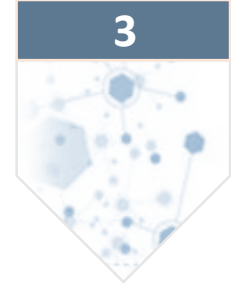

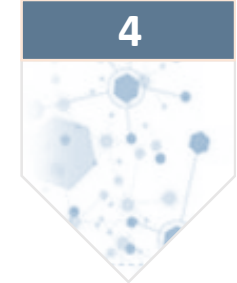

NOS should serve as a guide, not a plan

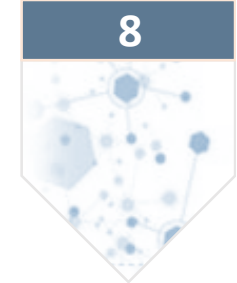


Additional data and stakeholders should be consulted before conclusions are made, and low cell counts - particularly % changes on small raw values - should be removed from analysis.



What is a client? A newcomer who received at least one domestic service from an IRCC-funded settlement service provider.

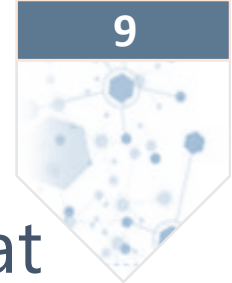

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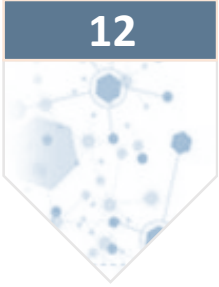

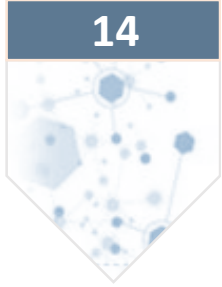

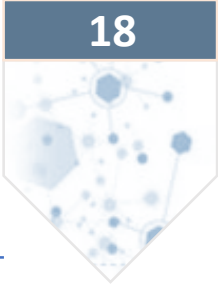

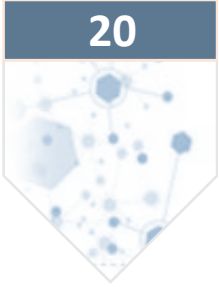

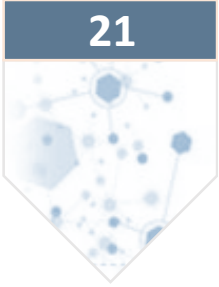

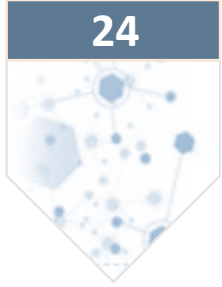

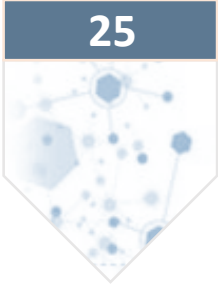

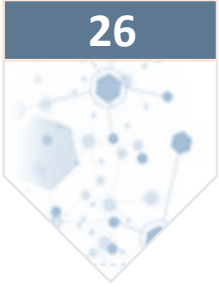

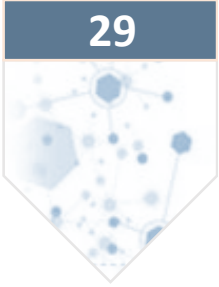

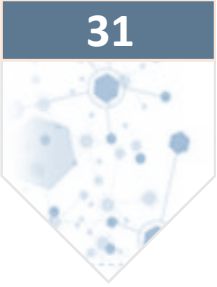

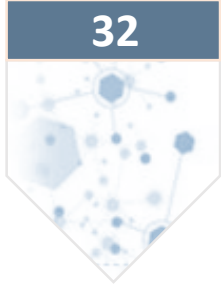
