



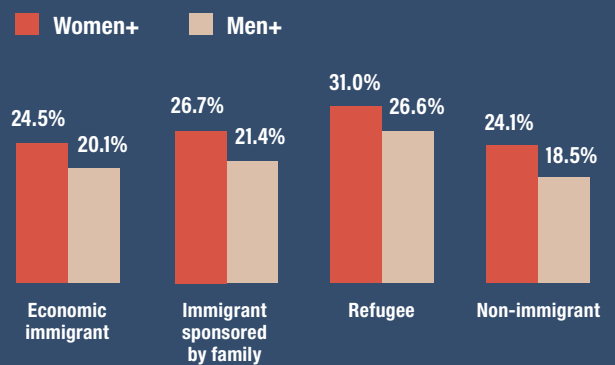
# Low income

among persons in one-parent families headed by an immigrant parent

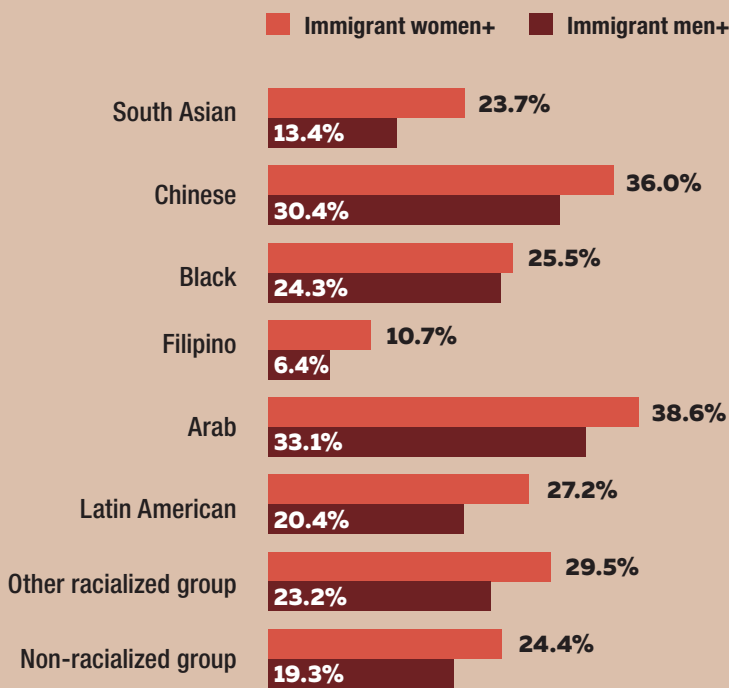
Persons in one-parent families headed by an immigrant woman are most likely to be in low income.



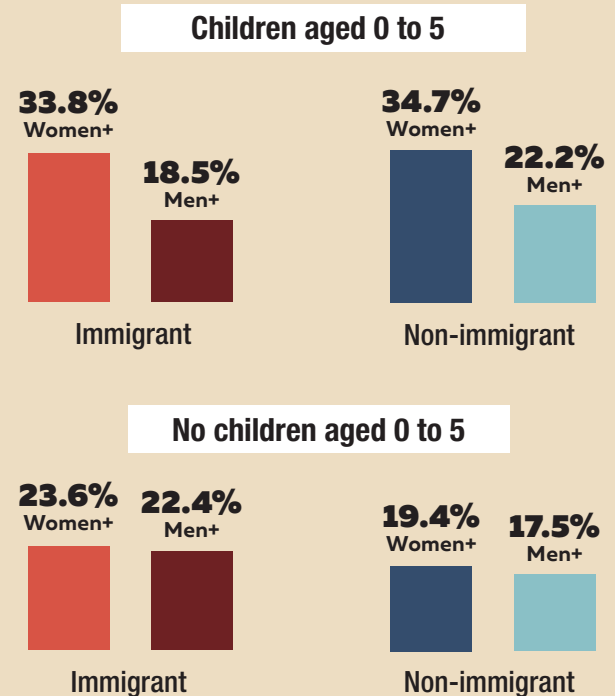
Persons in one-parent families headed by an immigrant woman admitted under the economic category are as likely as those in one-parent families headed by a non-immigrant woman to be in low income.



The percentage of persons in low income was highest in one-parent families headed by a Chinese or Arab immigrant.



In one-parent families with young children, persons are much more likely to be in low income when the family is headed by a woman. The gender gap is even larger when the parent is an immigrant.



**Notes:**  
 - This infographic presents the low-income status (measured with the low-income measure, after tax) of persons in one-parent families with children aged 17 or younger. Children aged 18 and older may also be present.  
 - The category "Women+" includes women, as well as some non-binary persons, while the category "Men+" includes men, as well as some non-binary persons.  
 - Data on racialized groups are measured using the "visible minority" variable.
