des ouvrages. La chose est encore plus évidente dans la partie B intitulée «Les poli-

In general, first editions of books have been listed. Later editions have been included only if they have been greatly enlarged or are much different in their bibliographic description. An effort was made to inspect each work to verify its bibliographic description and subject relevance. Some works were unobtainable, but have been included on the basis of entries in reliable bibliographies.

In compiling this bibliography, I have relied heavily on the holdings of the major military and academic libraries of the Ottawa, Kingston and Toronto areas. No critical evaluation or selection has been made, for what may seem a weak book to the compiler might well provide vital information to a researcher working from a different viewpoint.

Materials have been arranged so that individual entries are sometimes repeated in several different sections of the bibliography. For example, a regimental history of an infantry regiment raised in 1885 and existing to the present day appears in all four time-periods of the land forces section. A work on some aspect of the Royal Canadian Air Force and the Canadian Army in the Second World War would appear in the 1939-1945 parts of both the land and air forces sections. In all, the bibliography contains approximately 2500 different entries.

I wish to express my thanks to present and former historians and staff of the Directorate of History who contributed to this project, particularly to Vince Bezeau, Jon Caven, Ted Chambers, Phil Chaplin, Carl Christie, Elizabeth Chenier, John Dendy, Ron Dodds, Ben Greenhouse, Steve Harris, Fred Hatch, Norman Hillmer, David Kealy, Winston MacIntosh, Morris Mason, Terry Melnyk, Marc Milner, Jean Pariseau, Andrea Schlecht and Bob Stokely for their expertise in collecting many entries and for their assistance with the editing and publishing processes. I am grateful to the staffs of the military, academic and public libraries of Ottawa, Kingston and Toronto for their assistance, and particularly to the Royal Canadian Military Institute, Toronto, for making its library freely available. I am also indebted to Tom LaRue, Herb Slaght and Joe Harper for details of works in their collections. Last, I wish to thank Dr. W.A.B. Douglas, Director of History, National Defence Headquarters, who has made this publication possible.

tiques sur la défense et généralités» où le caractère principalement ou uniquement canadien et militaire des ouvrages a été très difficile à cerner.

En général, nous avons retenu les premières éditions des livres. Les éditions ultérieures n'ont été répertoriées que si leur contenu a été considérablement augmenté ou si leur description bibliographique a été largement modifiée. Nous nous sommes efforcés de vérifier la description bibliographique et la pertinence de chaque ouvrage. Il a été impossible de se procurer certains d'entre eux, mais nous les avons quand même catalogués parce qu'ils figuraient dans des bibliographies fiables.

Pour dresser cette bibliographie, nous nous sommes considérablement basés sur les ouvrages détenus par les principales bibliothèques universitaires et militaires des régions d'Ottawa, de Kingston et de Toronto. Il n'y a pas eu d'évaluation ou de choix critiques, car l'ouvrage qui peut nous avoir semblé de peu d'importance pourrait fournir des renseignements inestimables au chercheur qui a un autre point de vue.

Les ouvrages ont été classés de façon que le même titre figure parfois dans plusieurs sections de la bibliographie. Par exemple, l'histoire d'un régiment d'infanterie formé en 1885 et existant encore aujourd'hui paraît dans chacune des quatre grandes époques de la section consacrée aux forces terrestres. Un ouvrage portant sur certains aspects de l'Aviation royale du Canada et de l'Armée canadienne pendant la Deuxième Guerre mondiale figurerait dans la partie 1939-1945 de la section des forces terrestres et de la section des forces aériennes. En tout, le bibliographie renferme environ 2500 titres différents.

Granatstein and Paul Stevens, eds., *A Reader's Guide to Canadian History. 2: Confederation to the Present* (Toronto: Univ. of Toronto Press, 1982), 329 pp., or Claude Thibault, *Bibliographia Canadiana* (Don Mills, Ont.: Longman Canada, 1973), 795 pp., list many works on the Canadian military experience among references to other facets of our history. More specialized references will be found in regional bibliographies, such as Alan F.J. Artibise, *Western Canada since 1870; a Select Bibliography and Guide* (Vancouver: Univ. of British Columbia Press, 1978), 294 pp.

Similarly, international military bibliographies also contain Canadian materials. General works, like Gwyn M. Bayliss, *Bibliographic Guide to the Two World Wars; an Annotated Survey of English-Language Reference Materials* (London: Bowker, 1977, 578 pp., or Commission internationale d'histoire militaire, Comité de bibliographie, *Bulletin de bibliographie*, No. 1- (Lausanne, Suisse: Centre d'histoire, 1978-), or such specific topical bibliographies as Myron J. Smith, *World War II at Sea; a Bibliography of Sources in English* (Metuchen, N.J.: Scarecrow Press, 1976), 3 vols., are useful.
